**HOW WE CAN MAKE
OUR COUNTY BETTER.**

In week before lasts issue of
Mrs Grundy appeared a splendid
article entitled, "What's the
matter with Grundy? Every
citizen in the county should read
it, and be aroused to a full sense
of his duty. It is my purpose to
supplement this article and co-
operate with Mr. Rollings. We
are facing a crisis in Grundy Co.,
you may not be aware of it but a
huge battle is being fought with
the mass of our people inactive.
Every one should be aroused and
enlisted in behalf of every move-
ment for the betterment of our
county. Are you willing to re-
spond to the call of duty?"

We are all citizens of the same
state and county. There are ties
that are common to us all, a sense
of loyalty to our home, to our
county should guide our actions.
We have been in a state of leth-
argy for so long a time, we
haven't waked up to our duty.
We haven't found our proper
bearing, and now we are hesitat-
ing taking a step forward which
corresponds to the evolutionary

stages in the life of man. It is
essential that we advance.

As I said we are citizens of the
same county, therefore our aim
should be one, viz, the better-
ment of our county. I am proud
of our county. It has a great fu-
ture, there are wonderful means
of development at our door. I
am proud of our force of teach-
ers, they are recognized as men
and women of ability all over
the state. I am proud of every
farmer who has made two blades
of grass, two stalks of corn grow
where one did. I am proud of
the fact that our mountain
streams which finally flow into
the great rivers contribute to the
commerce of the world. I am
proud of every thing that is pro-
duced by our citizens which con-
tributes toward the happiness of
mankind. Then how can we bet-
ter our county? First, we must
recognize that farming is the
hope of our county and build our
superstructure upon this. Inten-
sive not extensive farming must
be resorted to modern applica-
tions should be applied. Farmers
Institutes should be attended.
Exhibits should be made at coun-
ty and state fairs. Fruit grow-
ing and stock raising should com-
mand greater attention. We
have an ideal location for both.
Means of preserving the native
fertility of the soil, and putting
more on the soil every year than
is taken off should receive up-
most attention.

Secondly, our schools must be
built up. We must have longer
terms, and instead of shortening
the term each year it should be
lengthened until we have a nine
month's public school all over
the county. The county court
at its last session voted to de-
crease the tax our public schools
10 cents on the \$1.00. This
means that next year we'll have
a three months public school.
Are you willing to see it done?
If not, speak with the members
of the county court and urge
them to restore the tax at the
July term of County Court. It
is not too late to act, but it must
be done at once.

We have the Elementary and
High School. The old secondary
school can't legally exist today.
We have no high school for the
benefit of the school boys and
girls consequently those who de-
sire further training must be
sent away. Thousands of dollars
are sent to other counties every
year which should remain in our
own county. We haven't appre-
ciated our benefactor the state.
We haven't received the aid other
counties are getting from the
state. We ought to, we
must if we keep abreast with the
times and enable the boys and
girls of our county to be able to
meet the duties which will come
as the years roll by.

A High School tax is levied by
the county court of 10 cents on
the dollar. The state will give
us 1-3 as much as we raise in the
county. A Third Class High
School is to be located in every
district of the county. You
should be aware of this and pre-
sent your claims to the committee
which our county court will ap-
point. This committee will de-
cide the best place for the loca-
tion of each school. It will be in
the same buildings we now have
but our facilities should be im-
proved. The establishment of
these Third Class Schools are a

step in the right direction. It
will lead to better roads, better
farms and means of farming, bet-
ter schools and consolidated
schools, better boys and girls who
will be more efficient when they
become men and women.

Thirdly, activities for boys and
girls should be promoted. Every
boy on the farm should survey
an acre of land and tend to it
himself. He should follow the
rules required by the state offi-
cials. He will then be entitled
to participate in such movements
for their benefit and win a prize.
An exhibit should be made at the
State Fair, and all the boys in
club should be given a free trip
to this fair. At present, there
is no one who is enthusiastic over
the matter. Our Co., Supt.
hasn't advocated the cause. He
is the one who should lead these
boys. If he knows that there
are farmers' boys who want to
plant their acre, and compete for
the prize, I believe he will gladly
assist them I am a friend to
every boy and girl in the county
and will gladly answer any ques-
tion or do anything for you.
Write me and see. The girls
tomato club should be built up.
A leader should be found. All
the work should be done by the
girls and prizes should be award-
ed.

The Boy Scout Club should be
organized in every town, village
and nook of the county. It is
the best movement in America
for the betterment of the boys
at the most impressible age;
from 12 to 18. Manhood, self-
respect, and efficiency are devel-
oped. Every boy is developed
physically, and physical prepar-
edness is the essential thing to-
day. "A good turn" is done every
day by a scout, and the motto,
"Be prepared" is a motto for
everyday life. I will assist any
man who will organize the Boy
Scouts in his town, or if there
aren't 8 boys who want to join
I'll assist any boy who wants to
become a scout, and be a better
boy. There is a great deal to be
said about it, and I will answer
any letter in regard to the scout
movement. I will aid in organ-
izing the girls into the Girl Pio-
neers which is an excellent move-
ment.

Lastly, complete co-operation
should exist in the county. All
party hatred should be put aside
all bias should be forgotten.
Religious and political differen-
ces should not be in our schools
and all differences either in poli-
tics or religion should be erad-
icated forever from our school
system. Peace and harmony
should exist. A spirit of brother-
hood should prevail. We should
all work together with one end
in view, the betterment of our
county. I have no axe to grind
and those who said I advocated
the Third Class High School be-
cause I would receive some bene-
fit from it told a falsehood. I
pity their short sightedness, and
hope they will soon be broader
minded. Let us all work to-
gether and benefit our county.
