C. T. McCraw Dies at Home in Braden

In the death of Charles Thomas McCraw, which occurred at his home in Braden, Fayette County, at 5:30 o'clock Thursday morning, Memphis loses one of her most widely known and successful business men.

As president of the McCraw, Perkins & Weber Company, cotton factors, and president of the Currie McCraw Wholesale Grocery Company, Mr. McCraw had for many years taken an active part in commercial affairs in this city.

The illness which resulted in his death began about three years ago, but he had been confined to his bed for only a month. Suffering from a complication of heart and kidney trouble, Mr. McCraw had visited California and Virginia in the hope of regaining health, but without avail. The end came peacefully at his Fayette County home, Thursday.

Charles T. McCraw was born in Bernard County, Texas, 64 years ago. When six years old he removed with his parents to Halifax County, Va., where he grew to manhood, receiving his education in the common schools of Halifax County.

At the age of 21 he removed to Fayette County, Tenn., making his home at Braden. A man of sound business judgment and an untiring worker, Mr. McCraw rapidly rose to a position of affluence and influence in the western section of the state. He owned about 6,000 acres of fertile land in Fayette and was head of the firm of C. T. McCraw & Co., general merchants and planters, having their headquarters at Braden.

He became interested in Memphis in a business way in 1901, when the McCraw, Perkins & Weber Company was organized. For 19 years the company has conducted a successful business under the original firm name, P. A. Perkins and E. F. Webber, his associates, surviving to carry on the affairs of the concern. Five years later the Currie-McCraw Company was organized, with Mr. McCraw as president, and has continued actively in the wholesale grocery business since.

In 1881 Mr. McCraw was married to Miss Mary T. Wright of Farmville, Va., to whom he was engaged when he left the old Dominion. She lived only five years, leaving one child, Miss Mary E. McCraw, who has made her home with her father at Braden.

It was with trembling voice yesterday that Mr. Perkins and Mr. Weber business partners, spoke of the death of C. T. McCraw. A man of retiring disposition, who abhorred sham and pretense, a genial companion and possessed of splendid business talents which were put to unselfish use, Mr. McCraw won the admiration not only of those with whom he associated, but of all with whom he came in contact.

Besides his daughter, Miss Mary E. McCraw of Braden, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. I. T. Wright of 1625 Carr Avenue, Memphis, and one brother, J. W. McCraw of Braden.

Funeral services will be held at the residence at Braden this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The body will be interred beside that of his wife in the family burying ground.

The former business associates of Mr. McCraw will act as pallbearers. They are: John Cunningham, E. F. Webber, Jesse Currie, A. S. Uilathorne, P. A. Perkins and James T. Holland. —Commercial Appeal.

New Gin and Sawmill

Plans have been completed for the establishment of the new gin plant mentioned in these columns recently and to build and operate with it a saw mill. Men behind the new enterprise are J. S. Taylor, K. W. Sessums, J. L. Sanders and W. C. Latta, and it will be built, owned and operated by them. This should be a guarantee of the good character of the enterprise and its substantial conduct.

The plant will be located on the corner of the property on north side of N. C. & St. L. Ry. owned by Mr. Sessums and will have the advantage of having a spur track of road running to it. It is but a short distance from the depot and the cotton platform and is in one of the most convenient locations in town for that kind of an establishment. All these gentlemen have had experience in operating gins, mills, cotton and seed business, etc., and the new enterprise should mean much for the cotton and lumber business of this city.

Work will begin soon on the building and the plant will be ready for ginning when the next season opens. The new concern will be named The Planters Gin & Lumber Company.

Garden Notes

In our home garden now there are growing four plantings of English peas, the earliest now in full bloom and young pods, the second planting recently stuck, the next being just thru the ground, one row of Early Alaska, same as the first two plantings, and the fourth lot just up are of a larger and later sort. We are planting a fifth planting this week, and the five plantings should give us peas from about May 1 to July 1. Three plantings of corn for roasting ears are growing nicely, two of snap beans and others of corn and beans both will be planted along thru the season to keep the supply up thru the year. Then with a succession of tomatoes, okra, beets, squash, cucumbers, etc., we get something to eat from the garden every day all summer.

The Charleston Wakefield is our choice of all the cabbage we have tried. It is early and heads grow to weigh six to ten pounds, big enough for any home garden, and it is as sure a header as there is in the garden lists.

The promise now is for a fine strawberry crop in this section, the planting of that delicious fruit for this year is rather light. There are but few growers here who will have any for sale.

No, the peaches have not been hurt by recent cold weather. The trees have now on them all the fruit they can well mature and the promise for a full crop of fruit is fine, not withstanding the statement by a few that peaches have been badly damaged.

With Irish potatoes selling at \$5 per bushel it behooves every home to have its patch to supply it thru the coming year. The present price is unprecedented in this section, and Fayette

county is a buying section rather than a selling section for these potatoes, altho one of best producing sections in the country. There is plenty of time yet to plant and grow a good crop.

The tomato plants and cabbage plants should be gotten into the rows as soon as possible now. Egg plants and peppers can be set out any time from now on for a month or more.

So many people just plant a few standard vegetables and no others, a few cabbage, beans, corn and beets, neglecting the many other vegetables that are healthful and appetizing, giving a fine variety to the everyday diet of town and country homes. Put in a few egg plants, sweet peppers, lettuce for heading, safsify, carrots, parsnips, and the many others and you will find genuine pleasure in having these for your table.

Many ask how one gets lettuce to head. We have stated in these columns many times that certain varieties of lettuce never head. There are heading varieties and loose varieties, and to get heads one must first get a heading variety, and he can always tell by reading description on seed packages. It tells whether loose or heading variety. Next the plants must be thinned in the bed to about six inches apart each way and kept worked, or transplanted into rows six to eight inches apart and highly fertilized. Try this and you will get genuine hard white heads.
