More of the Checkered Career of the Forger Awaiting Trial

Fargo, N. D., Jan. 29.—Francis E. Henry, said to be the mysterious third man in the Calderone murder case of Minneapolis, is known here as Perival Young. He is said to have escaped jail at Little Falls last July. The latter part of August he appeared here, and after the burglarizing of a barber shop and photograph gallery he fled to Lamoure county. When an effort was made to arrest him he held the officers at bay several hours with a rifle. He feigned illness in jail here and was transferred to the hospital, from which he escaped about ten days before the Calderone murder. The officials here will ask for his return if no conviction is secured at Little Falls.

KILLED HIS WIFE Wm. Chounard, Formerly of This County, Does the Deed

Wm. Chounard, well known in Little Falls and vicinity, where he has several relatives, fatally shot his wife Dora at Cass Lake Thursday evening last week.

Chounard's real name is Sweeney. He was born and lived for years east of Little Falls, near Gravellyville. He was in Little Falls a few weeks ago. Chounard's father lives in Brainerd; his mother is dead. He has a little girl who is cared for by John Young, who lives east of the city.

The dead woman was 23 years old, and her husband 23 years. The following account of the tragedy is from the Duluth Herald of Jan. 29th:

"Shortly after 1 o'clock last evening, Mrs. William Chounard, who was brought to Duluth from Cass Lake, with three bullet wounds in her body, died from the effects of her wounds at St. Luke's hospital. Mrs. Chounard was shot by her husband in Cass Lake. One bullet entered the abdomen and the other two lodged in her back. An operation was performed yesterday morning, but there was little prospect that the woman would live. Any one of the three wounds might have proved fatal, and the long ride on the train in the bitterly cold weather left her in a completely exhausted condition.

"Chounard and his wife had charge of a house off the route on the south side of the track, and Mrs. Chounard was landlady. It is said that, of late, Chounard had become violently jealous of his better half, and that he had taken to drinking heavily. On Tuesday afternoon he visited several saloons in the village, and drank freely of whisky. In the early part of the evening he was over town with his wife, and they left for the house at about 11 o'clock. It was near the hour of midnight when the shooting occurred. Chounard and his wife were standing on the dance hall of the house, the former being exceedingly intoxicated. They had a few words, when Chounard pulled a gun from his coat pocket and, leveling it at his wife pulled the trigger. She was facing him, and the bullet struck her in the pit of the stomach. She gave a loud scream and started for the door. Chounard fired twice more before the woman reached the door, both shots hitting her in the lower part of the back. Mrs. Chounard, in spite of the fact that she was terribly wounded, ran into another house close by and fell to the floor. Drs. Smealie and Rodwell, village physicians, were attending a sick woman in the house at the time and they dressed Mrs. Chounard's wounds. The police were called by telephone, and Chounard, who made no attempt to escape, was arrested and taken to the village jail and locked in a cell. He was so intoxicated that he did not apparently realize the seriousness of the act he had committed. When seen in the jail the next forenoon, he was still confused from the liquor and stated that he did not mean to do any harm, and that he was just shooting for fun, in order to scare his wife. When he had regained his sober senses he began to understand what he had done and cried like a child.

MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE CHARGED AGAINST CHOUNARD.

Cass Lake, Feb. 2, Special to Duluth Herald: Coroner Wilcox and County Attorney Delny came from Walker last night and held an inquest over the remains of Dora Chounard. Dr. Smealie, who dressed the woman's wounds, was examined, as were others, including George Dopfina, who saw the shots fired. At 11 o'clock last night the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to her death from bullets from a revolver inflicted by William Chounard. Chounard was given a preliminary hearing this morning, before Justice Cummings, charged with murder in the first degree.

Chounard has employed Charles Argall of this place, as his attorney. It is believed that Chounard will claim that he is, or was, at the time of the shooting, insane, and consequently irresponsible for his acts. It is known that when he was under the influence of liquor Chounard was of a flighty and gloomy disposition, but he never heretofore gave signs of insanity. On the other hand, it is claimed that he has for some time threatened his wife with dire disasters, and also intimated that he would "beat the head off" of several parties against whom he imagined he had a grievance. The fact that all of the shots he fired took effect would indicate that Chounard was deliberate in his acts the night of the shooting. Very little sympathy is extended the imprisoned man, whose crying and random talk are taken with a grain of salt.
