LAWS—GENERAL—

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND

At the January Session, 1867.

(PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY.)

A BILL

Entitled an act to repeal sub-section five of chapter one hundred and ninety-four of Laws of Maryland, passed January session, (1865) eighteen hundred and sixty-five, entitled an act to repeal and re-enact sections five, twenty-six and twenty-seven of an act passed January session eighteen hundred and sixty-four, chapter three hundred and forty-six, entitled 'an act to amend article four of the code of Public Local Laws, relating to leasing of the State Tobacco Warehouses, and the Inspection of Tobacco, and to re-enact the same. Also, to repeal sections nine, eleven, twelve, fifteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen, twenty-two, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven and twenty-eight of chapter three hundred and forty-six of Laws of Maryland, passed January session, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, to re-enact the same with amendments, and to annex additional sections, to come in after section fifty of said act.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That sub-section 5, of chapter 194, of Laws of M.D. passed January session, 1865, be repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Sec. 5. Each of said tobacco inspectors as soon as possible after qualifying, shall take charge of the warehouse to which he may be appointed, and of the tobacco, books, furniture, implements, appurtenances and effects found therein, and shall receipt to his predecessor thereof, and shall employ such clerks and laborers, provide and keep on hand such books, implements and materials as may be necessary for the economical and effective discharge of his duty as such inspector. The chief clerks of the respective warehouses shall receive each twelve hundred dollars per annum; the receiving and shipping clerks shall receive each nine hundred dollars per annum; the weighing clerks shall receive nine hundred dollars per annum; the screwmen two dollars and fifty cents per day, and the laborers of black gang two dollars per day; all of which shall be paid by the inspectors from the receipts into their respective offices. The inspectors shall at no time employ more laborers than is necessary for the efficient performance of the work to be done, and in his quarterly returns to the Comptroller of the State, each inspector shall state the average number of screwmen and laborers employed in his warehouse during said quarter, and amount of compensation paid by them, and the several clerks in his employment.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That sections nine, eleven, twelve, fifteen, seventeen, eighteen, twenty-two, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven and twenty-eight of chapter three hundred and forty-six of Laws of Maryland, passed January session, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, be repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Sec. 9. All tobacco landed or delivered at any of the warehouses in the city of Baltimore, for inspection, shall be taken charge of by the inspector appointed to said warehouse, who shall be responsible therefor, and who shall, upon demand, give his receipt therefor to the person delivering the same; and if he refuses to take charge of any such tobacco, or to give his receipt therefor when required, he shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars, to be recovered in any court of law in this State, without prejudice to the right of action upon his official bond as herebefore provided; provided he shall not be liable as aforesaid if his warehouse be full and he shall have secured room for said tobacco so delivered in some other warehouse or elsewhere, and provided further, that if any inspector shall refuse to receive tobacco sent to him from any of the other warehouses by the inspector or inspectors thereof, knowing his own warehouse to be capable of receiving the same, he shall be liable as mentioned in this section.

Sec. 11. All tobacco delivered at any warehouse in such condition as to require coverage, shall be properly taken care of by the inspector, who shall notify the agent of the owner of such tobacco that coverage is required, and the said agent, if in his judgment the same shall be necessary, shall have the same covered at the expense of the owner, charging therefor a sum not less than twenty-five cents nor more than fifty cents, for each hog-head thus covered.

Sec. 12. It shall be the duty of each tobacco inspector, unless prevented by sickness or unavoidable accident (and in that event he shall designate some competent person, sworn before hand before some justice in the city of Baltimore, to perform faithfully the duty of inspector,) to cause all the tobacco in the warehouse to which he may have been appointed to be inspected as speedily as practicable, in regular order as numbered, without favor, affection or partiality to any one; and each chairman of the provisions of this section shall sign a receipt to a penalty of one hundred dollars, to be recovered in the Circuit Court of Baltimore city.

Sec. 15. It shall be the duty of each inspector to cause all tobacco under his charge to be measured and packed in bundles

self or some competent person appointed and sworn aforesaid, by him to draw samples thereof, and cause the same to be tied fastened, labeled and marked as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 17. Each hog-head of tobacco which may have been raised in any other State than Maryland or Ohio, shall be broken in three different places, and four bundles shall be taken from each brook of the average quality thereof, and twelve bundles so taken, shall be so drawn as to constitute a fair and just sample of the quality and condition of the tobacco in such hog-head.

Sec. 18. One of the clerks of said chapter shall then tie together said four bundles, as the case may be, by passing a strong tape through the head of each bundle, and confining thereon a strip of paste-board, on which shall be written the warehouse number of the hog-head represented by said sample, the number of the warehouse in which the same was inspected, the date of inspection, the name of the owner of said tobacco, if known to him, or if said name be not known to him, the initials or other marks on said hog-head.
