The Fly Among Cattle. Dr. W. H. Wray, State veterinarian and chief inspector of Maryland, has been investigating the fly that is now troubling cattle to such an extent that some of them die. He says: "The fly of this fly we do not yet know, but it seems to be a cross between the Western cattle pest, known as the Buffalo gnat, and the common house fly. It looks much like the latter, but is smaller and trimmer, and looks as if it might be the 'thoroughbred' of the family. We have sent specimens to the entomologist at Washington to be examined and named. The fly lights on the heads of horned cattle about the base of the horns. We have found a simple and effectual remedy. It is to dampen the beasts heads with water and then to apply Perma Rose Insect Powder. This had better be done in the morning before turning the cattle out. The fly does not seem to bother horses. It made its appearance about three years ago.

Circuit Court. The intermediate July term of court convened on Monday with his honor Judge Stone on the bench. The docket was called over and judgment entered in uncontented cases. All cases that were to be tried were postponed until the November term, there being no one to appear on either side of the court, lawyers or litigants to bring to trial any cases that are on the docket and the arrangements for postponement was highly satisfactory to all parties. The court rendered its decision in the insolvent case of Gibbons, that was argued a few weeks ago, refusing to discharge the insolvent debtor. Court adjourned to meet on Monday, August 5th, to hear argument as to the disposition of the funds held by the trustee of the insolvent firm of Oswald Brock. The term lasted about three hours most of the time, however, being spent in preliminaries and the real business of the court occupied but little more than an hour in its disposal, thus keeping up our record for short intermediate sessions.

Case Disposed of. The complaint of two colored women, Lucinda and Susan Johnson, against Purser J. P. Garrett, of the steamer Wakefield, because the latter refused to let them have state rooms on the vessel, was disposed of in the police court in Washington yesterday afternoon, by building the defendant under bonds for the amount of the grand jury. Mr. Garrett, who is a well known and successful merchant and her sister have state-rooms because they were colored; that he refused them first in an indirect way by saying that all the rooms were engaged, and afterward informed them that they were colored people he could not let them have the rooms. He claimed that when he refused them the state-rooms the boat was outside the jurisdiction of the District of Columbia. Mr. Ridley, general manager of the company, testified that the plaintiff called at his office and complained about the way she had been treated by Purser Garrett in not allowing her a state-room, and demanded that she be given \$1,000 or she would sue the company. This he refused to do.

Our Result. We regret to learn of the financial embarrassment of Mr. Henry G. Robertson, who for a number of years past has been doing business at La Plata, and we hope that he may be able to recover from the strait into which he has been forced by the mismanagement of the time and will again resume business. Mr. Robertson applied for the benefit of the insolvent law on Monday and on that day filed a list of his debtors and creditors and L. A. Wilmer, Esq., has been named as preliminary trustee. Mr. Robertson's embarrassment will be heard with regard to the numerous friends throughout the county and will be the sympathy of all our people. The inability of farmers to meet their obligations and the difficulty experienced by merchants in collecting, are the chief reasons for Mr. Robertson's assignment, and all who do business with our farmers at this time will readily understand how difficult it is to meet obligations while depending upon them for the wherewithal to do. It is a natural result of the low price of farm products and the losing business farmers generally are engaged in, and those who are forced to the wall in consequence deserve the sympathy of all.

Sanitary Suggestions. Dr. Chancellor, Secretary of the State Board of Health, recently issued some excellent sanitary advice to the people of Maryland, as follows: Every household, whether rich or poor, should give personal attention to the cleanliness of his or her house, especially to the cellar and yard. Health is too important a thing to be entrusted to subordinates. Allow no dark filthy corners to exist inside or immediately in connection with your dwelling. Burn all infamable refuse or rubbish, and send away as garbage such as you cannot burn. Do not keep vegetables, fruit or dirty things in sitting rooms or bedrooms. All floors should be constantly removed, and all carpets allowed to remain in the house or yard. Buy all putrefying material as soon as possible, and keep it well covered with lime until it is buried. Keep your windows, doors, furniture, traps and passage clean. Don't spare soap and water or whitewash. Let no rubbish or dirt be removed near your house, but clear it away at once and be especially particular not to let any decayed vegetable remain in the house, as they give off a poisonous gas, which induces fever; in fact any bad smell, either from drains or decaying matter, may bring fever.

Local Brewities. Dr. F. B. Adams and family, of Baltimore, were on a short visit to his father in Nanjemoy last week. G. Ernest Hamilton, Esq., of Washington, paid a short visit to his sisters at "Prospect Hill" this week. "Count" Wm. Hamilton, whose sickness we noted last week, has recovered his usual good health and now goes about as usual. The Hon. (?) Syd was in town on Monday and was as usual severely buzzed by the impatient faithful who are always "waiting and watching."

Dr. J. T. Diggs had his horse badly gored by an ox in Port Tobacco on Saturday. The animal while not seriously hurt will be rendered unfit for use for some time. Miss Lizzy and May Mitchell started yesterday for an extended visit to friends in Northumberland county, Virginia. We wish them bon voyage and a pleasant time. Miss Cornelia G. Carpenter and Frederick Croft were married at the home of the bride near Pledge, on Wednesday week last, by Rev. J. E. Poindexter. We extend congratulations.

We regret to learn of the serious illness of Miss Lida Jenkins in Baltimore of typhoid fever. We noted a few weeks ago the visit of the young lady to friends in that city, and after being there a few days she was stricken with the disease from which she is now recovering. We hope for her speedy recovery.

And the End is Not Yet.

