

ORDINANCE

CHAPTER No. 5

An Ordinance of the Village of Buckman, Minn., to Prohibit Cattle and Stock in General from Running at Large in Said Village, and Prescribing Penalties for Violation Thereof.

The village council of the Village of Buckman do ordain:

Section 1.—Cattle and stock shall not be allowed to run at large within the limits of the village of Buckman, Minn.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the poundmaster of said village of Buckman, or of such official as the village council of said village may direct, to take up all cattle, horses or stock in general found running at large, and in order to secure the release of said cattle, horses, or stock in general the owner thereof shall pay into the treasury of said village of Buckman the sum of 50 cents per head for each animal so taken up, and also the further sum of fifty cents per day for each head for feed and care of said animal so taken up.

Sec. 3.—If the owner of animals taken up under the provisions of this ordinance shall not, within the time by law prescribed, pay all charges and release the said animal, the village of Buckman may sell the said animals at public sale to the highest bidder, to pay the costs and expenses of the feed of the said animals, all sums in excess of the total costs to be returned to the owner of the animals sold.

Sec. 4.—The village council of the village of Buckman shall allow such compensation to the poundmaster of said village, or other official directed to take up animals under this ordinance, as shall be just and reasonable.

Sec. 5.—This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.
