### County Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners met in adjourned session Monday morning, all present.

The auditor was instructed to learn whether dependent children could be got into the state public schools.

The auditor was ordered to cancel the personal property list as returned by the sheriff.

Appropriations of \$300 for Swanville, \$300 for Cullerum, were made, to be deducted from amount already allowed that district.

Jos. Hortsch was granted license to sell liquor in Buckman and his bond—with John Schmolke and L. Gauder as sureties—was approved.

Road appropriations were made as follows: Pulaski, \$100; Ripley, \$200; Bellevue, \$650; Two Rivers, \$750; Pierz, \$800; Buckman, \$750; Morrill, \$550; Buh, \$500; Randall, \$250.

Jos Bastien was allowed \$50 for damage resulting from new road in Belle Prairie.

The applications of C. VanHerke and A. Bement for tax abatement were rejected.

\$100 was ordered paid to J. L. Berg of Ft. Ripley, who is to receive the same sum from Crow Wing Co. to build and keep a ferryboat in repair for five years.

It took fourteen coaches (not counting the baggage car) to carry the excursionists who went to Glenwood Tuesday. Motley turned out nearly 80 people, Randall and Swanville about the same each, Royalton about, 175 Lincoln a fair crowd, and Little Falls 325. Altogether there were about 900 people on the train. Glenwood was reached at 11 o'clock, considerably later than schedule time. The excursionists went at once to the picnic grounds. Before dinner the tug-of-war was pulled off and proved an interesting and exciting contest. The team captained by W. H. Benson of Motley won over the team captained by Carl Bolander of Little Falls.

Mr. Merryfield of Randall won the staiding, broad jump. Wm. Tourtilotte second. Mr. Merryfield also won the running high jump, with Ned Fortier second.

Chas. Wegner won the one mile bicycle race, Fred Marotte second, Ned Fortier third.

The boys' half mile bicycle race was won by Stephen Fortier, Willie Sturgeon second.

M. Burton of Melrose won the 100-yard foot race by about six inches over Peter Vasaly second, Merryfield third.

The ball game between Royalton and Elbow Lake proved interesting. The Elbow Lake boys put up a good game, and had a safe and heady pitcher. The Royalton succeeded in finding the pitcher after a few innings, but their batting was weak, and that lost the game. ### Died.

Martha W., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Tanner, died at 9 o'clock Wednesday evening, aged 14 years, 6 months and 5 days.

The young girl had been confined to her bed but a short time, although she had been ill at intervals during the past year. The trouble was diagnosed as appendicitis, and operation was performed Tuesday. The patient was too weak to rally and gradually sank until the end.

The deceased girl was familiarly known as "Kitty." She was of a genial and pleasant disposition, and her sunny nature endeared her to all who knew her. This is the first death in a family of nine children and the community will condole with the sorrow-stricken parents in the sad taking away of the bright young girl, the flower that was just to blossom into womanhood.

The funeral will be held from the Episcopal church this afternoon at 3 o'clock.
