There are a large number of people in Buffalo, N. Y., who voted for Grover Cleveland for sheriff, for mayor, for Governor and for President, and in each case they succeeded in electing him.

Among the gloomy remarks made since the 4th of this month, that of Mr. Gorham, addressed on Friday to ex-Senator Conkling, is noteworthy.

In reply to an inquiry sent to Mr. Geo. Wm. Curtis by a government employe, Mr. Curtis writes as follows: "I have your letter of the 12th. There is no doubt that Mr. Cleveland will encounter a tremendous demand for a clean sweep."

Senator Brown, of Georgia, in a speech at Atlanta said that the 6,000,000 colored people in the Southern States give those States about thirty-seven Representatives in the House and thirty-seven members of the Electoral College.

Rev. Henry Ward Beecher attended the meeting Thursday evening of the Brooklyn Independent republican committee of one hundred, held to decide whether the committee should disband or continue as a permanent organization.

President Cleveland's Policy.

Now that the election of Governor Cleveland to the Presidency has been conceded, the Republican journals are busy themselves as to what will be the President's policy with regard to the civil service, and to what extent he will rotate the present clerical employes of the Government out of office and fill their places with Democrats.

Some of the Republican papers express the fear and the belief that President Cleveland will make the same sweeping changes among the government employes as is said to have been first inaugurated by President Jackson, and afterwards followed upon the accession of the opposition party to power.

This latter seems to be the better opinion and it does not seem probable that any very extensive changes among the subordinate clerical and other civil service of the government will be made by the coming Democratic administration.

It was the operation of this law which gave to the 100,000 federal office holders a greater independence during the recent campaign and rendered it more difficult for the Republicans to obtain the usual corruption fund from that source.

It was the attitude of the Democratic party upon this question and the record of Gov. Cleveland as a civil service reformer that drew to the Democratic ticket the support of Hon. Geo. Wm. Curtis, the President of the United States Civil Service Reform Association, and his influential following here before a stalwart Republican.

It cannot be denied that the support of Mr. Curtis and the independent Republicans was a necessary element of Democratic success, and while the President elect is under no pledge whatever to Mr. Curtis or any one else, it is not probable that he will wholly disregard the views of that element of his support.

All the indications, therefore, point to the fact that the principles of civil service reform will be fully recognized and in good faith carried out by the coming Democratic administration. While changes of course will have to be made in all the heads of bureaus and the incumbencies of the more responsible trusts, because the Democratic party, being responsible for the administration of the government, must have the offices of trust in the hands of its own agents; and while many changes will doubtless be made by the discharge of many incompetent and superannuated clerks who have gotten into office under corrupt Republican rule, still there is little doubt that the more competent and faithful of the present subordinate clerical officers will be retained at their work by the Democratic administration.

The Man Who Conducted the Democratic Campaign—Compliment to a Maryland Senator.

The canvass of the vote of this county for presidential electors was concluded Saturday night, though a few votes were changed, the grand result remains the same. The thirty-six electoral votes were divided as follows: For Mr. Cleveland, 21; for Mr. Blaine, 15.

The result of the official canvass in the State of New York shows that the claim of the Republican Executive Committee, which was immediately prompted by Mr. James G. Blaine personally, to the effect that there had been certain irregularities in the election which would give the State to Blaine, had not the slightest foundation in fact.

Historic Close Votes.

As early as 1824, in the contest between Adams and Jackson, there was a difference of only 109 in Maryland's vote on these two candidates in favor of Adams.
