Tuesday's Election

Tuesday's election passed quietly in Fayette county with a rather lighter vote than was expected, in view of the recent enfranchisement of two or three thousand white lady voters who were given their first opportunity of voting. It has been nothing uncommon in past years for the county to vote more than 2,000 in a presidential election and last Tuesday but 22,000 voters in the county exercised their right to vote. Had the public had a genuine interest in the election throughout the county it would have been easy to have voted 5,000 instead of 2,200. Lack of interest characterized the campaign from the very beginning and until the last days of the campaign not a step taken to arouse interest in the county. This late action did not succeed in bringing the voters to the polls, resulting in the loss here of at least 2,000 votes for the Democratic ticket.

It has not been possible to get the official vote yet and will not be until next week, but the Democratic nominees carried about 2000 votes in the county, to 210 for the Republican nominees. Returns received, not official, indicate that the newly enfranchised women voters did not generally take advantage of their opportunity to vote. In Somerville 131 women voters cast their ballots and women workers were about the polls all day working for the Democratic ticket. In other precincts in the county there seems to have been but few women to vote.

Hon. H. P. Crawford was elected to represent Fayette county in the lower house of the state legislature, and Hon. W. W. Bond of Brownsville was elected state senator, neither having opposition. Congressman Hubert Fisher was elected over his negro opponent by a large majority, receiving a big majority in every county in his congressional district. Charles Dean of Collierville was elected flatorial representative over Jno. R. Coates of Memphis.

A. G. Murrell was elected Justice of the Peace in the eight district and J. G. Smith was elected Corporation Magistrate at Oakland, neither having opposition.

According to word received here, no elections were held at Warren, Elba or Pipeston, but this information is not definite at this time.

Humphreys Farmers Purchase Eighteen Purebred Bulls

One of the biggest drives on the scrub sire in Tennessee this year has just been completed in Humphreys County. Eighteen purebred bulls have been purchased cooperatively by the farmers of the different communities of the county and more than twenty-five scrub sires have been sent to the market.

For some time the farmers of the county had been dissatisfied with the kind of cattle they had been producing and this feeling reached its climax in August when an organized drive to weed out the scrub and replace him with purebreds was started under the auspices of the County Council of Agriculture. County Agent T. H. Richardson, J. B. Link, president of the

county council and chairman of the livestock committee, and L. A. Richardson, Livestock Specialist of the Division of Extension conducted ten meetings on the different sections of the county and considerable interest was shown by the farmers, many stating that they had one or two scrub males on their farms but would get rid of them at once. A roundup meeting attended by more than a 100 farmers was held at the county seat August 21 and a committee to purchase eighteen purebred bulls appointed.

At the county fair which was held at Waverly on October 8 the bulls which had been purchased by the committee were on exhibit and at the close of the fair were distributed to the different sections of the county. The lot represented nine Shorthorn bulls purchased from the herds of L. L. Little & Co., ayeatvble, E. C. Clark, Nashville and

McNeal and Agnew, Rives; seven Aberdeen-Angus purchased from the herds of H. R. Duncan and A. C. Hitch, Maryville and Dr. J. I. Huggins, Dandridge; two Hereford bulls from good herds in the county. The county was largely divided into sections, the Angus bulls going to one and the Shorthorn to another. This was very gratifying to the livestock committee of the County Council of Agriculture since it will mean that the farmers of these two sections will each have one breed of cattle. Due to existing herds it was impracticable to establish one breed in the whole county. So this was the next best step. After two years it is planned to exchange these bulls, one community exchanging its bull for that of another. By this method the bulls may be used for a period of eight to ten years. From 3,500 to 4,000 people attended

the county fair and these bulls were one of the outstanding features of the livestock exhibits as well as of the whole fair. It was a great event in the history of the county. It meant the beginning of a new day in the livestock industry of the county and all showed much interest in the movement. The progressive spirit shown by the leaders and the farmers of this county indicates the banishment of the scrub from the county. They consider him an abomination. He has long consumed the grain and roughage of their fields returning nothing but loss and waste. Their battle cry is: "May his tribe and generation be no more."

May the other counties of the state follow in concert the example of this county, to the complete elimination of the most worthless animal of the farm, the scrub sire.
