

SEE PAYS BIG INCOME TAX

Tennesseans will pay to the United States under the new federal income tax law nearly a half million dollars this year. Collector E. B. Craig has announced that the total amount of income tax from individuals in Tennessee would be \$108,792.23, and the total amount from corporations will be \$386,350.

This means that individuals in Tennessee whose incomes exceed the \$4,000 per year exemption allowed by law will pay more than \$10,000 to the United States. The individual tax is 1 per cent, and a little calculating shows that aside from the persons whose incomes are under \$4,000 per year there are a large number of Tennesseans whose combined incomes amount to \$10,379,223 per year.

The corporations also pay 1 per cent tax, with no exemptions, and the total income of the Tennessee corporations, according to the income tax records, is \$38,350,000.

A large number of these individuals and corporations have not yet paid their income tax, and unless payment is made during this month large penalties will be collected. Many Tennesseans were required to pay heavy penalties for failure to file their reports when called for.

The internal revenue office reports show many of Tennessee's income tax payers to be temporary residents of other countries. Reports came from Singapore, China; Paris, France, and Pinar and Mexico and other foreign countries.

FARMERS SHOULD APPRECIATE THE REAL OBJECTS OF SOIL CULTIVATION

Should Adopt the More Modern Cultivating Implements—Soil Cultivation Should Aid in Conservation of Soil Moisture



A more rapid, inexpensive and a more efficient method of crop cultivation than the twice-to-the-row method.

If farmers generally appreciated the real objects of soil cultivation, and would adopt the use of more modern cultivating implements than are commonly used, more crops could be made on the same soil with much less time and expense.

Every one recognizes that one object of cultivation is to kill weeds. This, however, is not the only reason. Aside from killing weeds, soil cultivation should aid in the conservation of the soil moisture by putting the ground in such condition that more water will enter in the form of rain. In addition to this, cultivation should conserve the water of the soil by keeping it loose, open in nature, and thereby prevent evaporation from the surface.

Incidentally, as the soil is made more open, a greater amount of air enters, the plants are fed better, the root system of the crops spread more freely, and at the same time the activities of beneficial soil bacteria are promoted.

In the cultivation of the soil for any of the field crops, it is not necessary to go very deep to accomplish all the above objects. In fact, it has been shown by experiments that shallow cultivation, such as may be done with harrows and small cultivators, is much more effective than the deeper plowing, such as is done with the double shovels. Not only is it more effective to cultivate shallow, but it is far cheaper to do so.


When a good seed bed has been prepared for the ordinary field crops, and the seed planted on the "level," the first cultivation may best be done with the weeder, or wide section spike tooth harrows; for these implements enable one to accomplish all that could be accomplished with a slower process, such as is usually followed. The weeder and harrows do so much more in a given length of time, and are, therefore, much cheaper to operate.

When the crops are so large that these rapid-working tools can not be used longer, cultivators doing the most rapid and most effective work should be used. Rapidity in the work can not be too strongly emphasized, and for that reason the implement that requires more than one operation to the row to give a thorough cultivation should be discarded.

The time of and the number of cultivations to give must be governed by conditions. Generally speaking, after each rain, when the soil is rapidly evaporating the moisture supply, the land should be cultivated, as we said above, to save the water. When there are weeds of any kind to kill, cultivation should be done. When the ground for any reason has become compact, cultivation should be done.

Knowing the objects of cultivation, and the fact that deep plowing is not at all essential to the profitable production of crops, and that there is real economy in the use of the shallow rapid-working implements, and that by this means we must keep a good much on the soil to accomplish one of the objects of the work, we are ready to go forward to do our June cultivation.—J. C. Pridmore, University of Tennessee.

ALFALFA CULTIVATION IN TENNESSEE

One of the serious drawbacks to the production of alfalfa is the growth of and competition with weeds of various kinds. There are both winter as well as summer weeds to bother in the growing of this very valuable hay crop. For winter pests, the chick weed and the dead nettle the most troublesome, while crab grass, rag weeds and other common weeds must be fought continuously during the summer. Often entire fields are taken possession of by the above named enemies even where every possible precaution has been taken. And it is only by persistent effort that all the fields are not overcome by them.

It is now being generally recognized that the best way to keep weeds under control is by harrowing or cultivating the crop. This work may best be done after each cutting, just as soon as the crop can be shocked or taken from the field, if the ground is not too wet. By starting the job immediately after the removal of the hay, the weeds will be easier killed or checked, since they are small at this time, having been shaded from the alfalfa.

Almost any kind of harrow will serve for this purpose, but a narrow spring tooth may be best. Where this can not be had, the spike tooth or the disk may be substituted. It is essential that the disk be used in such a way that too many of the plants are not cut off by the disks. To one who has not followed the practice before, it may seem that the cultivation is too severe for the crop, but the experience of those who follow the plan regularly shows that it is beneficial. Not only are the weeds killed or held in check, but it seems that the soil cultivation helps the following crops.—J. C. Pridmore, University of Tennessee.

TOMATO INSECTS.

The large green tomato worm, or Horn Tail, as it is commonly called, can be controlled by hand picking or spraying the plants with Arsenate of Lead at the rate of 3 pounds to 50 gallons of water. Ground which has been devoted to the growing of tomatoes should be turned deep in the fall; this will destroy any of the over-wintering forms which may be in the soil. The tomato fruit worm is the worm which bores into the tomato and eats on the inside of the developing vegetables. The self-same worm attacks corn, and is known as the corn ear-worm; also the cotton boll, in which case it is known as the Cotton Boll Worm. Tobacco is also attacked by this insect,

and is known as the Tobacco False Bud-worm. Since this insect passes the Winter as a pupa in the soil, a practical method of control is to plow the infested land late in the Fall or during the Winter. With the tomato, this insect feeds a little on the surface of the fruit; hence an application of the Arsenate of Lead will kill many of the worms before they get into the pulp of the tomato. Flea Beetles also attack the tomatoes and may be controlled by the dust or liquid form of the Arsenate of Lead.—G. M. Bentley, Tennessee Experiment Station.
