The First Bale Last Friday

The first bale of cotton of the present season to come to Somerville was brought in last Thursday by Jack Hunter of the fourth district and was ginned Friday by the Central Oil Mills gin, this first bale coming in three days later than the first bale of last year. This was expected, as the crop has been notably later all the season than or several years past.

Owing to some troubles in ginning and pressing this first bale, following the installment by the gin of new machinery and getting adjustments properly made, the bale when completed was not counted as altogether desirable by buyers and satisfactory bids were not made for it and it was not sold. This caused word to go out that no offer was made by buyers, without the explanations given above. Two bales came to town Saturday, were ginned and offered for sale and bids of 28c 28½ were made for them, but neither bid was accepted and the bales were hauled back home, it is told us.

The condition of the market is chaotic and uncertain. Nobody can predict its future. The speculators and mills have, we confidently believe, made a deliberate determination and plan to get the crop for a song as compared with the price of production, and the only remedy that can be seen is for farmers to refuse to sell as did those Saturday until a fair price is offered. The American Cotton Association has fixed 40c as fair price and every farmer is asked by the association to hold off the market every possible bale until the price offered reaches that figure.
