EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGH-OUT THE STATE.
A \$4,000 automobile was wrecked at St. Paul in a collision with a street car.
Governor Johnson has issued a proclamation designating April 21 as Arbor day.
Mrs. Annette Powell, a pioneer of St. Cloud and one of the wealthiest women in that city, is dead.

JULES VERNE DEAD.

Famous Author Passes Away at Amiens, France.
Amiens, France, March 24.—Jules Verne died at 3:10 p. m. His family was at his bedside.



JULES VERNE. expected for several days. M. Verne wrote many popular works, but his best known book was probably "Around the World in Eighty Days," written many years ago, before such a feat seemed possible.

Brooding over the death of his younger sister, Maude, Albert Anderson, twenty-nine years old, son of John Anderson, a pioneer resident of Wayzata, sent a bullet into his brain, ending his life.

A large force of men will be put to work shortly constructing a dam across the Mississippi river three miles above Sauk Rapids. Wisconsin paper mill men have the charter and will erect mills there.

Anton Paulson, employed as head electrician at the Red Wing Gas and Electric company, was killed by a current of electricity while cutting live wires without using rubber gloves or insulated tongs.

Chris Norbeck, the Minneapolis detective convicted of grafting and sentenced to Stillwater but recently released on parole, has been returned to prison for intoxication, thus violating the terms of his parole.

The Earl of Rosslyn has been married in London to Miss Anna Robinson. The bride is a native of Minneapolis, but has lived abroad for some years.

HURRICANE IN ALABAMA.

Several Persons Killed and Great Property Damage Done.
Columbus, Ga., March 22.—In a hurricane which swept across Randolph county, Ala., nine lives are known to be lost, several persons seriously hurt and thousands of dollars' worth of property destroyed.

Man Accused of Attempted Poisoning Goes on Rampage.
Drain, Ore., March 25.—Herman Shooks during the day shot dead E. V. Cooper, who had accused him of attempting to poison him, and also shot and instantly killed Paul Howse, who was at Cooper's house, the scene of the tragedy. He then shot himself, dying almost instantly.

NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Wednesday, March 22.
M. Loupinko, chief of secret police, has been gazetted governor of Esthonia, a Baltic province of Russia.

The remains of Mrs. Jane L. Stanford arrived at San Francisco Tuesday on the steamer Alameda from Honolulu and were taken to Palo Alto on a special train.

The Ohio supreme court has held that the criminal section of the Valentine anti-trust law is constitutional. The civil section has already been passed upon.

The new Russian internal loan will be issued at 95 per cent.
Forty-seven head of hogs were sold at Peoria, Ill., for \$6,345, an average of \$135.

Brigadier General Tasker H. Bliss, now with the general staff and president of the war college, has been ordered to the Philippines.

The Fore River Shipbuilding company of Quincy, Mass., has signed a contract to construct four submarine torpedo boats of the Holland type for the United States government.

Rev. Elmer H. Capen, D. D., president of Tufts college, is dead at Medford, Mass., of pneumonia. Dr. Capen was seventy-seven years old. He had been president of Tufts since 1875.

Antonin Proust, minister of fine arts in the Gambetta cabinet, died Wednesday in Paris as the result of two shots in the head, self-inflicted. He had long been a victim of melancholy.

Former Governor B. B. Odell, Jr., of New York and family were received in private audience Thursday by Pope Pius X.

Theodore M. Pomeroy, speaker of the house at the end of the Fortieth congress, died at Auburn, N. Y., Thursday, aged eighty.

Public funerals of the victims of the disaster at Brockton, Mass., were held Thursday. The total list of dead is now placed at fifty-eight.

Mrs. Rebecca Tylee, aged ninety-six years, one of the five original Daughters of the American Revolution, is dead at Superior, Wis.

The Illinois house of representatives has passed a bill making the alluring of children a felony, punishable by from one to twenty years' imprisonment.

Robert Turner, a negro, was hanged Friday at Abington, Va., for the murder of Louise Jefferson, colored.

The celebration of the visit of American warships to Havana ended Friday with a big American concert and a carnival ball.

The joint resolution for the return of battleflags to Alabama has been adopted by the Wisconsin senate with but one vote in opposition.

The United States transport Sumner, having on board the congressional party bound for Colon, has arrived at Kingston, Jamaica, from San Domingo.
