DEMOCRATIC Conservative Primary Meetings.

In pursuance of the recommendation of the State Central Committee, at a meeting held in Baltimore on Thursday, the 29th of May, 1881, the Democratic Conservative voters of Charles county are requested to assemble in primary meetings at the usual places of holding the elections, in the several election districts.

On Saturday, June 18th, between the hours of 4 and 6 P. M. for the purpose of selecting ten delegates for each election district to represent them in a County Convention, to be held in Port Tobacco on Monday June 20th, 1881, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

On Thursday June 23d, 1881, which Convention will be charged with the duty of nominating a candidate for Comptroller of the State Treasury, and to appoint a State Central Committee to serve for the next two years.

No delegation, representing any meeting held in any other town, in the County, is to be admitted to enter the County Convention by order of the State Central Committee for Charles County.

Resignation of Capt. Page. Capt. H. Claggett Page has resigned his seat in the Board of County Commissioners. The immediate cause of this action on the part of Capt. Page, was a disagreement in the board upon a question which arose in the auditing of the account of the Register of Wills. It seems that Capt. Page had doubts of the propriety of some of the items charged in that account, and moved that the question of their allowance be referred to the attorney for the Board, with instructions to make a thorough examination of the bill bearing upon the question, and report to the next meeting of the Board. This motion was lost, Messrs. Bean and Page, the two Democrats, voting in the affirmative, and Messrs. Miller, Chappeler and Wright, the Republicans, voting in the negative. Thereupon Capt. Page announced his purpose to resign, and immediately left the chamber. We did not make any report of this last week, hoping that the friends of Capt. Page would prevail on him to reconsider his determination before sending his resignation to the Governor, but we understand that he would not yield to their persuasions. While it must have been known to Capt. Page, when he entered the Board, that he would be a minority member, and subject to be overruled by the combined vote of the Republicans; and, therefore, we cannot approve his action; still it cannot be said that the cause was a slight one. An investigation into the lawful authority of the Board to allow claims against the county, by the legal adviser of the Board, should always be in order, and it is very difficult to see what justification the majority of the Board can offer for their refusal to do so.

Dr. Chancellor's Lecture. On Tuesday next, Dr. C. W. Chancellor, sec'y to the State Board of Health, will visit our town and deliver a lecture in the Court House on a question of vital importance to our people generally and our town particularly, namely, "Malaria, and how to prevent its evil effects." We trust that the doctor may have a large audience and one on whom his words will make a lasting impression and have the effect of causing them to arouse from their lethargical state and do something to prevent the increase and force of this dread miasm. The doctor has been making a tour of the State and has lectured in every county town and framed local boards of health in every county for the purpose of promoting public health. That this course on the part of the State is a wise and beneficial one, there can be no doubt, and we only hope that the boards already appointed and the one that we shall have will exert themselves to the utmost to do the work designed for them. We could hope that the doctor might have seen our town present a more healthful appearance on his visit, for we feel sure, that when he enters Port Tobacco, he will think that his subject has been most appropriately chosen. Why did not our town fathers wake up to this fact and go to work and cause our town of all its impurities. It is not too late yet, so we trust they may put a force to work in this good cause immediately. The taxes collected for this corporation, we should suppose, were amply sufficient to keep the streets and undergrounds from the limits of the town. If this be done it will be a great stride in the right direction.

Dr. R. J. R. Nally.

Editor of the Port Tobacco Times.—Dear Sir—To-day we hurried Dr. R. J. R. Nally, of Franklin county, Mo. Dr. Nally came from Charles county, Md., when a young man. He was twice married, first to Miss Gregory, who lived but a few years after her marriage and left at death one child, a son. In December, 1867, Dr. Nally married a Miss North, of Grays Summit. By this marriage he had four children, two of whom have died, and surviving are a girl of twelve years and a boy of ten. We feel inclined to write many things of Dr. Nally, but your space may not permit a lengthy obituary. I knew the Doctor intimately for sixteen years. He was a gentleman and a Christian. There was never a more faithful friend, genial and sincere. As a Christian, he was loved and honored by the Church; as a neighbor and citizen, he was respected by all. He died as a true Christian dies, confident of salvation through Christ and an inheritance in heaven. He had many acquaintances and kindred among the readers of your paper. This note from a stranger is to let them know that Dr. Nally was loved and honored by us, and that he left the record of a good Christian life. He was 56 years of age.
