### WEST SIDE RESTAURANT BURNS

Albin Johnson's restaurant on the West side was destroyed by fire last Friday morning. The alarm was turned in shortly before 3 o'clock and the fire department responded at once. The fire when discovered was already large in proportions, practically the whole roof and the east side being ablaze when the water was turned on. It was seen that the Johnson place was doomed so attention was given to the adjoining building of Jos Wachlarowicz. The Wachlarowicz building is brick veneered in front, but is only a frame affair on the side which was toward the burning building—and only two feet between them. The Wachlarowicz building also caught, but by the excellent work of the firemen the building was damaged very little. An adjoining building on the West was not touched. The Johnson restaurant is a bad wreck and will probably be torn down.

Mr. Wachlarowicz and others who saw the fire are giving the firemen much credit for their excellent work. The building is owned by Mrs. O. P. Johnson and is insured for \$1500. Albin Johnson had \$700 insurance on household goods and fixtures and \$200 on the stock.

The official canvass of the election returns of the entire state occurred in St. Paul Friday, and the Minneapolis Journal, in reporting the result, gave J. W.
