THE COUNTY'S RULERS

Regular Meeting of the County Commissioners.

JACOBSON RE-ELECTED CHAIRMAN

County Printing Let at Full Legal Rates the Same as Last Year.

The board of county commissioners met in annual session Tuesday, Jan. 4, at 9 a. m., and owing to the absence of Commissioner Hennen, adjourned to 1 p. m., when, all being present, organization was perfected by electing J. J. Jacobson chairman.

\$100 was appropriated to aid the town of Two Rivers in building a pier under the Mississippi river bridge leading from Two Rivers to Royalton.

The school petition of Frank Norvack and others, asking for the formation of a new school district in town 42, ranges 29 and 30, was allowed, and said district was organized as No. 87.

The school petition of E. S. Gillman and others, asking for the formation of a new school district in towns 41 and 42, range 28, was allowed and the new district will be known as No. 88.

A hearing was granted on the petition of Ben Cekala to be set off from district No. 40 to district No. 29.

The following were set off: O. Rocheleau, district 1 to 16; Frank Hudalla, 9 to 45; Thos. Yurozski, 45 to 9; Anton Petrowski, 9 to 45.

The resignation of H. S. Clyde as county surveyor was accepted and Nels Peterson appointed to fill unexpired term.

B. Aclamezecki was granted a hearing on petition to be set off from district 11 to 63.

The board rejected the application of W. G. Smith for the purchase for taxes of $\frac{1}{2}$ of ne $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{1}{4}$ of ne $\frac{1}{2}$, section 14, and $\frac{1}{2}$ of nw $\frac{1}{4}$ section 4, town 131, range 30.

The board approved the application of Catherine Trebby for abatement of taxes on se $\frac{1}{2}$ ne $\frac{1}{2}$ and e $\frac{1}{2}$ ne $\frac{1}{2}$ section 36, town 41, range 30, and recommended the same to the state auditor, for the reason that the property belonged to the state when the taxes were levied.

The board adjourned to 7 p. m.

When the board reassembled, Aldermen Martin and Carlson, representing the city of Little Falls, conferred with the board regarding the repairs on the wagon bridge across the Mississippi river in the city.

The board adjourned to Jan. 5, 9 a. m.

Board met 9 a. m. Jan. 5, all present.

Little Falls Ptg. Co.—To Publish in The Herald delinquent tax list for 1896 for 12 cents per description.

Transcript Pub. Co.—To publish financial statement for 1897 at 75 cents per folio for first insertion and 35 cents for each subsequent insertion.

The bids of the Transcript Pub. Co., Little Falls Ptg. Co. and Morrison Co. Democrat were accepted and the bonds of each, in the sum of \$1,000, were approved.

The board passed a resolution making the Weekly Transcript the official paper of the county for the year 1898.
