

Proper Food for Parrot.
Parrots in the wild state live on seed and fruit, and should, while in captivity, be fed as nearly as possible the same kind of food. They should be fed sunflower seed, hemp seed, boiled yellow corn, stale bread soaked in water, an occasional piece of apple or banana, roasted peanuts, dry crackers. Plenty of water and gravel should be kept in the cage. The parrot's cage should be cleaned every day.

Sun's Imminency.
The sun, which is by no means a large star, as stars go, could easily contain within its boundaries the entire earth and moon and the distance between them, says the Scientific American. In fact, three systems like that consisting of earth and moon could be strung out in a row through the center of the sun, without coming within 50,000 miles of his surface on either side.

EMBARGOES LIFTED BY ILLINOIS CENTRAL RAILROAD

When the Illinois Central lifted its embargoes on the movement of north bound freight from Fulton to Odin, Ill., three of the most important gateways for eastern connections through Evansville, Louisville and Indianapolis were thrown open, says the Memphis Commercial Appeal of June 6.

In addition to removing these connecting embargoes in the district between Fulton and Odin, the Illinois Central officials yesterday announced that restrictions governing the movement of cabbage to Chicago from Memphis territory had been removed and this commodity will now go forward for delivery at Chicago and intermediate points.

Officials of the Illinois Central announce that freight will be accepted for movement in car load lots via East St. Louis, except for delivery to the Southern Railway and the C. B. & Q. east and for the Wabash west. Car load freight will be handled for junction points north of Fulton as far as Odin. Freight in car loads will be handled through Louisville, Evansville and Indianapolis and between Odin and Chicago it will be accepted for the Illinois Central's own lines.

Cotton can now move over the Illinois Central through Louisville via the Detroit gateway to New England points in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railroad.

NEW YORK'S GROWTH HAS SHARP DECLINE

Washington June 5.—New York City had a population of 5,521,151 on January 2, an increase of 854,268, or 17.9 per cent. over 1910, the census bureau announced tonight. The rate of growth was smaller than ever before in the city's history except in the decade ended in 1870, when the increase numerically was smaller than in either of the two decades preceding 1910.

The latest estimate of the population of the city and county of London, made in 1917, was 4,026,901, a decrease from the official census of 1911, which was 4,521,685. Comparison of the population of New York City with that of London is declared by census bureau officials to be difficult because of the area covered by the various designations of the two cities. New York City proper covers 287 square miles, while for census purposes the city and county of London covers 116 square miles.

Boston's population is 747,923, an increase of 77,338 or 11.5 per cent. over 1910.

The increase in Boston's population was not so large as that of St. Louis, whose total population is 773,000, an increase of 111,791, or 19.4 per cent. over 1910.

St. Louis, therefore, retains its rank as fourth most populous city, and Boston will hold fifth rank, unless Cleveland, sixth city in 1910, whose population has not been announced, shows an increase exceeding 186,000 to bring its total past Boston's.

St. Louis in 10 years increased its lead over Boston from 16,500 to 25,000.
