Annual Meeting Fayette County Bank

The Fayette County Bank Directors met in their regular annual session last Saturday in the director's room at the bank.

The report of the officers of the bank show the institution to be in the very best of condition, with a satisfactory year's business in 1920, when the stress of matters financial are considered. Banks, like other business concerns, suffered from the business collapse the last half of the year, but the Fayette County Bank was found to be in excellent condition, as safe and sound as any banking institution in the whole country, with its entire business shown to be conservative and safely conducted.

The Directors declared a stock dividend of \$10,000, which is 20 per cent of the capital previously paid in. The subscribed capital of the bank is \$100,000, and it had \$50,000 of that sum paid in and a surplus well up toward the same sum. This takes \$10,000 from the surplus, or undivided profits account and gives each stockholder credit on his stock of \$10 per share, making the paid capital in the future \$60,000 instead of \$50,000 as in the past, and hereafter all dividends will be calculated on this basis.

The new board of directors elected at a stockholders meeting recently met just after the adjournment of the old board and re-elected every employee of the bank as follows: Capt. H. C. Moorman, President; W. H. Leach, Vice President; Capt. E. A. Maddox Cashier; W. H. Leach, W. T. Loggins members of the discount committee, and R. W. Sessums, Blake Stainback, Jack P. Hobson as bookkeepers and helpers in the institution.
