New Train on the Branch.

Sauk Centre Avalanche: It is one of the probabilities that Sauk Centre will soon have better passenger service on the Northern Pacific road between this city, Morris and Little Falls, making connections at the latter place with main line trains both ways, and giving this city and other towns along this line of the Northern Pacific a direct outlet to Duluth and the Twin Cities.

A representative of the Avalanche took the matter up with the general passenger department of the road, while in St. Paul last Monday. The matter came up incidentally, and the newspaper man was at once referred to Assistant General Passenger Agent Cleland, who went over the situation quite thoroughly with the writer.

Conditions were explained to him and after a half hour's conference, Mr. Cleland assured the Avalanche that he would take the matter up with the officials concerned and see if we couldn't be given a passenger train.

The present service is only one mixed train a day each way, leaving Morris at 7 a. m. and reaching Little Falls at 1:15 (if by chance it gets in on time). This train runs to Brainerd, where it is due at 6 p. m. Returning the train leaves Brainerd at 7 a. m., Little Falls at 10:30, too early to connect with either of the main line day trains, and is due at Morris at 6 p. m.

If the proposed train becomes a reality it will probably leave Morris about 8:30 a. m., passing through Sauk Centre about the same time as the present mixed train and reach Little Falls at noon in time to connect with No. 5, going west on the main line. No. 5 connects at Brainerd with No. 12, the day train to Duluth, which reaches the Zenith at about 7 p. m. The new train would stop at Little Falls, remaining until the arrival of No. 6, the Minneapolis train, at 2:05, and then start back reaching Sauk Centre about 3:45 and Morris about 6 p. m.

Mrs. Gurnee, of St. Paul, has sold 80 acres of land, three miles east of Little Falls to H. A. Burt, of Bellevue town.

Sup. C. R. Frazier led the discussion on the subject of history at the meeting of the state educational association last week.

Letter From Geo. Powers.

CRESTON, WASH., Dec. 23, '01.
EDITOR HERALD: We are now sidetracked here for a short time on account of a wreck, and will give you a little sketch of our trip west. When we left Little Falls it was 20 degrees below zero. This continued until we reached Mandan, N. D. When we got to Billings, Mont., the water was running and we haven't seen any zero weather since, but have seen more worthless land than I thought there was in the world, and we have only just got started on our trip. The scenery along the Yellowstone river is very interesting, but the only way I can describe it is that it looks like the ruins of ancient cities and castles, twenty stories high and 500 miles long.

This is a wheat country. There are now 200,000 bushels piled up in sacks awaiting shipment. The price is 40 cents per bushel. There is quite a lot of fruit raised here in spite of the fact that there is some snow on the ground. We picked apples and pears from the trees. The chickens roost in the trees 100 feet below the level of the earth. The fruit was frozen and the trees were down in a canyon, where most of the people live out here.

Every other man out here has a gold mine. One took us out yesterday to show us some land, a hard five hour drive. Although he claims to own mines worth \$50,000, all he charged was a pint of bug juice.

They use brakes on top buggies here, and the newspapers publish all land sales, also giving the name of the agent who made the sale.

Guess land and green fruit is just as high here as back home. There the song is "lamb, lamb, lamb." Here it's "mud, mud, mud."

We will pull out to the coast soon, then will let you know what we find out there.

WHAT HAVE WE DONE?

Two More Lawyers Coming to Locate Here.

Hutchinson Leader: Bertie Nelson, who is a law senior of the state university this year, has made arrangements to enter into a law partnership with a fellow student, J. F. Schellbach, a brother of Senator Schellbach of Yellow Medicine county, and the firm of Nelson and Schellbach will hang out its shingle in Little Falls next June. St. Cloud Journal-Press, Dec. 24: Judge Searle heard two Morrison county cases in chambers Thursday afternoon. In the case of A. E. Joslyn as administrator vs. Geo. H. Niles, the court granted a motion to vacate a tax title to real estate and ordered judgment entered for plaintiff. Questionable methods were claimed on the part of an attorney formerly connected with the case.

A motion for a new trial of the case of Bouck vs. Lodemeire was denied, but on its merits. A. P. Blanchard appeared for the appellant Bouck and F. W. Lyon for Lodemeire. The case involved the value of a colt claimed to be the increase of a mare covered by a chattel mortgage held by Bouck, a Royaltown business man. The defense was that the mortgage had been paid and a Morrison county jury so found. The motion for a new trial was combated in part on the failure of appellant to specify the errors involved in the first trial, but while the court held with respondent's counsel on this point, the motion was decided on its merits.


