NEWS IN MINNESOTA

EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGH-OUT THE STATE.

William R. Burkhard, a pioneer St. Paul business man, is dead. William C. Smith, brother of Mayor Smith of St. Paul, has been elected assessor of Ramsey county. There were 181 deaths in St. Paul in February, the largest number in any one month in recent years.

John Milligan, seventeen years old, fell into a freight elevator shaft at Duluth and died an hour later. Mrs. Charles Trampe, a widow about forty years of age, was killed at Swanville by being thrown from a wagon.

E. G. Porter died of burns received in an explosion while starting a fire in the kitchen stove in his home at Owatonna.

George H. Love, one of the proprietors of the Ryan hotel, St. Paul, is dead following an operation for appendicitis.

Laurie P. Ojala, the seven-year-old son of James Ojala, a tailor of Minneapolis, was drowned in Bassetts creek in that city.

Benton H. Langley, the first agent of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad in Minnesota, is dead at San Francisco.

The Red Wing city council has passed a resolution to build a city hall, fire station and city jail at a price not to exceed \$25,000.

John W. Riddle of St. Paul has been promoted from the consul generalship at Cairo, Egypt, to be minister at the new post of Roumania and Servia.

The retail implement dealers of the state met in Minneapolis and formed a permanent organization. C. D. Grinols of St. Cloud was elected president.

T. Hattori and A. Hattori of Yokohama, Japan, are in Winona purchasing choice young cattle to be shipped to Japan to improve dairy interests there.

German of the Twin Cities propose to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the death of Frederick Schiller, the great German poet, on May 9.

Dr. Hugh Russell, aged seventy-nine years, a veteran of the Civil war and one of the leading physicians at the Head of the Lakes, died suddenly from heart disease at Duluth.

Fire partially destroyed the Summer school at Minneapolis one afternoon last week. The 900 children marched out safely, believing they were being put through the fire drill.

William T. Horsnell, a St. Paul real estate dealer, has been held to the federal grand jury on a charge of having conspired to defraud the United States out of public lands.

The village of Campbell, twenty miles southwest of Fergus Falls, has been almost annihilated by fire. Three saloons, one restaurant, a grocery and three loushouses were burned.

John Pehle, thirty-five years old, a St. Paul saloonkeeper, cut his throat in an attack of delirium tremens and died half an hour later. Pehle had been drinking heavily for several days.

Sixteen thousand four hundred and twenty-five immigrants came to Minnesota during the fiscal year of the United States immigration service which ended June 30, 1904. This is 2 per cent of the total immigration to the United States.

The dead body of Roy Christman, twenty years old, was discovered in the Great Northern elevator No. 1 at Minneapolis. It was found at the bottom of the stairs which he was sweeping at the time and death is believed to have resulted from suffocation.

The thirty-ninth annual encampment of the state G. A. R. was held at St. Paul last week. C. F. Macdonald of St. Cloud was elected state department commander; J. O. Pierce, Minneapolis, senior vice commander, and E. F. Barrett, Le Sueur, junior vice commander.

An eastbound train on the Great Northern railroad killed three persons at a crossing at Foley. The dead are Mr. and Mrs. Fenish and Thomas DeMick, all of the town of Duellum. The heads of both men were severed from their bodies and the body of Mrs. Fenish was cut in two by the wheels of the engine.

A wholesale robbery scheme, it is alleged, has been unearthed among the employes of the T. M. Robert Supply company of Minneapolis. Samuel L. Ingram, manager of the concern, said that the value of the goods that have been purloined by the employes during the last few months will amount to thousands of dollars.

While a number of children were going home from school at Long Prairie a huge eagle swooped down upon them in the street, seized a little girl five years old and attempted to carry her away. When several feet from the ground a number of boys rushed to the girl's assistance and rescued her from the talons of the big bird.

John R. Gile, one of the earliest settlers of Winona county, is dead at his home in Winona, aged seventy-six years. Mr. Gile was born in Steuben county, N. Y., in 1820 and removed to Winona county with his parents in 1853. He was prominent in the early history of the county and for a time was the proprietor of the old Winona Democrat.

Two Harbors is shown in the annual mortality table for 1904 issued by the state board of health to have had the fewest deaths of any place in Minnesota during the year. That city had eight deaths in a population of 3,278. Montevideo came next with a total of eleven deaths and a population of 2,146. There were 17,160 deaths in the state during the year, as against 17,178 in 1903.

FAVORABLY REPORTED.

Santo Domingo Treaty Recommended for Ratification as Amended.

Washington, March 10.—The senate committee on foreign relations has agreed to report favorably the Santo Domingo treaty as amended. The vote was on party lines, every Republican voting for the treaty and every Democrat voting against it. All members of the committee were present and the vote stood: For the treaty—Cullom, Frye, Lodge, Clark (Wyo.), Foraker, Spooner and Keam.

Against the treaty—Morgan, Bacon, Money, Clark (Mont.) and McCreary. All of the amendments previously agreed upon were formally adopted by the committee and one additional amendment which was offered during the day was accepted. The latter was one of phraseology merely. It changes the last clause of Article 7.

NORTH SEA INCIDENT CLOSED. Russian Minister to England Pays \$325,000 Damages.

