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ORDERED TO HAVANA

BATTLESHIP MAINE SENT TO THE CUBAN CAPITAL.

Is Now Off Key West, Fla., But a Few Hours Away From Her Destination. Washington Officials Insist There's Nothing Alarming in the Move.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Within 24 hours, for the first time since the insurrection broke out in Cuba three years ago, the United States government will be represented in the harbor of Havana by a warship. The decision to send the battleship Maine was finally reached at a special meeting at the White House during the morning between the president, Secretary Long, Assistant Secretary Day, Attorney General McKenna and General Miles, and it is a striking fact that with the exception of the secretary of the navy and the attorney general, not a member of the cabinet knew of the president's intention to take this radical action. It is not denied, however, that some such move has been long in contemplation, as is evidenced in the following statement of Assistant Secretary Day, made during the afternoon:

Move a Friendly One.

"The sending of the Maine to Havana means simply the resumption of friendly naval relations with Spain. It is customary for naval vessels of friendly nations to pass in and out of the harbors of other countries with which they are at peace, and British and German warships have recently visited Havana. This is no new move. The president has intended to do it for some time, but heretofore something has happened to postpone it. The orders to the Maine mean nothing more than I have said and there is nothing alarming or unfriendly in them. The Spanish minister here is fully informed of what is going on, and so far as I know has not made the slightest objection to it."

Further, Assistant Secretary Day said that Consul General Lee had not sent for a warship.

Trouble Looked for at Madrid.

This statement shows that the move was made deliberately, and that it could not have been taken if there were serious apprehension of its results in Havana. The general belief here, however, is that in Madrid, rather than in any Cuban town, is trouble to be looked for, if there should be any misapprehension of the purpose of our government in sending the Maine to Havana. The temper of the opposition newspapers in the Spanish capital has been threatening for some time, and it may require the strong hand of the news censor to repress utterances that would lead to rioting.

Admiral Sicard's orders were not made public in their text at the navy department, but it was stated that the substance of them was contained in the statement made by Secretary Long. The orders were:

Not Sent Directly to the Maine

for the reason that she is now attached to the squadron and the naval regulations require all such orders to go through the superior officer. There is some question whether the telegram reached the admiral before he sailed with his squadron from Key West for Tortugas harbor. The belief is that it did not, but this will make little difference in the programme, inasmuch as the telegram doubtless will be sent to the admiral by one of the torpedo boats or some other means of conveyance. The details of the Maine's movements are believed to be left for the arrangement of Admiral Sicard, but it is thought that the ship, which put to sea with the squadron, will return to Key West before going to Havana.

NOW LOCATED AT NAVAJAZ.

Reported Capture of Insurgent Headquarters Confirmed.

HAVANA, Jan. 24.—Insurgents concealed behind the railroad station at San Miguel, eight miles from Havana, fired on a train, killing several animals in one of the cars. Another band entered the cultivated zone of the town of Las Vegas, near Havana, destroying all the huts and the crops that had been planted.

A private report from Puerto Principe confirms the report that General Castellano has destroyed Esperanza, the headquarters of the insurgent government, which moved to Navajaz, saving documents and files. When the insurgents retired they left 57 of their dead on the field, but carried away their wounded. The government troops lost 27 killed and 87 wounded.

Rumored That Garcia Is Dead.

HAVANA, Jan. 22.—Although nothing appears to be known on the subject at Spanish headquarters persistent rumors were in circulation during the day to the effect that General Calixto Garcia, the famous insurgent leader, was killed in a recent engagement with the Spanish troops.

GRIGGS FORMALLY NAMED.

New Jersey Governor Succeeds McKenna as Attorney General.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The president has sent to the senate the nomination of John W. Griggs to be attorney general. Mr. Griggs is at present governor of New Jersey. It was unofficially announced several weeks ago that he would succeed Mr. McKenna.

The Tennessee Deadlock.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 22.—Fifteen fruitless ballots were taken during the evening in the Democratic senatorial caucus, and the last ballot left the situation about the same as on the first ballot. During the three nights the caucuses have been in session 37 ballots have been taken, with small changes on each ballot.
