NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Wednesday, July 26. The Duchess of Grammont, who belonged to the Rothschild family, is dead at Paris. Samuel Harper, father of President Harper of the University of Chicago, is dead, aged eighty-seven. Policemen armed with riot guns arrested eleven bookmakers at the Delmar track at St. Louis Tuesday for violating the anti-betting law. The Shah of Persia, while shopping at Paris, suffered a brief fainting spell from the effect of the heat. The attack passed off without serious inconvenience. Waldo Story, an American sculptor, has been given the commission for the statue of the late Sir William Vernon Harcourt, which is to be placed in the lobby of the house of commons.

Thursday, July 27. John M. Collins has been appointed chief of police of Chicago. The Cedar Rapids (Ia.) Transfer company warehouse, filled with machinery and household goods, has been destroyed by fire. Loss, \$100,000. At Montreal, Que., C. E. Desmarreau Wednesday broke the world's fifty-six-pound shot throwing record for height. He put it over fifteen feet and eleven inches. The comptroller of the currency has ordered that the stockholders of the First National bank of Barberton, O., which went into bankruptcy some time ago, be assessed \$100 each share.

Friday, July 28. The Southern Pacific and Santa Fe companies have formally announced a reduction in the rate of refined sugar between San Francisco and the Missouri river and points in Kansas and Nebraska from 50 cents to 28 cents per hundred pounds in carload lots. The town of Gornie, B. C., was nearly destroyed by fire Thursday. The damage is \$50,000. William Sluggar shot and fatally wounded his wife and William Vivian at Knox, Pa., and then fired a bullet into his head. J. Pierpont Morgan was among the passengers who sailed from Liverpool for New York on board the White Star liner Oceanic. Arrangements are being made for a conference of the executive officers of the Eastern railways for the purpose of settling the passenger rate war. Hugh Roberts Parrish, treasurer of La Capital company of Buenos Ayres and a well known clubman of Philadelphia and New York, is dead at Philadelphia. The cricket match between the Marylebone eleven of London and the team of eighteen Philadelphia "colts" on the grounds of the Philadelphia Cricket club resulted in a draw.

Saturday, July 29. John Carbutt, known to photographers the world over, is dead at Philadelphia, aged seventy-three years. Whitelaw Reid, the American ambassador, presented D. Ogden Mills of New York to King Edward at Buckingham palace. The Isthmian canal commission has received a cablegram from Governor Magoon reporting three deaths from yellow fever. George Z. Work, long a leading wholesale tailor of Chicago, died suddenly of heart failure while riding on an electric car. Industrial dividends for August thus far declared and those yet to come show a gain of approximately \$100,000 over those of August a year ago, the total this year footing up \$15,710,529. Word has been received by cable of the death in Seoul, Korea, of Arthur S. Dixey, private secretary to United States Minister Morgan. He was graduated from Harvard with the class of 1902 and was a native of Boston.

Monday, July 31. Baron Meden has been appointed to succeed the late Major General Count Shuvloff as prefect of police at Moscow. A strike of 60,000 Lancashire (Eng.) cotton operatives is threatened owing to the masters refusal of a five per cent advance in wages. Commodore Theodore Burdoff, U. S. N., retired, is dead in the United States naval hospital at Philadelphia. He was about sixty years of age. Lloyd C. Grout, fifteen years old, son of R. A. Grout, traveling auditor of the Rock Island railroad, was struck on the head by a ball at Cedar Rapids, Ia., and died in six hours. Thomas Caldwell, president of the Caldwell Lawn Mower company and an inventor of note, is dead at Newburgh, N. Y. The development of the modern mower is largely due to his inventions.

Tuesday, Aug. 1. All grades of refined sugar have been advanced 10 cents per hundred pounds. Information has been received at Philadelphia of the death in Paris of the Countess de Diesbach, who previous to her marriage was Miss Meta McCall of Philadelphia. Five persons were injured in an accident to an eastbound passenger train on the Rock Island railroad about a mile west of Joliet, Ill. It is thought none of the injured will die. Conrad E. Spens, assistant general freight agent of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad in Chicago, has been appointed general freight agent of the "Q" lines west of the Missouri river. New corporations authorized in July under the laws of the Eastern states with a capital of \$1,000,000 or more reach a total of only \$61,215,000, by far the smallest amount for any month during the current year.

CATTLE THIEVES KILLED.

Woman Included in Gang Shot by Deputy Marshals. Muskogee, I. T., July 31.—In a fight on Deep Fork river two deputy United States marshals, J. H. Noble and E. S. Edwards, killed J. E. Coleman and his wife and arrested their fifteen-year-old son. The Colemans had stolen horses, cattle and mules in the Choctaw Nation. They passed through Choctaw and sold some of the stock. Officers were put on their track and overtook them on Deep Fork river. The thieves were surprised but fought hard. The woman as well as the men began to shoot when the officers approached. Coleman and his wife were shot dead. The son was not injured.

ADMIT IT IS SERIOUS

LITTLE CHANGE APPARENT IN YELLOW FEVER SITUATION AT NEW ORLEANS. New Orleans, July 31.—Little change is apparent in the yellow fever situation here. A number of new cases were unofficially reported to the board of health. The campaign in the interest of cistern screening continues and hundreds of gallons of oil are being placed in gutters and water receptacles. The large majority of new cases and deaths continues to be in the old infected area below Canal street. The official fever report for Monday is as follows: New cases up to 6 p. m., 21; cases to date, 304; deaths to 6 p. m., 5; total deaths to date, 62; new foci, 5; total foci, 46.

