

LOCAL MATTERS.

Our County Commissioners have fixed the rate of tax for county purposes for the present year at 100 cts. on \$100; the State tax being 17 cts., the whole rate of tax is 117—four cents more than it was last year.

Our steadily increasing subscription list is pretty good evidence that our efforts to publish a live paper are not unappreciated. But a little less selfishness on the part of some, and a more general diffusion of public spirit, would no doubt add many more to our list in the county.

By the arrangements, which were suggested by us and so promptly adopted by the Postoffice Department, our neighbors at Leonardtown are now receiving their mails early in the evening, and not, as formerly, late in the night.

The Postoffice at Duffield has been lately restored and is now in full operation. We will mail the Times to Duffield for those of our subscribers whom we know desire it to be sent to them there. To others of our subscribers in that section we will continue sending the Times to White Plains until further notified.

At Marshall Hall, on the 4th inst., all was quiet. We believe the proprietors declined to receive excursions from the city on that day and devoted their pavilion and grounds exclusively to the use of our county people. At Glymont it was quite otherwise. A large crowd came down from Washington and active fighting was the order of the day. The four officers whom Major Richards detailed from his police force to act in co-operation with the county authorities did their duty well, and although it was a downright impossibility for so small a force to enforce good behavior on the part of so large a crowd of the rowdy element, their efforts nevertheless averted serious and perhaps fatal consequences at Glymont on that day. In this connection officer Westphal, the only one whose name we have heard of, is spoken of in terms of special commendation. By all means let Glymont be attended to.

Last Friday night, as we are informed, the tank house at Bowie was entirely destroyed by fire. A spark from the engine set fire to the structure and no available effort could save it.

One day last week the residence of the Rev. Fathers who attend St. Mary's Catholic church, Upper Marlboro', was discovered to be on fire. We are pleased to be able to say that the flames were subdued before much damage was done.

**TOBACCO.** FROM RICHARDS, LEITCH & CO.'S LEAF TOBACCO. BALTIMORE, 23 July, 1873. We have to record a fair business in Tobacco during the past month.

It seems generally conceded that the crops now being marketed will be required to meet the demands of the trade. Kentucky has been dealt in to a moderate extent. Sales about 300 hds. for export, mainly of selections from the better qualities, which continue in good demand, the lower grades being still neglected. We note a continued stiffness in the interior, while reports from the "other side" present little or no encouragement to shippers. The Virginia.—The market activity and advance in Virginia has induced buyers for export and home trade to enter this market for decided grades at fair prices.

Maryland.—There has been a brisk market throughout the entire month, resulting in full sales for France, Germany and Holland. Receipts quite abundant early in the month, have fallen off, and will very likely continue small until after the grain harvesting. Ohio.—After a protracted waiting, the market has finally opened, and sales during the last fortnight have been about 2,300 hds.—1,200 for France, 1,000 for England and Bremen, and the remainder for various markets.
