Ex-Congressman Chalmers is reported to be so angry at the failure of the Democrats in the House to keep him from being ousted, that he says he is going back to Mississippi to organize an independent party. This is the way independent and "reform" parties generally originate—in the personal disappointments and resentments of politicians.

Ex-Congressman Smalls, a South Carolina negro, has been refused accommodations at the Revere House in Boston. And yet Boston is asserted to be, by Messrs. Hoar and Dawes the natural home of civil equality. If such a thing had been done in Richmond, bloody shirt signals would have been hung out in every city of the North.

In the Senate a petition was presented from Mrs. B. Bassett, of Virginia, offering to sell the government the family Bible of George Washington. The bill for an extension of a steam grain-shovel patented to a long debate. A bill was passed to pay Mordecai & Co., of Baltimore, \$929 illegally collected on their vessels.

In the House the bank charter extension bill occupied most of the session, several amendments being voted down.

Politics and religion—that is, Republican, Greenback and Independent politics and religion—appear to be a hopeless failure. The Reverend Gilbert de la M., the Reverend Dr. Felton and the Reverend J. Hyatt Smith all appear to have found that their call to politics was not a genuine call from the Lord. The Reverend J. Hyatt Smith is honest enough to say that he is tired of the whole business, and at the expiration of his term means to go to preaching to Vermont sinners.

Gov. Hamilton's banquet came off at the Carrollton Hotel in Baltimore city, on Wednesday evening, as previously announced. It was attended by a number of O. L. D.'s in different parts of the State, but none of the invited guests from outside of the State were present. There was a number of the O. L. D.'s paid \$10 each for the information that their "reform" movement has not created much of a stir, or elicited any very great amount of approval either outside or inside of the State.—They are not the heroes that they thought they were, and it is worth \$10 apiece to them to know it.

The bill creating an executive department of agriculture has passed the House of Representatives by a large majority.—It provides that the department of agriculture shall be an executive department under the supervision and control of a secretary of agriculture, who shall be an experienced and practical agriculturist, and establishes departments of agricultural products, of animal industry, of lands and statistics. Its advocates contend that properly conducted the new department will be of incalculable advantage, particularly to agriculturists.

It is commonly understood that the river and harbor bill for the next fiscal year contains more than the usual items of appropriation for creeks and mudholes in the interior sections of the country, but no adequate provision is contained in it for the improvement of the Potomac river. The Potomac river, one of the finest natural water-courses of the United States runs almost at the foot of the Capitol building in which the lawmakers of the country are assembled. A few days ago the President of the United States and several members of his cabinet, while sailing on the Potomac in Mr. Bennett's yacht, were run fast into the mud within the corporate limits of the city of Washington. This noble and historic stream, whose broad and deep waters were the pride of our ancestors, is drying up, when a tithe of the amount that is usually wasted on shallow inlets would rescue and preserve it.

The Richmond Whig publishes the following special dispatch from Washington, which it says is "an authentic source, entirely reliable, and that cannot be impeached."

"In view of the public declaration from Congressman Deszendorf to the effect that President Arthur was not giving his liberal support to Gen. Mahone and the liberal movement in Virginia, we are authorized to state from an unimpeachable source that President Arthur stated to Mr. Deszendorf on Friday last that he heartily sustained Gen. Mahone, and that he intended to fully support the liberal movement in Virginia to the extent of his power, and that Mr. Deszendorf need not expect any support or encouragement from his administration in his war against coalition. The Secretary of the Navy also stated to Congressman Deszendorf that he need not expect any consideration from his department."

The long-continued rains have caused a rise in the rivers in all parts of the country, and in some sections serious damage has been done. There is a great flood in the White river, and the region in the vicinity of Jacksonville, Ark., has been visited by the most destructive overflow that has been known in that section for years. The whole country in and around the town is almost wholly overflooded. Great damage has been done to crops and property. And even worse conditions prevail at Batesville, Ark., where the rivers and creeks have been swelled to a height never known before. The floods sweeping every thing before them. Hot Springs, Ark., is also flooded, and that place and Crutkin City have been cut off from the rest of the world by the overflow. Great damage was done to the Hot Springs Railroad and to all description of property. The loss to crops in the vicinity of Conway county alone is estimated at \$100,000. Wareham, Mass., and Portsmouth, N. H., have been visited during the last few days by storms of exceptional severity, accompanied by hail and snow.

Meeting of the Immigration Society.

The Immigration Society met on Tuesday, after court. The President, R. H. Edelen, Esq., in calling the meeting to order, urged upon the people assembled the importance of giving practical encouragement to the measure by subscribing to its stock. He announced his readiness to invest as much in the stock of the association as anybody else, and stated that unless some reasonable encouragement was given to the measure in the near future, he should sever his connection with it.—Hon. Daniel R. Magruder who was present, was then, by resolution invited to address the Society, which he did to some length and in a most practical and entertaining manner. The Judge, after reviewing the many advantages of location, climate, facilities and resources possessed by our country, alluded to the fact that in the provisions of Alsace and Lorraine, which were taken from France and annexed to the German Empire at the termination of the Franco-Prussian war, there are a large number of people, chafing under the oppression of the German conquerors, and who are contemplating emigrating to America in search of agricultural homes. Meeting of the State Central Committee.

