Christen Christensen, formerly of the United States military and naval service, died at his home in this city Thursday afternoon last week, after a long illness, with tuberculosis and Bright's disease, aged 33 years, 4 months 10 days.

Corporal Christensen was born in Denmark, and came to this country in 1889, first being employed in the Minneapolis saw mills. He served as a private in the U. The deceased leaves, besides his wife, two children, and two brothers. Corporal Christensen was a familiar figure in the city and liked by all.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon from the Baptist church and the remains laid to rest in Oakland.
