Passion Play

Little Falls will soon have the pleasure of witnessing the world-famous Passion Play at the Sacred Heart church at the invitation of the Rev. Altendorf. Two representations will be given; one in English at 2:30 p. m. by Prof. W. A. Kilrain of Cleveland, Ohio, who is a fine orator, and one in German at 8:30 p. m. by Dr. John H. Scherer of Chicago, who is well known throughout the country as a lecturer of exceptional ability. The entertainment will take place July 4th.

A soloist who has a clear musical voice of great range and power will render the sacred songs.

There are in all 49 moving pictures in which nearly 800 persons are shown. These are made in Germany and are the most perfect ones of the Passion Play ever made. The colored scenes are remarkable for their clearness and beauty.
