RESOLUTION

Regarding Presentation and Examination of Bills Against the County

Be it resolved by the board of county commissioners, Morrison county, state of Minnesota, that from and after this date, all bills for indebtedness against the county shall be filed in the office of the county auditor of this county, at least eight days prior to the regular meeting of this board at which such bills to be considered, and that the auditor of this county is hereby instructed to refer all such bills to the county attorney for his approval at least seven days prior to such meeting.

Be it further resolved that no further bills shall be allowed by this board unless filed as referred to above provided, and the county attorney as such is requested to audit and approve or disapprove such bills giving evidence thereof to this board prior to the hour of such meeting, and all bills shall bear evidence of such official approval having been taken by the county attorney prior to any action being taken on them by this board.

Be it also resolved that the county attorney be and he is hereby requested, to examine and report on any and all such bills, examine them first as to whether they are, in all items, in respect, clearly a legal charge against the county, and second, as to whether they are clearly and properly itemized and certified to by the person presenting the claim, and verified by the county auditor who supervised the work, purchased and received the goods, or for whose department the expenditure was made, rejecting all bills that are not complete, in all of the above particulars.

This resolution shall be in force from and after the date of the passage of this resolution.

HINTS FOR FARMERS

Cruelty in Killing Hogs.

When hog killing time comes three or four men and boys and perhaps a yelping dog will lay siege to the doomed animal and with much ado will catch and throw the beast, which meantime rends the air with his squealing as though crying lustily for mercy, and when at last the knife has been driven home and the arteries severed all at once the quietness of death prevails; the hog arises, totters awhile, ghastly blood pouring from the wound; the animal gets weaker and weaker and finally tumbles over and gives his last dying kick. The man's wife and children and perhaps some of the children of the neighborhood have been silent but horrified witnesses of the direful scene. Now, is not this a delightful picture to present for the inspection of women and children?

A merciful way to kill a hog is to strike it in the head with a suitable implement, producing stupor, then instantly use the sticking knife. This causes instant death. An animal suffers more from fear than it does from death itself. A neat, unobjectionable method is to drop the open side of a suitable long, narrow box down over the animal and then turn box and animal upside down, when the knife can do its work and the box be righted again, that the hog can bleed out properly. Humane men will be apt to pursue one of these better methods. Indeed, many of them do now, but if they will not they should be thoughtful enough to have children absent from hog killing that no evil be done by bad example.—Practical Farmer.

Quince Pudding.

Peel, core and quarter six or eight large, ripe quinces and simmer them gently in sufficient boiling water to cover them generously till soft, then sieve and sweeten the pulp, flavoring it to taste with lemon, ginger or cinnamon, and when cool stir into it a pint of cream and the well beaten yolks of three eggs. Edge a pie dish with puff paste, pour in the quince mixture and bake about an hour in a moderate oven. Just before it is ready pile the stiffly whipped whites of the eggs, whisked with powdered sugar and lightly flavored, and let this meringue crisp for a few minutes in the oven.

Chestnut Stuffing For Turkey.

For chestnut stuffing proceed as follows: Take one quart of stale bread-crumbs, one cup of butter, one tablespoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of paprika, one-half a cup of minced celery, one-quarter of a cup of minced parsley, one cup of chopped chestnuts, boiled and whole, one small onion, minced, two whole eggs; mix all together and fill a cleaned turkey two-thirds full.
