**Memorial Day Address by Rev. Wallar**  
SYNOPSIS.  
We are boastful enough of the length and breadth of our land, depth and height,—the splendid altitudes of its living manhood, the rich subsoil of its buried heroes and a right estimate of their still potent energy in the making of our present national records that our hearts are turned on this anniversary of sorrow and of pride.  
There is, I assume, not one sleeper under the sod of this pleasant knoll who fell in any battle of the civil war. There are here only the forms of those who, coming out of the war, took up the larger, longer battle of life,—of business and domestic interests, the citizen's struggle to maintain that for which the soldier fought, the same that marched in the Sixties under Grant and Lee, under Sherman and Jackson, have now for well nigh fifty years been marching under other orders, the Great Commander changing the weapons and tactics of war, but retaining unaltered the divine purpose to establish liberty in the earth. It is from the ranks of this later warfare these have fallen upon whose graves we to-day place these symbols of our appreciation. It is eminently fitting at such a time as this to affirm that we are honoring these men not alone for the noble share they had in those years of actual military service, but as well for the type of manhood produced by the discipline of war, a type without whose rugged endurance and elevation we may well believe our country could hardly have overcome the difficulties and achieved the successes of the past thirty years.  
Nor let any one suppose that when at length these soldier citizens have been put upon the muster roll of death, their career of usefulness is done. In the benefactions by which we their sons bless humanity today, they our martial sires, may justly claim a share. For it was they who made possible the humane purpose which underlay Manila, San Juan and Santiago. It was they who made possible a scarce ten-day-old triumph before whose radiant glory those military feats fade like stars in the dawn.  
Have you all realized that ten days ago our nation sealed another snow-capped peak in her onward fight for freedom—a peak higher for honorable moral achievement than any my eyes can see all the way back through the years to those star-crowned Sixties? We have accomplished our purpose. We have justified the war with Spain. We have set Cuba free.  
When two or three generations hence pupils in our public schools shall be asked what after the emancipation of the slaves was the next great event in United States history, they will reply, "The Creation of the Republic of Cuba." And when the more philological historian proceeds to assign causes for that event prominent among them will be mentioned the inspiration, veteran fathers gave their sons when at the bedside they betrayed to them them the unsurpassable pleasure to be derived from fighting for some down-trodden race.  
And may the God of our fathers be also the God of our children, putting into their hearts deeper than all selfishness and love of ease, that yearning strong as death which impelled you the living and these the departed comrades of the departed comrades of the Grand Army to risk life and happiness in the cause of freedom.
