The following sketch of the late Henry Galley is taken from the Elk River Star News:

One by one the old settlers are passing away. This week we record the death of Henry Galley of Royalton, a former highly respected citizen of this village. He died last Thursday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Chas. Rhoda in the village of Royalton, as the result of a recent attack of paralysis. The remains were brought here Saturday afternoon for burial. The funeral was held from the Episcopal church, the services being read by Rev. Hixon of Minneapolis and the interment was made at the upper town cemetery where Mrs. Galley and their oldest daughter were buried. Mr. Galley is survived by three sons, George, William and Fred Galley of Royalton, and five daughters, Mrs. Wm. Norval of this place, Mrs. M. J. Costello of St. Paul, Mrs. Wm. McGonagle and Mrs. Chas. Rhoda of Royalton and Mrs. H. E. White of Little Falls. The sons and the daughters and their husbands were here to attend the funeral, also Dr. J. E. Featherston of Valley City, N. D.  
Mr. Galley was born at Bristol, England, December 24, 1833, and came to America in 1850. He was engaged in manufacturing furniture in New York city for five years, after which he moved to St. Paul, where he followed the same business up to 1863. Moving to Elk River he continued the business of manufacturing chairs in connection with a general furniture business until 1897. From that time until 1893 he was in business at Delano, going from there to Royalton. Mr. Galley was an excellent citizen, a kind father and a sympathetic neighbor. His seventy years of life was not lived in vain.
