Blanks for taking the 1920 school census have this week been received by the County Superintendent and will be sent next week to the clerks of the district boards. The law makes it the duty of these clerks to take the school census every year in July and it is hoped that the work will be done promptly and carefully by the clerks and their sworn reports sent to the County Superintendent. For this work the clerk is paid two cents per pupil recorded, this being fixed by state law as other fees cannot be charged.

At this writing, Wednesday, many sections of this county are badly in need of rain. So continuous and so heavy were the rains thruout the spring until two weeks ago that the soil has been worked wet in many cases and plowing delayed, too, so that the soil is in poor condition to undergo a spell of two or three weeks drought. Much planting of corn is yet unfinished and land is breaking cloddy, according to reports we get. A good rain would do wonderful good to these sections. A few parts of the county had a fine season the first of this week and the last days of last week.

Thru the gift of the General Education Board of New York there will be a summer school of four weeks held at the Fayette County Training School in this city from July 12 to August 6. The General Education Board furnish the money to defray the expenses of this summer school and it should be worth much to the colored teachers of the county. A number of the leading colored educators of the south will assist in the work and speakers from the department of education at Nashville will be present almost daily. The day when certificates can be secured for just anybody is gone and those who teach must stand an examination and win their certificates. White people can help their colored friends by seeing that they attend.

Some Canners That Make Canning Easy

Expensive equipment is unnecessary for canning. Agricultural specialists say. A washboiler, lard can, or any container with a tightly fitting cover large enough to hold a number of packed jars, and a few other simple utensils generally found in the ordinary kitchen will do the work. When such equipment is used, a false bottom must be placed in the boiler or other container to prevent the jars from coming in contact with the metal. A rack made of strips of wood is probably best for the purpose. The processing or boiling of the jars in the container may be done on the kitchen stove or on a furnace built out of doors. Several types of canners, by which the work can be done more easily than with a home made out fit, are on the market. The hot-water bath canner is the least expensive commercial type. There are two kinds, one, which may be placed on the kitchen stove, and another, which has a firebox and pipe attached for use out of doors. Each has a sterilizing vat, lifting trays, tongs for handling hot jars, false bottom, and tools necessary in sealing jars. Tin cans or glass jars may be used with any outfit.

There are also steam pressure outfits for home use. They develop a higher temperature than the water bath canners mentioned. Steam pressure outfits are made to carry from 5 to 30 pounds of steam pressure and are regulated easily.

Summer Course For Agricultural Teachers

The University of Tennessee has announced a summer course for teachers of vocational agriculture, as provided for under the Smith-Hughes law. This course will be conducted June 29 to July 31, by the University in co-operation with the State Board of Vocational Education. No tuitions will be made.

Courses are open to students of junior standing in any standard agricultural college. Instructions will be in the courses to be taught in the high schools next year. Under the first head classes in farm management will study methods of choosing the region and selecting the farm and organization and operation of farms. Classes in farm mechanics will study application of engineering to farm life, steam and gasoline engines, electricity on the farm and rural sanitation. Classes in farm poultry will study the outlook for poultry production, incubation on the farm, feeding for egg and meat production, and marketing of poultry and poultry products. Each student will study all of these subjects.

A thorough and intensive course in agriculture is also offered, including much laboratory practice and many field trips.

Those wishing information are advised to write to the department of agricultural education at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.
