of the State

The Palm Beach county school board has consolidated the Hobe Sound and Jupiter schools, thus bettering them.

It is understood that there are approximately 13,000 people in the new county which will be known as Pinellas.

The total catch of fish in Pensacola last week was more than 400,000 pounds, and consisted mostly of groupers and red snappers. The catch represented at wholesale prices nearly \$13,000.

Duval county's record for murders shows no signs of abating, the murder of W. O. Futch last Saturday night adding another violent death to the long list which stands out so prominently to the general discredit of the abilities of the authorities.

Governor Gilchrist has appointed Editor Eugene S. Matthews of the Starke Telegraph a member of the taxation commission provided for by the last legislature. The other members are ex-Governor Wm. S. Jennings and Hon. Thos. L. Clark of Monticello.

Fort Pierce, located on the Indian River, is one of the charming cities of the East Coast country. The country around and about Fort Pierce is noted for the production of pineapples and for the smooth-skinned, luscious oranges that have made the East Coast country famous.—Florida Grower.

Governor Gilchrist has sent out letters to the members of the Democratic Executive Committee residing within the bounds of the Pinellas county advising them to meet and call an election to be held on or before December 15, for the purpose of selecting officers to conduct the affairs of the newly created county.

An enthusiastic jubilee meeting was held in Arcadia Wednesday night, celebrating Arcadia's victory in the county seat removal contest which was held that morning. This means that Arcadia will remain the county seat and the new \$80,000 court house, plans for which have been accepted, will be erected there at once.

J. J. Rouse, a prominent lumber man of Cedar Grove, was shot and killed Sunday, and a man named Moody, an employe of Rouse, was wounded by a negro whom the two men had been instrumental in having arrested on a trivial charge. After the shooting, the negro escaped, but later was caught near Madison and taken to Perry, Fla., in an automobile.

General William Henry Jewell, of Orlando, Fla., and Colonel B. Wood Jewell, of Omaha, Neb., who fought on opposite sides in the civil war, had a reunion in the home of their sister, Mrs. George H. Jacobs, of 351 Summer street, this city, says the Boston Globe, of September 16, in a communication from Lynn, Mass. Yesterday was the first time in years that the two brothers and sister had met together. The arrangements for this reunion was made some time ago, and the event was looked forward to with a great deal of pleasure.

Hon. Hudson Burr, chairman of the Florida Railroad Commission, Tallahassee, writes that many complaints reach the Railroad Commissioners with reference to overcharges, at final destination, on household goods shipped from points in other states to destination in Florida by new settlers moving into this state; but he wishes to inform the public that the Railroad Commissioners have no jurisdiction to correct these abuses, because the shipments are interstate commerce and are under the jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C. Mr. Burr says he recommends Congressional legislation as a remedy for the above.

Following an operation for what was thought to be a trivial ailment, Joseph D. Price, manager of the Hotel Ormond and one of Volusia county's early residents, died in New York City Thursday afternoon. Mr. Price left Ormond a few weeks ago for New York to look after some business matters and while there have a slight operation performed. He entered a hospital Thursday and it seems the operation was more serious than he anticipated and he died a few hours after. Mr. Price came to Florida in December 1875, and took up a government homestead at Ormond, and has ever since made it his home. The late John Anderson and Mr. Price were warm personal friends from their first meeting at Ormond in 1876 until the death of the former February 19 of this year. They were associated together in the hotel business for 19 years, and most of the time were joint managers of the Hotel Ormond.

The fire department of West Palm Beach is now equipped with a modern automobile fire engine.

Jacksonville was selected as the next meeting place for the Southeastern Medical Association at the convention just ended at Hattiesburg, Miss.

W. N. Camp, who has erected an immense electric power plant near Blitch's Ferry on the Withlacoochee river, proposes to furnish the city of Tampa with light and power at about one third of what the city is now paying.

St. Johns county is to be complimented. With three men on trial for murder and all convicted, the authorities and citizens of St. Johns have established the fact that justice is still a strong feature of that part of the State. Can other counties say as much.

Letters patent have been applied for by the Southern Bank and Trust Company, a new banking institution which will soon begin business in Miami. It is stated that the capital stock of the company will be \$100,000 and the following well known gentlemen are the incorporators: J. N. Lummus, F. S. Morse, J. E. Lummus, C. L. Huddleston and T. W. Sands.

To a Jacksonville woman belongs the credit of an invention calculated to eliminate the dangers attached to the elongated hat pins now worn by the fairer sex. Letters patent have been received from the commissioners of patents in Washington by Mrs. Sallie Judson Macomber, wife of Ross A. Macomber, one of the employes in the Jacksonville postoffice, for a device that will relieve the deadly hatpin of all its terrors.

Friends of F. A. Andreu, a Bradford county man who is temporarily living at Dade City, will be glad to learn that his inventive genius has brought him good fortune. Mr. Andreu recently invented a device for planing shingles as they are sawed. The device was at once recognized as having such value that Mr. Andreu was paid \$20,000 for the patent and in addition is to receive a royalty on the machines as they are manufactured.—Starke Telegraph.

Murder in the first degree, but recommendation to the court for mercy, was the verdict returned by the St. Augustine jury in the Carlton case against Dan and Marion Carlton was guilty in second degree. This makes the life penalty sentence for each. It is improbable that they have escaped yet entirely, however, so far as danger of the death penalty is concerned, as the indictment for the murder of Abe Schneider still hangs over the three brothers, the trial ending being for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Guy White.

A deplorable accident occurred Sunday by which Joe Conrad, a wellknown young Miamian, and a son of Alderman Conrad, lost his left arm. A party of three was made up Saturday morning to go on a hunting trip up to the north end of the bay. In the party were Joe Conrad, Gilbert Totton and another gentleman. The party hunted all day Saturday and Sunday started on their return home. While returning in their boat and about opposite Lemon City, in making a shift of position, that in some way that the party cannot explain, one of the guns used by the hunters was discharged, the charge entering Mr. Conrad's left arm above the elbow, tearing away the flesh and rupturing the veins of the arm in so frightful a manner that the arm was amputated.

When the battleship Florida goes to Pensacola on the eighteenth of December to receive her silver service, a bronze tablet will be presented by the Martha Reed chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Jacksonville. This bronze emblem will be in commemoration of the late lamented United States Senator William James Bryan, of Florida, who died in office at Washington, and whose brother now represents Florida in the same capacity. A bronze tablet in memory of Senator Will Bryan will be particularly appropriate on the dreadnaught Florida because it was the request of Senator Bryan that President Roosevelt, who was most friendly with the young Florida statesman, had the fighter named for this state. The letter dictated by Senator Bryan a few days before his illness, asking that one of the new battleships which had just been ordered constructed, be named "The Florida," is one of the most eloquent pieces of literature from pen of a Floridian and the president complied with its request almost immediately.
