

Curing Pork.
Some thirty years ago I lodged from Sunday to Monday with an inn-keeper in the country, who was also a farmer. On the table for Sunday's dinner there was a nice piece of pickled pork, boiled the day before. On tasting it I thought it the most delicious I ever ate. I requested "mine host" to give his receipt for curing pork. He replied as follows:
"As soon as my hogs are dressed and cool enough to be cut, I pick the side pieces in a barrel or cask, with plenty of salt on all sides of each piece, and when my barrel is full I immediately roll it to my pump and pump in water until I can see the water cease to sink in the vessel, or to moisten the salt on top of the cask. I then lay a flat stone, as large as the vessel will receive, or the contents, so as to keep the pork always under the salt or pickle. I put it in my cellar, covered so as to exclude the flies, and there it remains until a piece is wanted. Care must be taken to keep the meat under the pickle, otherwise it will rust."
Here is the whole secret of making good pickled pork for family use. We have used the above method, and we want no better, easier or more economical plan. It is most happened that when we wanted to put down new pork there remained some of the old in the bottom of the cask. In that case we poured off the pickle, took the undissolved salt, packed the fresh pork on top of the old, using the salt which had been in the cask, with the addition of fresh salt if necessary, and then poured in the bottom of our pork barrel, and when used it was as free from rancidity as it was three weeks after it was put down. Indeed, we seldom emptied our pork barrel, except when it wanted hocking. We believe that boiling pickling is useless, if not injurious. Pork ought not, if it can be prevented, to be frozen before it is put down.
The best pork that we ever saw was that from some pigs under the charge of a lad who took as much care of them as some people do of their children. Every day he used to give them a dinner of hot potatoes, for he said that, he didn't see why his pigs "shouldn't have their livers hot as well as his own." Then he used to scrub them several times a week with a brush and soap, rinsing them well with clean water. The animals seemed to enjoy their lathering, and used to prope equitly toward him as he came in sight with his pig and scrubbing-brush. Their sty was also kept perfectly clean, and their troughs washed out frequently. In consequence the pork was perfection.
As a general thing it is a good plan to reject pork made from hogs that have been kept by distillers or butchers; but if possible get pork that has been bred and fed by a dairyman, and finished off with corn.

Bottom of the Sea.
Explorations of the most careful kind have established the fact that hills, dunes, ravines and mountains characterize the bottom of oceans and seas. Five miles, perpendicular depth, prove there must be some excessively dark, gloomy places. But even there life abounds. Strangers form are brought up by sounding. There seems to be no waste places on the globe, since animal and vegetable lives are everywhere fitted precisely to those obscure localities where they are found. On the highest peak of the Andes, the Corallines, Mount Lebanon or the lofty ranges of India, marine shells abound. They were elevated from profound depths in primitive seas, on the mud and debris of a vastly remote period, to their present position. Marine shells, therefore, on mountain tops, are chronological evidence of the mighty revolutions through which the earth has passed. The remains of curious things in art, the fabrication of human hands, many of which still resist the corroding influence of time, may yet be lifted out of the deep to be inspected miles above the level of future seas, as marine shells are inspected by travellers, who in their investigations wonder how they came there.

A Corpse Gets Out of the Coffin and Speaks to the Watchers.
