## THE HOUSE ADOPTS JOINT RESOLUTION

PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS FOR MIDDLE AND WEST.

### INTRODUCE ELECTION BILL

It Provides for About \$300,000 Increased Revenue—When a Law Collectors Will Take Place of Revenue Agents.

Nashville. The house adopted a joint resolution providing for the election of commissioners for Middle and West Tennessee on March 24. The resolution will go to the senate immediately, and it is anticipated that the upper body will offer no objection. Commissioners are to be elected to succeed Judge Sam Young, of Middle Tennessee, and Charles King of West Tennessee.

Assessment Bill. The state tax commission's assessment bill was introduced in both houses. It provides for about \$300,000 increased revenues, coming mostly from litigation fees. The measure provides for three revenue collectors to be appointed by the comptroller, at a salary of \$2,500 a year each. These collectors take the place of revenue agents.

For Rural Carriers. Rural carriers of the state are interested in a bill introduced by Senator Clement which, if enacted into law, will give them the right to vote in any one precinct along their routes or adjacent thereto, while engaged in their official duties. Many rural carriers leave their precincts before the polls are closed, and for this reason they are unable to vote. It is believed that the bill for their benefit will pass both houses without objection.

Senate Reverses Itself. Through an unexpected change of sentiment, the bill providing for interchange of judges, which was defeated in the senate by a vote of 16 to 14, was called March 12 on motion to reconsider, and passed by a vote of 21 to 4 on third and final reading. Senator Parham made an effort to amend the bill so as not to apply to Shelby county, but his amendment was tabled.

Back Pay Asked. The Shelby county delegation introduced a joint resolution in the house, providing for payment of back salary for four years, amounting to \$4,000, to Judge J. S. Galloway, for presiding over the old Second circuit court. The court has been abolished. Division four took its place. The amount is to come from the state.

Memphian Heads Woodmen. A. G. Matthews of Memphis was elected head consul by a vote of 260. His opponent for the position, J. E. Wilkes, received 86 votes. By motion made by Mr. Wilkes, the vote for Mr. Matthews was declared unanimous. The report of the credentials committee showed 382 delegates in good standing in attendance at the convention.

By Unanimous Vote. The mothers' pension bill passed the house by a vote of 83 to 0. Representative Larsen of Shelby made a strong plea for the bill, and was probably responsible for its unanimous passage.

The measure applies only to the four large counties of the state—Shelby, Davidson, Hamilton and Knox. It requires the county court to set aside at least \$4,000 a year for mothers' pensions.

Operation of the law is under the juvenile courts.

The bill permits mothers without means of support to keep their children instead of giving them up to the court. Provision is made for a pension of \$10 monthly for the first child under 16 years of age, and \$5 a month for each additional child.

It is left to the judge of the juvenile court as to whether cases are worthy.

Suffrage Measures Die. When Representative West of Knox county, champion of woman's suffrage, stepped out of the house to get a cigar, six bills giving women the right to vote in specified elections in cities and counties were killed.

It was held that woman's suffrage can only be secured by constitutional amendment. This has been provided for in a joint resolution, adopted by both house and senate, submitting an amendment to vote of the people. This resolution must also be adopted by the legislature two years hence.

### Senate Bill 555.

Mr. Hitt of Davidson county has introduced a bill which, if enacted into law, will somewhat restrict the liberties of Mrs. Hen and her chickens, which have always considered gardens, truck patches and flower beds to be their happy hunting grounds. Senate bill No. 555, of which Senator Hitt is the author and which went into the legislative hopper, makes it a misdemeanor for their owners to allow chickens to trespass upon the property of another.

### Tax Commission Recommendations.

Declaring that a new constitution is desirable before a complete and thoroughly effective reform of the tax system of Tennessee can be obtained, the state tax commission, in its report to the legislature, makes recommendations devoted to the promotion of efficiency under the present system.

"We believe public policy requires that there be a limitation of the tax rate," declares the report. "The taxpayer would not object to higher assessments if he did not fear that the same tax rate as at present was going to be maintained. There is no legal or other reason why the legislature should not protect the taxpayers of the state by limiting the total rate, not only for county purposes, but also for municipal purposes."

Named By Governor. The commission urges establishment of a permanent tax commission to have complete charge of administering tax laws. Members, one from each of the three grand divisions, would be appointed by the governor.

The first members would serve two, four and six years, respectively, and the subsequent appointees six years from the time of their appointment. The man for the long term would be the first chairman and his salary, \$4,500 a year. Associate members would receive \$4,000. The commission would be given the power to remove assessors for neglect of duty and to appoint their successors until Jan. 1 following the next regular election.

Members to Visit Counties. The commission is empowered to select a secretary at \$1,500 a year. Each member of the commission shall be required to visit at least once a year each of the counties of his grand division. Reports from the commission would be made at each biennial session of the legislature.

Assessment of property at its actual cash value is favored and abolishment of back assessment is urged. The commission is empowered to select a secretary at \$1,500 a year. O. K. Holladay of Cookeville is chairman of the tax committee and the other members are A. R. Ghoslon of Clarksville, J. W. Vanden of Jackson, Leo Goodman of Memphis, Thad A. Cox of Johnson City, George F. Milton of Chattanooga and Wallace McClure, secretary of Knoxville.

In its report the committee calls attention to the main defects in the present law, concerning which it says there is little controversy.

The committee's recommendations are devoted to the promotion of efficiency under the present system. The tax bill which the committee has drawn was submitted with the report.

It is pointed out in the report that the chief weakness of the present system is the lack of provision for a central board to direct the work of assessment.

It is the unanimous opinion of the committee that the practice of re-assessment and the inequalities of assessment cause the gravest complaint, and it is recommended that after payment of taxes the receipt then and there given shall be a finality.

The committee has found that the tax aggregate has grown slowly, despite the advances in the value of property, and that assessments are far below real value. Marked inconsistencies are shown by comparing values of different counties. Criticisms of revenue agents is withheld, but the committee feels that it would be well to abolish the system under which they operate and which has caused so much complaint.

A survey of the state is suggested and the assessment of taxes with the aid of county maps. A time limit given for the adjudication of titles in dispute is recommended and payment of taxes shall be a requisite to the establishment of claim.

After two years the holder of property under a tax title shall not be disturbed and after a receipt for taxes has been issued there shall be no re-assessment of the property for that year or previous.

No assessor shall be fully paid for his work of assessment until a certificate is issued by the tax commission that he has fully complied with the law.

Tribute to Anderson. Members of the legislature paid sincere tribute to the memory of the late Hu. C. Anderson, speaker of the senate, in joint session in the house of representatives. Speaker Hill of the senate, the successor of Senator Anderson, presided. The service was informal. There were no set speeches, no attempts at oratory it was a meeting in which the members without preparation joined in expressing extemporaneously the emotion that his loss had occasioned and in paying homely testimony to the sincerity, honesty and high character of the late speaker.

Appointed Deputy Collector. The treasury department in Washington announced the appointment of George R. Graper of Nashville, an official in the health department of Tennessee, as a deputy collector of internal revenue for Tennessee to enforce the Harrison anti-narcotic law recently enacted by congress. His salary is \$1,600 per annum with \$80 traveling expenses.

Headlight Measure Introduced. The "headlight bill," backed by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, was introduced in the house. It was framed under direction of F. V. Wright of Memphis, chairman of the legislative board of the engineers.

The measure requires an electric headlight on each locomotive operated in Tennessee, that will "reveal a man in ordinary clothing" a distance of 800 feet. The light would be in operation between sundown and sunrise.
