## BRAINERD PULP MILL WAS IN DANGER

Brainerd Dispatch, Monday: There was an alarming break down at the pulp mill of the Northwest Paper company near the dam yesterday afternoon and for a time it was thought that the plant would be a total wreck.

It seems that on account of the high water, giving too much head, one of the big flumes was washed out and the water rushed through and beneath the mill with terrific force, it being more than the men in charge could do to handle the gates.

After the flume had washed out the water poured in and began to eat its way through the inner walls of the pit and for a time it was thought the whole plant was destined to go. Quick action on the part of the management, however, averted this catastrophe. Some seventy-five men were put to work and were kept at it nearly all night. It is now thought that the stream is under control and no farther trouble is anticipated. The mill will be closed down as a result of the accident for at least six weeks.

# ANDERSON'S FREEDOM

## Sister Trying to Get Young Man out of State Prison.

The state board of pardons has under consideration the application for pardon of Walter Anderson, sentenced at Little Falls Sept. 21, 1901, to thirty years for murder in the first degree. Anderson was implicated in the McGrath murder.

**Pioneer Press:** A young woman, sister of Walter Anderson, sentenced two years ago from Morrison county to the state penitentiary for thirty years on a charge of killing John McGrath of Stillwater, came all the way from California to secure a pardon for her brother.

She had already sent to the board a letter from J. E. McGrath, a lumberman of Stillwater, brother of the dead man, saying he would take no steps to oppose the pardon. The woman had a letter from the county attorney recommending a commutation of the sentence so that the prisoner might be released on parole. The board took the case under advisement until the trial judge is heard from.

The woman, who was neatly dressed and showed every evidence of culture and refinement, presented her case in a straightforward manner. Her brother was nineteen when sentenced two years ago. The boy had no money and few friends, and on the advice of the lawyer pleaded guilty.

# GOUGED AN EYE OUT

## Briggs Brothers, Formerly of this City, Accused of Offense.

George and Jud Briggs of Pine River, formerly of Little Falls, are under arrest at Fargo, charged with a very serious offense. They were arrested at their home Friday and taken to Fargo.

The following from the Fargo Forum, gives particulars of the charges alleged, later issues giving the Briggs boys as the assailants:

Jack Howard, employed as foreman on the Still farm east of Harwood on the Shynesse, was brutally assaulted by the engineer and fireman of a threshing crew, Thursday evening, and may lose the sight of an eye, and may lose the sight of the other, socket by one of his assailants. The attacking parties escaped and are now believed to be somewhere in Minnesota. A warrant, charging them with maiming, has been authorized by the state's attorney, and an effort will be made to locate and arrest the accused.

It seems that during the past few weeks a threshing crew of which the engineer and fireman in question were a part, has been working on the Still and McHenry farms. Completing their work Wednesday they gathered up all the tools on the two farms, including their own and some belonging to the farm. The incident was reported to Foreman Howard and he went to their tool box and removed the tools belonging to the two farms. The threshers left and later discovered that the farm tools had been taken from their box. Some of the men employed on the place informed the engineer of the threshing crew that Howard removed the tools. He hired a livery rig in Fargo and accompanied by his fireman, went to the farm. They found Howard badly about the head and body and was then commanded to get out. This the fireman undertook and practically succeeded as far as one optic was concerned. Howard was left in the field in an unconscious condition and the men proceeded to Fargo, where they took a train and left for some point in Minnesota. Howard was found later in the field and taken to the Still farm where he received medical attention. The doctor is not able to tell at this time whether the eye will have to be removed or not.
