YELLED, ATE, TALKED

At Banquet Given by High School Literary Society.

REVOKED HIS LICENSE

Royalton Council Gets After a Saloonkeeper in that Village.

The banquet given by the Little Falls High School Literary Society to the Class of '98 and its friends, at Maurin Hall Wednesday evening, was a very enjoyable affair. There was a very large attendance. The evening began with a musical and literary program. Miss Clytie Stuart gave a piano solo, and Miss Mamie Nichols, a recitation, both of which were heartily applauded. Henry Richard gave a violin solo with his usual skill, and responded to an encore. Miss Anna McDaniel's recitation received a merited encore. The class yells, which it would be impossible to describe, were given with a will at the beginning of the evening and at intervals thereafter. After the guests had discussed the excellent banquet, the assemblage was called to order by Ed. De La Hunt, who acted as toastmaster, and who introduced each speaker in appropriate words. Dr. Trace was to have responded to the toast "The Schools," but as he was absent A. R. Davidson was called for a few remarks, and incidentally told a funny story. Mr. Wetzel, of the board, also spoke. Supt. Rowe responded to "Little Falls" in a neat and graceful address, which received great applause. Louis Joss spoke on "The Faculty," thanking the teachers for their kindness toward the students. Miss Johnson, principal of the High school spoke on "The Seniors from the Faculty Standpoint," and gave a witty and sparkling address full of telling hits. It was enjoyed very much. Miss Madge Cornwell talked of "The Seniors from Undergraduate's Standpoint," and touched on the characteristics of the graduating class in a pleasant way. Miss Nettie Carley responded on behalf of the seniors, and thanked the society for the entertainment given them, in a neat speech. Harry Kerr spoke for the class of 1902, and Leigh Tanner, for the literary society, of which he is president. Miss Bartleson made a pleasant speech in response to a call, and Miss Walker endorsed everything Miss Bartleson said. The mayor was present and was inveigled into saying something. Henry Guerin delivered an excellent speech, and showed that he merited the title of "Demosthenes" bestowed on him by his schoolmates. Misses Richard and Mahan and Mr. Merrick, of the graduating class also spoke. A number of others were called on and nearly all responded. The toastmaster in well put words brought the toasts to a close. Dancing until a late hour concluded a delightful evening.

License Revoked.
Nick Rassier, a saloonkeeper of Royalton, was charged with selling liquor on Sunday, and tried before Justice Drago Monday. County Attorney Lyon conducted the prosecution. The jury, after a long session, disagreed. Rassier was notified to appear before the village council Wednesday evening, and show cause why his license should not be revoked. He appeared and offered to pay all costs, the matter to be dropped. The council, however, revoked the license. It is likely the case will be carried to the District court by Rassier.

REACHES ST. CLOUD

Big Drive of 125,000,000 at the Saintry City.

St. Cloud Journal-Press: The first drive of the season of the Mississippi and Rum River Boom company reached Sauk Rapids from Brainerd yesterday. The Rapids are being cleared today and the pond at St. Cloud would be cleared were it not for the heavy winds which prevail. The drive is in charge of Foreman Russell Harmon and it includes some 105 men. There are estimated to be 125,000,000 feet of logs in the drive, and the greater portion of these are old logs. The crew, or a large percentage of it, will be sent back to Brainerd to bring down another drive and a lower-river crew will be brought up from Minneapolis and put at work below St. Cloud taking down the rear.
