Duncan and Mr. James A. Goddard. His Seminary work was done at Lane and one of his first pastorates was over the Presbyterian church of Piqua, Ohio. During his ministry the church had a remarkable growth, and one of the most beautiful houses of worship in the state was erected and dedicated free of debt.

His next call was at St. Paul, Minnesota. While there he went as delegate to the World's S. S. Convention in London, '89. Dr. Carson was compelled to resign his work at St. Paul because of ill health and entered upon work at East Orange, N. J. His last work was done in San Francisco. He received his Doctor's degree from his Alma Mater, whom he ever cherished. He gave to our library a gift of money a few years ago, and this has been the only endowment ever bestowed upon it. One of his class mates said of him: "Physically Dr. Carson is perhaps the largest alumnus of Maryville, for he weighs over three hundred. His size fittingly indicates his largeness of heart, his general good nature, and his warm interest in every good work."

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
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
