## STATE LEGISLATURE

TUESDAY, FEB. 28.

Senator Davis appeared before a joint session of the legislature and spoke briefly on national affairs. The senator was present by invitation and was escorted to the house chamber by Governor Lind and committees from both branches.

The most important of the dozen or more bills passed by the senate was the measure making the state railroad and warehouse commissioners elective.

The "home stone" bill of Senator Brower of Stearns also passed without opposition.

The feature of the house session was the discussion of the bill providing for the state publication of free text books. The bill met with considerable opposition and after much debate was referred to the committee on education for amendment.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 1.

The Somerville bill, S. F. 60, passed the house, after four hours had been devoted to offering amendments and discussion as to its provisions. The provisions of the bill are:

"To require every foreign corporation doing business in this state to have a public office in this state at which to transact its business, and to appoint an agent duly authorized to accept service of process, and requiring such corporation to file its certificate of incorporation with the secretary of state, pay fees of incorporation and providing penalties for the violation of the act."

Insane asylum hospital bills were made a special order for Tuesday.

Nearly 30 bills were passed by the senate. Among them were:

To protect bicycle paths and bicyclists. Wheaton's civil rights bill relative to serving colored men in saloons.

Allowing the managers of the St. Cloud reformatory to discharge prisoners who had been convicted of crimes for which the terms have since been reduced by law, at the expiration of the minimum term thus fixed.

THURSDAY, MARCH 2.

But 35 senators answered roll call when the senate convened, the others being absent on visits to various state institutions. General orders contained 48 bills and the senate went into committee of the whole with Mr. Roveral in the chair. The first bill taken up was the measure providing for a committee to visit state institutions, thus doing away with junketing parties. Progress was reported. Senator Thompson's bill allowing \$1,000 state aid to high schools instead of \$400 was discussed and finally referred to the finance committee.

The house spent most of the day on Mr. Roberts' bill making changes in the election law. It was recommended to pass.

FRIDAY, MARCH 3.

In the committee of the whole the senate recommended for passage the Batz bill for the repeal of the present sugar bounty law.

The bill putting the oil inspector's office on a salary basis was passed. An amendment adopted makes the bill effective Jan. 1, 1901, at the expiration of the term of the present incumbent.

The bill compelling the labeling of "renovated" butter was recommended to pass, but the Gutterson bill to tax telegraph companies on their gross earning suffered defeat.

The house passed five bills at the morning session, among them being the Roberts bill changing the election laws.

At the afternoon session the attendance was very light and the house went into committee of the whole, recommending six bills for passage.

SATURDAY, MARCH 4.

The senate in committee recommended for advancement to the calendar the two bills by Senator Knatvold, repealing the present beet sugar bounty law and enacting in its place laws limiting the appropriation to \$90,000 a year for two years. The bounty is to be divided equally between the farmers who grow the beets and the manufacturers who make sugar. There was no debate on the measures, senators appearing to have made up their minds to settle the matter when the bills came up on the calendar for passage.

The house passed several bills, but none of importance, most of the time being consumed in discussion of two measures, one relating to the probate code and the other to mineral and timber land taxes.

MONDAY, MARCH 6.

The house recommended for passage bill providing for reappointing that section of the state law appropriating \$20,000 annually to the relief fund of the soldiers' home.

A bill making the salary of the supreme court reporter \$3,000 was recommended to pass.

The Greer tax commission bill was killed.

Several minor measures on the calendar were passed.

The senate held an afternoon session at which one bill was passed and a dozen new ones introduced. Of the new measures several are of a radical nature.

One bill introduced gives the initiative and referendum a foothold in Minnesota; another would permit the partial enforcement of the single tax by giving the smallest geographical divisions the right to exempt improvements on land from taxation, which would so far as local taxes are concerned constitute a practical institution of the single tax scheme.

Still another bill pertaining to taxes, introduced by Senator Schellbach, provides that the list of delinquent personal taxes shall be "edited," so to speak, by the county attorney, who shall strike out such accounts as he does not think it will be worth while to go after. The bill is a sort of a compromise on present conditions.
