The Weather. The delightful Indian Summer is still with us—the weather dry and smoky, favorable for well curing of tobacco and gathering the corn crop, but rather unfavorable for the growth of wheat.

New Goods. Our neighbor across the street, Mr. Jos. I. Lacey, has just returned from Baltimore with a large and judiciously selected stock of goods. Of These, Too Many. It will be seen by the returns from this district that Mr. Hagner gets 241 and Dr. Henkle 143 votes, when in fact there were only 386 votes polled—there having been found in the box one more ticket than the poll books of both clerks showed ought to have been there—in other words 386 votes only were polled, whilst 387 tickets came out of the box. How this happened we do not know. But it is reported that two Hagner tickets, folded and refolded together were taken out of the box and counted separately for him, instead of both being thrown out as ought to have been done. Baltimore Market, Nov. 4, 1874.

FLOUR—City Mills Super... 4 50 @ 4 75

WHEAT—The sales include 1,000 bushels Southern white at 116@125 cents for good to prime; 2,000 bushels do. prime amber at 125; no choice offering; 5,000 bushels good to prime red at 118@125 cents.

CORN—The receipts of Southern were 1,000 bushels new white at 67@83 cents; 600 bushels old white at 85@95 cents for fly-cut and prime, and 400 bushels old yellow at 85 cents.

OATS—The market is firm, with a moderate supply. We note sales 400 bushels Southern and 1,500 do. mixed Western, both at 60 cents.

RYE—There are no sales reported to-day, and we report the market dull at 95@100 cents for good to prime.

Tobacco—The market continues very strong and buoyant for Maryland and Ohio leaf, but receipts of Maryland are very light, and the dealings in it are necessarily restricted from this fact. The few lots offering, however, find ready buyers at extreme prices. Of Ohio we note sales of some 400 lbs., part taken on speculation and part for an Italian contract, at very full prices. There is still some speculative inquiry but prices have reached such a point as to deter many from entering. In Kentucky and Virginia business is at a stand, there being no stock of either on the market, but for these varieties the market continues very strong. The exports this week from this port have been as follows, viz: 465 hhds., 901 cases to Bremen; 113 hhds., to Liverpool, 12 hhds., to Halifax; total, 591 hhds., and 901 cases. Prices are considerably higher for all descriptions, and we now quote as follows, viz:
