

WORLD'S NEWS CONDENSED

Champ Clark has been chosen speaker of the house by the caucus of new and old congressmen.

A woman in the Minnesota State Insane Asylum has just won a prize of a trip to Europe offered by one of the magazines for the best poem. This is the second case recently where a lunatic has captured a literary prize.

It is said that the first paragraph Mark Twain wrote when he began his editorial duties with the Virginia City Enterprise was this: "A beautiful sunset made Beranger a poet, a mother's kiss made Benjamin West an artist, and \$15 a week makes us a journalist."

A resolution to withdraw from the American Federation of Labor was adopted unanimously Friday by the United Mine Workers in session at Columbus, Ohio, this action to become effective if the Federation does not admit the Western Federation of Miners to membership without restrictions.

Anticipating a bitter contest over the effort to repeal the prohibition legislation, the lower house of the Alabama legislature, after prolonged debate Friday adopted a rule forbidding anybody on the floor of the house while the body is in session, except members, employees and active reporters. This shuts out all lobbyists.

It is believed that J. Pierpont Morgan has made the proposed loan of one million dollars to Honduras, conditional upon the restoration of order there. The State Department at Washington last week again warned Guatemala that her government will be held accountable for any breach of the Washington Neutrality Convention.

That negotiations are in progress by J. P. Morgan & Co. to combine all the independent telephone companies in the United States and eventually merge some of these concerns with the American Telephone and Telegraph company, or Bell system, is admitted by a member of the Morgan firm, but he declines to permit his name to be used.

Luke Lea, a newspaper publisher of Nashville was elected United States Senator to succeed Senator J. B. Frazier, thus breaking the deadlock that started soon after the legislature convened. He only consented on the day of his election to enter the contest actively. In the final voting he received 68 votes to 48 for McMillin, who had heretofore been the leading candidate.

James E. Martine (Democrat) was elected United States Senator from New Jersey for the six year term, beginning on the 4th of March next, to succeed John Kean (Republican). The result of the joint ballot of the Legislature was forty-seven votes for Martine out of a total of seventy-nine. "Boss" Smith, who was attempting to get back into the Senate, in spite of the fight against him by Governor Woodrow Wilson, was completely routed.

Senator Stephenson, who was first elected for the senate by Wisconsin politicians as an animated dollar mark, has been charged by an investigating committee of the state senate with securing his reelection in 1908 by bribery. He expended one hundred and seven thousand dollars, according to his own report, which is more than his entire salary for his term of office. Bribery may not be proved, but this expenditure calls for a corrupt practices act in Wisconsin which would limit expenditures for election to office. The poor man run under too large a handicap.

The progressive movement in the Republican party heretofore confined to individual efforts by insurgent leaders to correct abuses in popular government, has crystallized into a party within the Republican party with a definite declaration of principles and all of the prestige and power which a united effort gives any movement. A constitution has been adopted and the following officers elected: President—Senator Bourne of Oregon. Vice Presidents—Congressman Norris of Nebraska, and Governor Osborne, of Michigan. Treasurer, Chas. Crane, of Chicago. Executive committee—Senators Clapp and Bistow and Congressman Hubbard, Lenroot Kent and George Record, and former Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot. Resolutions have been adopted declaring that popular government has been thwarted by special legislation and by the dication of platforms and caucus nominations. The League will at once enter upon an aggressive campaign. State leagues will be organized and bills, literature and speakers will be furnished. Permanent headquarters will be maintained. The articles are signed by nine senators, six governors, thir teen congressmen and other prominent men.

Senator Dunnagan of Page county has introduced a bill in the Iowa legislature permitting women to hold any office within the gift of the voters of Iowa.

A Missourian has been discovered who lays claim to the age of one hundred and twelve years. As a mere boy of sixty-two years he enlisted in the Federal army, and now has a pension of \$50 a month, which he hopes to draw for many years.

Senator Fletcher, of Florida, last Wednesday in the Senate called up a resolution which declares in effect that Secretary Ballinger is not faithful as a public official. Fletcher delivered a speech defending the resolution and scoring Ballinger.

The house committee on Industrial Arts Exposition, by a vote of nine to six, decided to report favorably a bill designating New Orleans as the exposition city to commemorate the opening of the Panama canal. An appropriation of one million dollars was also recommended by the committee for a government exhibit.

United States Senator LaFollette was formally re-elected United States Senator by the Wisconsin Legislature Wednesday, receiving a big majority. No representative in the Senate has a stronger hold on the people than LaFollette, the "original insurgent," and indications are that he will represent Wisconsin until he retires voluntarily.

A National Democratic harmony conference will be held at Indianapolis on April 12th and 13th for the purpose of preparing for the campaign of 1912. Chairman Pence of the board of directors of the National Democratic League Clubs issued the call. Plans will be launched to unite all Democrats. Prominent Democrats in all parts of the United States have been invited.

Counsel for the Atlanta Journal Company, James R. Gray, editor, and three employes, who were indicted on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government in the mailing of sample copies, filed a demurrer to the indictments Friday on the grounds that it does not show the commission of the offense charged. It is also held in the demurrer that a postal regulation cannot create a crime.

With simple ceremonies Benjamin Hooper, Republican, was inaugurated Governor of Tennessee, Wednesday. For the first time in thirty years a Tennessee governor was inaugurated outside of the hall of the House of Representatives as Hooper was inaugurated in Ryman auditorium. Hooper's parentage is unknown, he, as a baby of a few days being found on the streets of Nashville, and was raised in an orphanage.

With the hope of entrenching itself in public confidence as a militant advocate of progressive legislation the National Progressive Republican League is openly opposing the renomination of President Taft. The League hopes to strengthen the popular impression that Taft is a reactionary and in sympathy with the "Old Guard." The relation of Col. Roosevelt to the League is creating much speculation.