The Democratic State Central Committee met in Baltimore at noon on Wednesday. The following members from the various counties and Baltimore city were present: Hon. A. P. Gorman, chairman; James A. L. Calvert, Charles, Dorchester and Garrett were the only counties not represented. The object of the meeting was to arrange for primaries and conventions to nominate candidates for Congress and the judiciary whose terms of office expire this year. Primaries were ordered to be held uniformly throughout the State on September 27th. The city and county representation in the fifth congressional district convention has not been changed.—An effort was made to adhere to the old ward system of primaries and to increase the city representation in the fifth district convention, but both attempts failed.—The time and place for congressional and judiciary nominating conventions were set as follows:

For congressional conventions: First district, Eastern, October 3; second, Westminster, October 4; third, Broadway Institute, September 28th; fourth, China Hall, Baltimore, September 28th; fifth, Upper Marlboro, October 3rd; sixth, Cumberlan, October 12th. For judiciary conventions: Second circuit, Chestertown, October 11th; third, Harford, October 10th; fourth, Cumberland, October 5th; fifth, Elkton City, October 10th; sixth, Frederick, October 5th; seventh, Upper Marlboro, October 3rd; eighth, time and place in Baltimore to be named hereafter.

It was decided that the primaries should be held strictly in accordance with the new registration of voters, and under the law of the late session of the General Assembly regulating such elections. In Baltimore city this act legalizes primary elections and provides the same punishment for violations as at regular elections. The resolutions adopted also declare it to be the right of every candidate to be represented in the polling room during the voting and counting afterwards.

Senator Gorman delivered a stirring address to the committee, in which he frankly and courageously confessed the differences which have undoubtedly existed in the party, and at same time showed clearly how little real foundation they have. The committee also prepared an able address to the voters of the State, which will give in full next week, in which they give a conclusive answer to the carping criticism to which the party management has been persistently subjected, and a recital of real achievements for reform, economy and good government, of which the dominant party of any State might well be proud.

Assassin Giteau Must Hang. Although the current report of a disagreement among the judges of the District Supreme Court in regard to the use of Giteau case has been credited, there is a good reason for believing that it was wholly erroneous. The Washington Post of Monday makes the following positive statement: Chief Justice Carter and Judges MacArthur, Hagner and James held a consultation on Saturday summing up the arguments of counsel in the application of Giteau for a rehearing of the case. The consultation lasted during four hours, and was marked by the most searching examination of authorities and the most vigorous analysis of every point made in the arguments. The judges were in thorough harmony all decision, not for one minute differing in the general steps by which the decision was reached, although of course each judge had his individual opinion on the various points of law and their application. The decision will be announced probably delivering it. The decision affirms the sentence of the court below, and of course overrules the exceptions. This disposes of Giteau's last chance. He will be hanged June 30th, 1882.

A stout-looking young fellow, who bore a marked resemblance to a thoroughbred tramp, was put up to the highest bid in front of the court-house at Richmond, Ky., last Monday, and sold under a charge of vagrancy into slavery for one year. He brought only \$1, and the Brooktown auctioneer found it hard to reach that point. Had the vagrant not bid fifty cents for himself, and gotten up a sort of rivalry, he would most likely have been knocked off at forty-five cents. Mr. William J. Collins was the purchaser, and said he would set the poor fellow to work on the railroad. Bring on some more tramps.

The Farmers' National Bank of Annapolis, Md., has asked to be discontinued as a United States depository on the 1st prox., for the reason that the price of bonds which it is required to deposit in the Treasury as security for public money is so high and the rate of interest thereon so low, that there is too little profit in continuing as a depository.

Proceedings of Congress. THURSDAY. In the Senate a bill was passed authorizing corporations for insuring titles to real estate in the District of Columbia to continue perpetually instead of for twenty years, as at present. Mr. George concluded his speech against the bill for intermediate courts. Mr. Morgan also opposed the bill, and said that it had been whispered around that the President, in order to secure the passage of the bill, had promised to appoint Democrats to some of the eighteen judgeships provided by the bill. Being pressed upon the Republican side, Mr. Morgan said he did not make the statement as a fact, but as a rumor. An amendment was adopted, on motion of Mr. Davis, of Illinois, providing more explicitly that the jurisdiction of the Circuit Court shall be neither enlarged or abridged by the bill. After an ineffective effort to dispose of the bill, unanimous consent was secured for a final vote upon it on Friday.

In the House a bill was reported from the committee on education and labor to aid in support of common schools. It provides that for the next five years there shall be annually appropriated the sum of \$10,000,000 to aid in the support of free common schools, which amount shall be known as the common school fund, and which shall be apportioned to the several States and Territories according to the number of their illiterate population over ten years of age. An amount not exceeding 3 per cent. of the sum appropriated may be used for the education of teachers in public schools. The House further debated the Geneva award bill, which re-establishes the right of the commissioners of Alabama claims, etc.

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In the Senate Mr. Mahone introduced a bill authorizing the construction of public buildings at Lynchburg, Harrisonburg and Abingdon, Va. The bill providing for an intermediate court of appeals was passed—yeas 32, nays 18. The Senate then adjourned until Monday.

In the House Mr. Hoblitzel, rising to a question of privilege, asked to have investigated the conduct of the clerk of the committee on claims in allowing an anonymous letter to be placed on file reflecting on him (Mr. Hoblitzel). The conference report on the fortification appropriation bill was agreed to. The Geneva award bill was also passed. An effort was made on the Republican side to take up the national bank charter bill, but the Democrats refused to vote, leaving the House without a quorum. The House then adjourned.