After a full week of clear and warm weather our people had begun to congratulate themselves that the severe rainstorms which have afflicted them during this year were about at an end, and that for awhile at least we had a cessation of these destructive storms. But on Saturday we were visited with another which for severity and damage was nearly equal to any of its predecessors. The storm came up from the West about 2 o'clock p. m., and, while not general throughout the county, wrought great destruction in its track. The rain which it fell the heaviest, came down in a crashing, dashing, driving down-pour, the fall varying from 50 minutes to upwards of two hours in the different sections which it visited. Lands were washed, crops destroyed and the roads damaged to an extent that is simply alarming and from which in our present depressed condition, it will be hard to recover. The runs were swollen and strong and travelling was difficult and dangerous. On low lands much of the wheat was washed away and what was not so destroyed was almost ruined by the collection of water around the shocks. Out cultivated hillsides of crops of corn and tobacco were washed out of the ground and came to the low lands in many places, leaving nothing but deep gullies and slides where before had been the growing crops. All this is discouraging and distressing to our sorely pushed farmers and we can well enter into their feelings as they saw the result of their labor and energy swept away in an instant, as was the case in very many instances in the track of the storm the road beds are in a condition that is deplorable. The work of months is gone and much more will have to be again done over before travelling can be made safe in many places. This is the case in our own immediate section and we speak knowingly of the matter here and have heard similar reports from the other sections where the rain fell, though, as before stated, the rain was not general and many sections escaped this destruction. We hope our people will be able to stand the burden very well called upon to bear though it does seem that they have had sufficient calamities this spring to almost entirely crush the energy from them.

The Wheat Crops. The shipping of the new wheat crop in this county has progressed far enough to form any true indications of the nature of the yield though the general opinion among farmers seems to be that it will not be by any means full one. Some of the few who have been well satisfied with the yield, but others are very much disappointed. We have heard of some good wheat lands only yielding an average of five from one. Others, while showing better results than this, have fallen far below a fair term out. Upon the whole the indications seem to be that the yield this year will be far below a fair average. The excessive rains of May seem to have done the work. At the beginning of that month the wheat crop in this section generally exhibited a very promising appearance, but the long continued deluging rains that have since prevailed have had a very unfavorable effect upon the crop. And the damping effect of it did not cease with the harvest, but what that has left in the field has sustained much damage from the wet weather, a great deal of it having sprouted and much other being damp and tough in consequence. Unless much care is now exercised a great deal of the crop will go to market in bad condition. This however should be done as there is nothing else a farmer can do which will pay him as well as a little care and labor in conditioning his damp and tough wheat before it goes to market. These conditions which so heavily damped grain that is otherwise good may generally be removed by the proper treatment at home before shipping.

The Arrivals of Southern wheat in the Baltimore market are not yet sufficiently large to give tone and strength to the market, but the indications up to this time are unfavorable. The demand for Southern wheat is good though it has been up to this time mostly from the shippers, and the quality and condition of the wheat thus far arriving has not been such as to bring the millers into the market. Southern wheat sold on Wednesday at 70 to 78 cents for wet to tough, 80 to 85 cents for garlicky to fair and 88 cents a bushel for good. The probabilities seem to be that there will be some advance on these figures.

What Spontaneous Combustion Is. The Baltimore Sun in referring to a fire which recently occurred in that city from spontaneous combustion gives the views of Prof. Torrey, the chemist, regarding the ordinary conditions and circumstances which give rise to this mysterious and often damaging kind of combustion. Prof. Torrey says the flames in such cases invariably arise from a combination of oxygen with some material favorable to producing heat. Among the conditions producing this result, the Prof. mentions that "they when moist and packed tightly, ferments by a natural process and absorbs oxygen so freely as to produce flame in many instances." We have frequently read of cases of barns and other buildings being destroyed by spontaneous combustion generated by fermenting hay or similar conditions. It might be well for some of our farmers to have an eye on their tightly stored hay barns during the wet season now prevailing. The average farmer is apt to laugh at this idea; but we feel justified in showing up this cautionary note, for though local news items are very scarce, we do not desire to be called upon to chronicle any case of spontaneous combustion.

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Mr. Samuel W. Adams, a highly esteemed citizen of Nanjemoy and who has been quite sick for the past few weeks, is now, we are glad to report, greatly improved and enabled to go about.

Tuesday last was St. Swithin's day and as we had no rain let us hope that the floods are over for another day at all events. The people of the summer is that it rains on St. Swithin's day it will rain for forty successive days thereafter.

The Future Weather.

If, turning from the present to the future, we inquire what the meteorological peculiarities of the season will be, the answer is not obvious. Judging by the recent weather developments on our continent, it seems probable that the balance of the summer will be of rather more than ordinary intensity east of Mississippi, with a slight reluctance of rainfall, except perhaps in the East Gulf States, and some of ordinary temperance in the trans-Mississippi region. It also seems probable that the autumn of 1889 will not be late in making itself felt, and that next winter will be more severe than the last throughout the country generally.—N. Y. Herald.

Baltimore and surrounding country were visited Saturday evening by one of the most severe storms that have occurred in that part of the State for years. The damage was very great, and thousands of dollars worth of property were destroyed in the section of Baltimore county lying from three to five miles east and northeast of the city. Bridges were swept away in many places. Baltimore county crops were beaten down and utterly ruined. The storm hardly lasted more than an hour, and yet it rarely has had an equal in that locality. It seems that something like a cloud-burst occurred along Herring run and near the streams in that part of the county, causing an immediate rise in the water of from five to eight feet. A number of persons narrowly escaped drowning.
