Special Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the town council was held last Tuesday evening for the purpose of taking up the question of furnishing a site for the county building. After some discussion it was finally decided to offer the county the site of their choice. It was decided to call an election to get the expression of the people on the question of bonding the town for an amount sufficient to buy the lot. The exact date of the election has not yet been decided. By reference to another column it will be seen that the county commissioners decided to accept the offer of the town, and have selected the lot situated just south of the Fort Pierce hotel, and included under the fence of the hotel. This lot Mr. Tyler offered to sell for the purpose of the court house for the sum of \$1,500.
