The Democratic State convention, which met in Baltimore on Wednesday, nominated J. Frank Turner, comptroller, and Spencer C. Jones, clerk of the Court of Appeals, without opposition for re-election.

The Hon. E. John Ellis, of Louisiana, has accepted an invitation from the Virginia Democratic State executive committee to participate in the political canvass now in progress there.
