

The Farm. Keep the Cattle Growing. The most successful breeders of horses, cattle, sheep or swine, know from experience that although they may possess the best breeding animals, they will not be successful in producing superior stock if a continuous growth of the young animals is not kept up. In order to begin in time at this indispensable preparation for success, the brood mares, cows, ewes and sows are most carefully and suitably fed, while with young, and as soon as the young animals make their appearance they are taken the greatest care of, the dams being suitably fed while suckling, and when the young ones are weaned, they are not supposed to want for food or drink a single hour.

Fattening Hogs. A writer in the Prairie Farmer gives his experience as follows: "I was just beginning to farm, and I was desirous of knowing the best way of fattening hogs, I determined to try the different plans, and also how much pork a barrel of corn will make. I made a floored pen and covered it in. Weighed three hogs and put them in the pen. I also weighed three of the same size and put them in a dry lot—average weight, one hundred and seventy-five pounds. I fed six barrels of corn to the six hogs. They were forty days eating the corn, with plenty of salt and water. Their average gain was seventy-five pounds. The hogs in the lot gained the most. One that was fattened in the lot gained eighty-eight pounds. One in the pen eighty-four pounds; the other four were not so thrifty. These hogs were about fourteen months old when slaughtered. I put them up the 25th of October. There was a good deal of sleet and snow during the month of November, which gave the hogs in the pen an advantage they would not have had if the weather was favorable; they ate the same quantity of grain in the same time. It also showed that one bushel of corn will make fifteen pounds of pork."

Analysis of Corn Cobs. Considerable discussion has recently arisen in agricultural journals and at farmers' meetings, upon the nutritive value of corn cobs when ground and fed to animals. It is a very common practice among farmers to grind the whole ear of corn, and feed the product to milk cows, working oxen and often to horses. This plan we have adopted to a considerable extent at our own farm, but we have had some misgivings as to the utility or advisability of the practice. With the view of ascertaining as nearly as practicable the exact nutritive value of cobs, we selected a nice ear of Lakeshire corn from a bundle hanging in our counting room, and removing the kernels, subjected the cob to analysis. It gave—

Water..... 7.48
Crude fibre..... 30.95
Ash..... 1.16
Carbo-hydrates, fat and albuminoids..... 60.41
The amount of fat was not accurately determined; but it was proved to be more than one per cent. The amount of water is probably smaller than it would have been had the corn been taken directly from the grain house instead of the warm room in which it had been hanging for some weeks. The result of the analysis proves that there is in corn cobs a considerable amount of fat-producing and flesh-forming constituents. In the sixty per cent. of carbo-hydrates, albuminoids, fat, etc., are found the elements which have nutritive value. In order that we may obtain some idea of its comparative worth let us compare it with dry straw of some grain. Wheat straw contains about 30 per cent. of carbo-hydrates, 2 per cent. of albuminoids, and 1 1/2 per cent. of fat; oat straw, 38 per cent. of the first named substance, 2 1/2 of the second, and 1 1/2 of the third; rye straw, 27 of the first, 1 1/2 of the second, and 3 1/2 of the third. It is shown that cobs have a higher value than wheat or rye straw, and they equal in nutritive constituents the best quality of oat straw. These results indicate the utility of feeding them to our animals, provided there are no objections arising from the bulk and difficulty of reducing the cob to a sufficiently fine powder. It is not probable that cob-meal can be perfectly digested unless comminution is carried to an extreme point; and therefore, the finer the cobs are ground the higher the value, and the less the liability of gastric disturbance. It is certain we do not give sufficient attention to the matter of grinding any of the grains fed to our animals. They should be ground as fine as possible, in order that they may be easy of digestion, and in order that the nutritive substance may be fully utilized. There is a positive loss in feeding out coarsely-ground grains of any kind, and in grinding the cob with the corn, give special attention to the work of comminution. The
