The Centennial Celebration. That our Southern politicians are peculiarly obnoxious to the charge of dough-facism, every day's experience sufficiently evidences. We find too many of them ready to do honor to the "powers that be," for the sake of a few crumbs that may fall from the rich man's table. Such men as Longstreet, Mosby, Wickham, and we are sorry to say several others, belong to this disgraceful list.

Among the speakers at the late meeting in Baltimore to rob the State of Maryland in the interest of Philadelphia, we were sorry to see the name of one of Virginia's most eloquent sons, Hon. A. R. Boteler of Sheperdstown. This gentleman was in the foreign Diplomatic Corps when the "late unpleasantness" occurred; but came home and resigned, and immediately connected his fortunes with the Southern Confederacy. Soon after his departure for Richmond a body of foreign cut-throats and Yankee thieves, fresh from Washington (under orders of course), appeared before the residence of Mr. B. and demanded his surrender. There being but a small garrison in the premises, consisting of Mr. B.'s youngest daughter, fifteen years of age, she agreed to capitulate and surrender the splendid mansion with all its costly furniture, the elegant out-buildings, the stock, and the large mills connected with the property. They allowed her to take the wearing apparel which she had on, but nothing else. The furniture, such as could not be conveniently carried away, was piled in the middle of the rooms, the carpets saturated with camphene, set on fire, and all the buildings burned to ashes—Mr. B. now raises his voice in adulation of the Yankee government, the 4th of July, and Republicanism generally. Of what kind of material he can be made we know not. But we would "rather be a dog and bay the moon" than to subservise such vile purposes. If we were never so anxious to glorify this Yankee government, we would not do it in such company. We can't see how any principle can be honored by the adulations of a man who has no soul.

But have we no dough-faces in Maryland? Before the negro was dragged into the political arena the Democrats were indignant at the idea. Some of them said it would produce a war, others said they would never again disgrace themselves by going to the polls. How is it now? Some of these very Democrats beg the negro vote, and use the most dishonorable means to secure their political friendship and support. Two years ago our county was represented in the Legislature by first-class men. What kind of an appearance have we entered in that body in the present session? A wise old gentleman of Annapolis who has been familiar with the members of the Legislature for many years, on seeing our representatives this winter and comparing them with those of the last session, exclaimed, "Well, Charles is played out now. Last winter he was a first-class dough-faceme, intelligent, noble looking. Now \* \* \* and we hope never to see any more of her."

But these things are the result of Yankee government, which we are called on to glorify with our bodies and our money. When our Yankee rulers show us anything to rejoice at, we have no objection to throwing up our hat. This they can only do by hanging themselves. But we do most strenuously object to rejoicing when we feel like crying or cursing. There was a time when we felt like chanting hymns in honor of national greatness and free government, but it has been a long time between hymns, and the purpose of our life seems to be lamenting our loss in the glory of the past. And we never expect to resume our equanimity of temper in a political point of view. "When squint-eyed cats go back on rats" we may cease to curse Yankee government and Yankee ethics—and not fill them. For by their means has our country been brought down from the pinnacle of fame and admiration, until "none are so poor as to do her reverence," and of her it may be truly recorded—"sicut magni nominis umbra." TOBACCO—Receipts of Leaf, the inspections this week, which have been principally of new crop Ohio, adding up about 600 hds., but the market has throughout been quiet, though generally steady. The transactions have been principally in Maryland, of which we note sales of 150 to 200 hds., mostly new crop for export, at an average of 64¢. For Ohio and Kentucky there is some inquiry, but we hear of no transactions of importance this week in either. The French contract for the coming season, for which proposals have been invited by advertisement, will be awarded on the 13th, 15th and 17th proximo, after which an active movement may be expected in Tobacco. The contract will embrace some 30,000 hds., viz: 15,000 hds. Kentucky, 5,500 hds. Virginia, 5,500 hds. Maryland, and 4,400 hds. Ohio. The Maryland and Ohio will doubtless be purchased in this market, but the Kentucky and Virginia will, it is presumed, be bought chiefly in interior markets. The exports from this port this week add up 1,234 hds., viz: 511 hds. to Bremen, 691 hds. to Genoa, and 32 hds. to Liverpool. The market closes steady, and we quote as follows, viz:

Maryland frosted and unsound, 4 00 @ 5 00. Sound common, 5 00 @ 6 00. Good common, 6 00 @ 6 50. Middling, 7 00 @ 8 00. Good to fine red, 9 00 @ 12 00. Fancy, 13 00 @ 15 00. Upper country, 5 00 @ 20 00. Ground leaves new 4 00 @ 9 00.