AFRICAN SITE REJECTED.

First Zionist Colony Will Be Established in Palestine. Basle, Switzerland, July 31.—The Zionists in session here have decided to attempt the establishment of their first colony in Palestine, rejecting the offer of a tract of land in East Africa made by Great Britain. The debate lasted for over six hours. President Nordau eventually suspended the sitting at dawn owing to the tumultuous scenes. Bryan Going Around the World. Madison, Wis., July 29.—After a banquet given him by the Democrats of Wisconsin Colonel William J. Bryan told a few intimate friends that he would soon start for a trip around the world. The trip will last from one to two years. He will join Mrs. Bryan in Japan, for which country she has started. It is expected he will travel East.

Cotton Operatives to Strike.

London, Aug. 1.—The 60,000 Lancashire cotton operatives have decided by an enormous majority to strike on Aug. 10 unless the advance of 5 per cent in wages demanded by them is conceded.

EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGHOUT THE STATE.

George H. Roberts, a territorial pioneer, is dead at Minneapolis. The lumber yards at Preston have been destroyed by fire, with a loss of \$50,000. John R. Hughes, an old resident of Winona county, is dead, aged eighty-four years. Otto, the nine-year-old son of John Cobb, fell from a raft at Pine City and was drowned. Mrs. J. W. Kenaston of Moorhead is dead of lockjaw, resulting from stepping on a rusty nail. The tannery of Otto Taubert at St. Paul has been destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$30,000. Minneapolis has 279,821 inhabitants, according to the compilers of the city directory for this year. Dr. Edward Rule, aged sixty-one years, formerly of Minneapolis, fell from a trolley car at Kansas City and was instantly killed. Phil Carlin of Minneapolis has been appointed general organizer of the International Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America. Dr. O. W. Archibald of St. Paul, who was ill at the time, fainted in the bathtub in his apartments and was drowned. The body of Joseph Eder was found in Como park, St. Paul, with a bullet near the heart. He had committed suicide while despondent. David Tozer, a leading lumberman of the St. Croix valley, is dead at Stillwater, aged eighty-four. He leaves a fortune of more than \$1,000,000. In consequence of a lovers' quarrel and a broken engagement Tina Lafler, twenty-one years old, of Minneapolis, ended her life with a dose of strychnine. Broken hearted over the death of her sweetheart Mathilde Schuster, thirty-five years old, committed suicide at St. Paul by taking a dose of carbolic acid. Anna Drabek, a young woman residing near Pine City, committed suicide by drowning while suffering from mental aberration, which has periodically affected her. Gong Tee Doc, a Chinese laundryman, has been arraigned in the St. Paul police court on a grave charge. The complainant is Ella Johnson, fourteen years old. Little Elsie Spiekerman, the ten-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Spiekerman of Fergus Falls is dead from lockjaw brought on from stepping on a rusty nail. Matt Cautwell of Le Sueur, a painter and photographer, died there of lockjaw resulting from the accidental breaking of both arms just above the wrist by falling from a tree while attempting to hive a swarm of bees. Because John D. Rockefeller has practically cornered the flax market of the world most of the Minneapolis mills—and that city is one of the greatest flax crushing points in the world—are closed and about 600 men are idle. Surveying has nearly been completed for the Great Northern's big improvements in Minneapolis. Two million dollars will be expended in establishing extensive freight terminals and shops in the neighborhood of Clearwater Junction. Albert B. Loutzenhiser, wanted in Duluth on a charge of embezzling \$10,000 from the First National bank, of which he was cashier, has been arrested at St. Paul. His roll of \$10,000 had dwindled down to 30 cents when he was taken into custody. Final figures on the Indian population of the state have been announced by the state census bureau. The figures show that the red men have increased nearly 50 per cent during the past five years. The total Indian population in 1900 was 6,492, as against 10,225 in 1905. During a thunder storm the barn of Albert Shields of the town of New Hartford, Winona county, was struck by lightning and the place burned to the ground with all the contents. Included in the loss were four horses, a hundred bushels of oats and the entire new hay crop which had been stored in the mows. Fire of unknown origin started in the laboratory of the building of anatomy on the university campus at Minneapolis, incinerating four cadavers of a collection of twelve in the basement awaiting dissection by the fall classes and destroying several cabinets containing anatomical preparations that were steeping in chemicals. Attorney General Young has begun a campaign against alleged timber trespassers. C. S. Jolley, special counsel of the department, who has been investigating claims against several companies, reports that about \$40,000 is due the state from timber trespass. Should the companies fail to pay this amount Mr. Young says he will bring suit. Preferring death to public disgrace Andrew Halverson of Minneapolis, twenty-eight years old, sent a bullet crashing through his brain at his father's home in the presence of Officer Salmon of the police force, who was there to arrest him on a charge of forgery of two checks, one for \$21.50 and the other for \$10.50. He died one-half hour later. Albert Erickson, sixteen years of age, employed at odd jobs in the C. A. Smith saw mill at Minneapolis, was killed while adjusting a belt that had slipped the wheel of the shafting. He had climbed up a distance of forty feet to right the belt when his clothing caught on the shafting and he was whirled round and round and his body horribly mangled.
