Let us Rally.

The Congressional campaign throughout the State is now in full operation. In every district the Democrats are working in harmony and unity to hold the prestige of their old time majorities.

In this state of affairs it behooves us of the fifth, which has until recently been regarded as the other Republican district of the State, to be on the alert.

But we do not believe that any discreet Democrat, who recognizes the great importance of the approaching election and the issues involved, can remain apathetic or fail to put himself on record at the polls.

Every indication points unerringly to that conclusion and it requires no sage or prophet at this time to make such a prediction.

It is true the Republicans of the district have not made an especially strong nomination and that the action of their convention indicates an apathy born of a former hope among their leaders in the upper counties who own the "barrels."

Every view of the situation points unequivocally to the necessity of vigilant activity on the part of the Democrats of the fifth district.

Let us therefore rally again around the old standard and let every Democrat, this fall as heretofore, convert himself into a committee of one to see that every Democratic vote is polled at the ensuing election.

Circumstances Alter Cases.

It may be pardonable and even plausible for Mr. McComas to be preaching high tariff as a campaign issue to the miners of Allegany county, because, however mistaken they may be, there is a kind of obscure feeling existing among mining and other skilled laborers that their wages are improved and they are thereby benefited by the heavy tax imposed upon agricultural people and consumers generally in the way of high tariff duties upon the products of mines and mechanical industries when imported into this country from abroad.

That a protective tariff upon imports was a burden upon the agricultural people of the country was conceded by Mr. Clay and the founders of the protective system; but they were appealed to bear this burden for a time, until infantile domestic manufacturing industries might be built up and placed on such a footing as to enable them to compete with the foreign manufactures.

The effrontery of politicians who preach to the colored agricultural laborers that it is their interest to vote for the continuation of a tax which compels them to pay from 40 to 50 per cent. more for the clothes they wear and almost every article of merchandise they buy, in order to increase the wages of skilled laborers in the North and East, is therefore manifest.

Every indication points unerringly to that conclusion and it requires no sage or prophet at this time to make such a prediction. It is of the highest importance for the complete success of Democratic policy that our majority in the next Congress should be as large as possible—increased rather than diminished.

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The Duty of Democrats.

To Hotel Keepers and Others who Deal in Liquors. FOR THE INFORMATION OF ALL PERSONS CONCERNED, the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1865, is published:

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for any person, firm or corporation, to sell, or to cause to be sold, any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the days of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of this State.

SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence, one-half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commissioners, for the use of public roads.

BETTING ON ELECTIONS. The attention of persons who are always in the habit of enforcing their opinions upon the result of elections, by proposing to bet, is called to the following section Article 32 of the Code of Public Law of this State:

SECTION 47. Any person offending against the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Circuit Court, of the offence committed in any county, or in the Circuit Court of Baltimore, and on conviction, shall be fined a sum not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the School Fund.

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
