

TENNESSEE TO AID FAMINE STRICKEN PEOPLE

Gov. Taylor has consented to head the advisory committee of the Near East Relief, which is being organized for the purpose of collecting Tennessee's quota of the 5,000,000 bushels of grain, which the farmers of America have pledged for the relief of starving orphans of Bible lands.

Hon. John H. Early, of Chattanooga, who, in conjunction with leading farmers and state officials, is engaged in perfecting a complete state organization.

"We have met with the most cordial and enthusiastic support and co-operation from all quarters," said Mr. Early, "in our efforts to organize this state upon a 100 per cent. volunteer basis, in order that every dollar's worth of corn and wheat contributed by the farmers of Tennessee shall represent 100 cents worth of food delivered to the hungry children of the Near East."

"Tennessee has never failed to do its full part in any charitable or humane undertaking and the present indications are that she will measure up to the requirements of this great opportunity of service."

"I have just received a message from Mr. Alonzo E. Wilson, national field director, which reads: 'Opening grain campaign in West Virginia. Five counties pledged five cars of corn. Five counties pledged five cars of wheat. West Virginia will raise more than its quota.'"

"If a state," said Mr. Early, "that has no surplus of grain to sell can put it over, there can be no doubt as to the outcome in the Volunteer State."

Mr. Early urges volunteer workers to communicate with him promptly at 1202 Volunteer Life building, Chattanooga.

POSTMASTER ADMITS SHORTAGE IN CASH

Postmaster J. K. Sartin, of Blytheville, Ark., was taken to Jonesboro Saturday and given a preliminary hearing on a charge of being short in his accounts as postmaster in the sum of \$2,579.99.

The defaulting postmaster was checked up by Postoffice Inspector Floyd Elliott, and found the above amount to be due. Sartin admitted that he had used the money and expected to replace it, but was unable to borrow it from the bank as he had expected.

He was held by Commissioner Mather to await the action of the federal grand jury. He furnished the required bond and was released.

HARDING UNCONCERNED ABOUT SOLDIER BONUS

President Harding, in an address to the members of the Fifth Division of the overseas army at Atlantic City, N. J., recently, practically served notice that he would not lend his tremendous power to ordinary bonus legislation, which seeks only to pay cash awards to men who were in the fighting service.

President Harding's declaration of policy regarding the country's attitude toward the war veterans, was made in a brief speech delivered from the front entrance of the Ritz-Carlton, when he was called upon to greet half a thousand veterans of the Fifth Division, who had assembled in his honor. The Fifth Division, concluding its reunion in Philadelphia, came to the shore in a special train. Learning that the president was there they immediately asked to have him greet them.

President Harding's words with regard to the bonus program came at the conclusion of his brief talk and left little doubt that as far as the Harding influence was concerned, the general bonus bill, recently pigeonholed at the president's request, is now dead. In this connection, the president said:

"The man who came back wounded and impaired in ability to carry on the vocation of his life deserves the fullest aid and assistance in our power to give, and I propose to use all the influence that I have to see that he gets it. But I am not so much concerned with those who came out of the war unimpaired. They have the compensation of supreme service and experience."

The president's speech to the Fifth Division veterans was a happy effort, despite his firm pronouncement on the bonus question.

Headquarters offices for the diocese of Tennessee were opened a few months ago in this city, being located on Church street.

HOW DO YOU SAY IT?

HOW frequently do we hear some one say, or read in a newspaper, "He is stopping at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel." A moment's reflection should tell the writer or speaker that a person does not "stop" at a hotel unless he walks or drives to the hotel and halts his progress there. It is proper to say, "The parade stopped at the hotel," meaning that the parade ceased its motion when it reached the hotel. But the parade could not "stay" at the hotel. A person makes a "stay" at a hotel, not a stop, and he stays there. One should not say, "I stopped at the summer resort six weeks," but "I stayed there six weeks."

The true meaning of the word "stop" was well understood by the man who did not invite his professed friend to visit him. He said: "If you come at any time within ten miles of my house just stop," says one authority of English.

How It Started THE REAPING MACHINE.

The first real patent on a reaping machine was granted to John Boyce of England in 1799. Richard French and J. J. Hawkins received the first American patent rights in 1803. But it remained for McCormick, in 1831, to make and demonstrate the first practical reaping machine.