London, March 9.—Count Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain, has paid \$325,000 to Foreign Secretary Lansdowne in settlement of the North sea claims and the incident was thus closed.

DEFIES THE OFFICERS

WISCONSIN BACKWOODS SETTLER EVADES THOSE SENT OUT BY FEDERAL COURT.

Madison, Wis., March 13.—Nullifying Wisconsin law and successfully setting aside the efforts of the state judicial authorities, John F. Dietz, the Sawyer county backwoods settler, now defies the federal courts, the United States government having joined with the state of Wisconsin in useless efforts to enforce judicial mandates.

For many months Dietz has defied the judicial authorities in that section of the state and every attempt made to enforce orders issued by Circuit Judge Parish. Armed with Winchester rifle Dietz, single handed and alone, has maintained his position against the authorities of the court and all the officers it could command, and now a United States deputy marshal has fallen in an effort to serve injunctive papers on Dietz in the Thornapple dam case. The papers were secured by the Chippewa Lumber and Boom company. Dietz refused to let the marshal approach him to serve the papers.

Friday, March 10. The Chicago socialistic city convention has nominated John Collins for mayor.

Sir Henry Irving has signed a contract for an American tour beginning in October.

Three hundred and eighty-eight West Indian contract laborers have arrived at Panama to work on the canal.

Seven valuable horses died from suffocation at a supposed incendiary fire Thursday night in the stable of John Ward in Milwaukee.

The condition of Russell Sage, who has been ill for several days, is reported as much better. He has been suffering from a heavy cold.

John Cavins, one of the best known men in Indiana, is dead at Indianapolis. He was five times elected mayor of Indianapolis and was a pioneer in the development of the coal mining industry of Western Indiana.

Saturday, March 11. Mrs. Nancy Kelly, the oldest white woman in Maryland, is dead at the age of 107 years.

The new Norwegian cabinet has been approved by the regent, Crown Prince Gustaf.

Vice President Fairbanks has appointed as his private secretary his son, Fred C. Fairbanks.

Proceedings for disbarment have been entered in the circuit court at Marianna, Fla., against J. S. Liddon, former chief justice of the state of Florida.

Oliver Hopkinson, head of one of the oldest and most distinguished families in Philadelphia, is dead, aged ninety-three years. Mr. Hopkinson was not only the oldest living member of the Philadelphia bar, but was also the oldest living graduate of the University of Pennsylvania.

Monday, March 13. The famous hoepce of St. Gothard in Switzerland has been destroyed by fire.

Henry Norcross Munn, editor of the Scientific American, is dead at his home in New York city.

Judge George W. Wakefield of the district court, ex-president of the Iowa State Bar association, is dead at Sioux City. He was sixty-five years of age.

General William R. Walker, a Civil war veteran and for twenty years prominent in Rhode Island military affairs, is dead at Pawtucket, aged seventy-five years.

Thomas J. Ryan has been informed by the president that he is to be continued as assistant secretary of the interior. Mr. Ryan has held the office nearly eight years.

One workman was killed and three others more or less badly injured by the collapse of a floor in the two-story building occupied by the Cleveland (O.) machine knife factory.

Tuesday, March 14. George Rhodes Harris, a leading Boston banker, is dead at his home in Brookline, Mass.

The British army estimates for 1905-6 total \$149,065,000, an increase of \$4,915,000 from the last estimates.

Charles E. Dunwoody, former president of the Commercial Exchange and one of the best known grain merchants in Philadelphia, is dead.

Jeremiah Barber, a policeman who has served New York city four years, has, it is reported, fallen heir to two fortunes aggregating nearly \$300,000.

The Porto Rican legislature has adjourned after a satisfactory session. One hundred and ninety-eight bills were introduced in both houses, of which forty have become laws.

Daniel J. Sullivan and Edward Hadley of the failed firm of cotton brokers of D. J. Sully & Co. have received discharges in bankruptcy from Judge Adams in the United States district court.

NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Rear Admiral Edwin S. Houston, U. S. N., retired, aged sixty, is dead at Lausanne, Switzerland.

At East St. Louis, Ill., the plant of the Missouri Malleable Iron company on Fifteenth street was damaged by fire Tuesday night to the extent of \$100,000.

Arrangements for the entertainment of President Roosevelt at their annual dinner in New York city by the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick March 17 have been concluded.

John G. Jones of Chicago, a former member of the Illinois legislature, has been elected president of the Central American exposition to be held in Washington Sept. 11.

The regent of Norway, Crown Prince Gustaf, has invited former Finance Minister Micholson to form a new cabinet in succession to the Hagerup ministry, which resigned March 1.

Thursday, March 9. Senator Bate of Tennessee is dead at Washington.

The deaths from the plague in India last week numbered 34,000.

Jack ("Twin") Sullivan of Boston and Tommy Burns of Chicago fought twenty-five rounds to a draw at Tacoma, Wash.

The National Republican Editorial association met in Washington Wednesday. William S. Capper of Mansfield, O., was elected president for the ensuing year.

Dr. Ivan C. Amilon of Chicago, thirty-three years old, committed suicide as a result of excessive brooding over difficulties in the management of a life insurance company.

The resignation of W. W. Rockhill as director of the bureau of American republics has been accepted and Mr. Rockhill, who has been nominated to succeed Mr. Conger as minister to China, will probably leave for his new post some time in April.
