War Taxes.

The favorite idea of the Randall school of so-called Democrats, which happily for the country is very small, is to urge the abolition of the internal revenue system of taxation on liquors and tobacco on the ground that these taxes are essentially what are known as "war taxes."

But the fallacy of this argument is made easily apparent. The motive of the Randallites in urging the repeal of the internal taxes is, by depriving the government of the large revenue from this source, to so reduce the surplus revenues as to blind the people in some measure to the extortion of the present war rates of tariff taxation, which their local monopolies are anxious to maintain.

Conceding that the internal taxes and the tariff taxes to the extent that they exceed the ante bellum rates, are equally war taxes, then the spirit of the platform would at least require that reductions in these two branches of taxation should be equally and correspondingly made.

The Virginia Democratic convention last week fell into the Randall fallacy in the make-up of its platform, for which it receives the following well timed censure from that staunch Democratic journal, the Philadelphia Record: "The tariff resolution, while pretending to favor reduction of duties, is a tricky evasion, borrowed from one of Randall's Pennsylvania platforms. This species of double dealing on a great question of public policy is indignantly repudiated by the Democrats everywhere in Virginia."

The Tobacco Market

The transactions in Maryland tobacco do not yet show that decided advance in values which is naturally expected to follow the heavy advance of Western tobaccos. The Sun's market reports state that there is a better demand and improvement in prices in Maryland tobacco, in sympathy with the advance in Western tobaccos; but the figures quoted do not show any very material advance upon former figures. A decided improvement in the market for the Maryland product must inevitably take place in sympathy with the general advance; but the increase of values in Maryland may be slow and steady.

Southern Maryland Marl.

There is known to be a heavy sub-stratum of marl underlying the greater portion of our lands in Charles county, which outcrops on the surface in many places and is generally encountered by well diggers in their operations. The chemical nature of these deposits and their availability as fertilizers have never been fully settled, either by experiment or analysis; but there has more than once directed attention to the matter and suggested the importance of more careful experiments and analyses in that direction.

Senator Everts is thought to have made an excellent investment when he purchased a number of Maryland's broad acres in Prince George's county. It transpires that his recent acquisition is in the heart of a section rich in marl deposits. Prof. Cook, of the Howard University, has just returned from a visit to the farms along Picaulaw creek, where he was sent by geological survey to establish the lines of the green sand beds which also abound that section. The professor speaks enthusiastically of the result of his researches. He found a green sand in large quantities at the Howard farm, which is situated about two miles north of Marlborough.

The Constitutional Centennial.

LOW RATES TO PHILADELPHIA VIA PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD.

The celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States, to be held in Philadelphia, September 15th, 16th and 17th, promises to be one of the most interesting events that ever occurred in this country, and will rank second only to the great Centennial of 1876.

A large number of troops of different States will doubtless participate in the military feasts which were arranged before on a civic occasion. The industrial display is expected to be the finest and most comprehensive ever seen in this city, and the commensurate services, rendered over by the Chief Magistrate and addressed by Mr. Justice Miller of the Supreme Court, will be the most imposing ceremony of the general plan.

The 15th of September is assigned for a professional industrial display. The display, moving in long procession, and mounted upon cars prepared for the purpose, and accompanied by the various bands and regiments, promises to be a feature of brilliant and historic interest in the evening of that day the Governor of Pennsylvania, as he will hold a public reception in honor of the Governors of the State and Territories present at the celebration.

The 16th of September is assigned for the military and naval regiments, and companies of the militia of the several States and Territories, accompanied by their respective Governors and staffs and detachments from the army and navy of the United States, detailed for that occasion. From the returns already received the commission expects the presence of troops to the number of 100,000.

The 17th of September is devoted to the special services of the regiments, and companies of the militia of the several States and Territories, accompanied by their respective Governors and staffs and detachments from the army and navy of the United States, detailed for that occasion.

The weather report bulletin of the signal office has the following: "Reports for the week ended August 6 indicate that the weather has been favorable in the west portion of the cotton region, from central Alabama to Texas; but from Alabama eastward the rain has been greatly in excess, probably resulting in injury to growing crops in the low lands. Numerous showers occurred in Minnesota, Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Northwest Missouri and Northern Kansas, improving the condition of growing crops in those sections. But the drought continues in the corn States east of the Mississippi, resulting in serious injury to all growing crops. The weather in New England and the Middle Atlantic States is generally reported as unfavorable, the weather retarding harvest and injuring grain, hay and potatoes near the coast, while the conditions are reported as favorable to corn in these districts. An excess of sunshine and temperature, combined with a slight excess of rain-fall in Kentucky and Tennessee during the past week, has probably improved the condition of the tobacco crop."

Advices from Europe report that the Hon. James G. Blaine has supplied his wardrobe with an abundant stock of English and Scotch cloth during his visit to those countries. As there are no tariff duties to pay over there, these goods are obtainable at about one-third less expense than in tariff ridden America. Doubtless the Maine statesman, the unrelenting advocate of "protection," did not intend that this exercise of his thrift economy should be made known on this side, for it will not put him in any better favor with his protectional friends over here.

It was thought that Hon. Robert M. McLane, United States minister to France, who arrived in New York Sunday, would proceed immediately to Washington, but contrary to expectation, he went down to Narragansett Pier, and is the guest there of his brother, Mr. Alan McLane. Mr. McLane will probably run on to Washington the latter part of the week after he has thoroughly recovered from the fatigue of his sea voyage.
