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## NEWS IN MINNESOTA

### EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGH-OUT THE STATE.

The Clearwater county seat fight between Bagley and Shevlin has been decided in favor of Bagley.

Grain stocks now at the Head of the Lakes amount to 17,750,000 bushels, the largest total on record.

Swan E. Molander of St. Paul has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination as secretary of state.

Matt Lafisto, aged twenty-five years, was instantly killed at McReavey's logging camp near Akeley while felling a tree.

Owen Ryan was burned to death in a fire that destroyed his home at Hallock, Kittson county. Mrs. Ryan and five children escaped.

Retail grocers of the state, in session at Rochester, went on record as being bitterly opposed to the premium schemes of some manufacturers.

Rev. H. C. Cheadle, a Presbyterian minister who has served in various cities of the state since 1872, is dead at Blue Earth City, aged seventy-seven years.

By using gasoline in mistake for kerosene to light a fire Mrs. Katherine Blech of Minneapolis was so severely burned that she died within a few hours.

The Minnesota conference of the Swedish Lutheran church, in session at St. Paul, re-elected Rev. J. A. Krantz of Duluth president and re-elected all the old officers.

Governor Johnson has decided that the law restricting the number of persons that may witness an execution was not violated at the hanging of William Williams in St. Paul.

Homesickness and worry over the condition of her parents, who live in Russia, wrecked Ada Brooks' mind and she committed suicide by hanging at her home in Minneapolis.

After attempting to take the life of a woman with whom he had been living George Wilson, aged thirty years, a well known character about Ten Strike, committed suicide by shooting.

Edward O. Fellows, the former Minneapolis fuel man found guilty of grand larceny in the first degree by a jury in the district court, has been sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary.

Mrs. A. M. Pierce of Bemidji narrowly escaped death as a result of being poisoned by eating adulterated candy and had it not been for the timely arrival of a physician undoubtedly would have died.

Carl Arthur Johnson, charged with being one of the murderers of Charles Otto Bader at Minneapolis several weeks ago, has been discharged by Judge Smith of the police court upon motion of the county attorney.

According to their statements the three banks in Albert Lea have a combined capital stock and surplus of \$247,500 and the nine in Freeborn county \$350,300. The total deposits for the nine banks foots up \$1,486,688.97.

Charles Pearson died at the St. Paul city hospital Thursday from injuries received in a fall on the sidewalk an hour previously. Pearson was fifty-one years of age and had been a resident of St. Paul for twenty-five years.

Receivers have been appointed for the Widell-Finley company, contractors of Mankato. The liabilities are estimated at over \$200,000, with assets of considerably less. The concern has contracts in eleven states aggregating \$1,200,000.

The supreme court has upheld the amendment passed by the last legislature in the Hennepin county salary law of 1903, with the result that certain Ramsey county officers will continue to enjoy their fee offices until after the census of 1910.

The shooting and killing of Edward Dickens at Minneapolis last week has been declared an accident by the grand jury. Mrs. Mary Dickens, the wife, who has been held charged with the killing, has been vindicated by the jury and released from jail.

Leeds Greene of Sheboygan, Wis., has filed notice with the Hennepin county probate court of a protest of the will of his mother, the late Ella F. Southerland. The son, Leeds Greene, who is nineteen years of age, is allowed only \$1 in the will now pending in the probate court, the value of the estate being \$6,400.

Sixty-five head of cattle have been killed at country points throughout the state in the past fifteen days by the live stock sanitary board in its fight against tuberculosis. The herds from which the affected cattle were taken belong to dairies which supply milk to the Twin Cities and the animals were tested at the request of the owners.

Charles A. Moody, a prominent business man of Warroad and until recently deputy collector of customs at that place, was given a hearing in St. Paul Saturday morning before United States Court Commissioner Spencer on the charge of smuggling a case of whisky into the port of Warroad from Canada. He was bound over to await the action of the federal grand jury at Fergus Falls next May.

Friends who took turns holding a severed artery with their fingers for three hours saved the life of John Field of Rollingstone, Winona county. He was working in the woods and his axe slipped and cut deep gashes in his ankles. An artery was severed in one ankle and the bleeding was profuse. Two friends held their fingers in the wound until a physician from Winona, sixteen miles away, could be summoned.

## WORK OF CONGRESS.

Tuesday, Feb. 13.

House—Fortifications appropriation bill under discussion and was the text for considerable heated argument. First over the lax methods of expenditures of public moneys and second over the location of the proposed \$15,000,000 naval station for the Philippines.

Senate—Shipping subsidy bill under discussion. Messrs. Spooner and Allison criticizing various features of the measure. Isle of Pines treaty taken up in executive session.

Wednesday, Feb. 14.

Senate—Shipping subsidy bill passed—28 to 27. All the votes for the bill were Republican and five Republicans—Burkett, Dooliver, La Follette, Spooner and Warner—voted with the Democrats in opposition.

House—Fortifications appropriation bill, carrying \$4,383,993, passed after a lively debate involving the difference between the Republican and Democratic policy with reference to the Philippines.

Thursday, Feb. 15.

Senate—Consideration of the joint statehood bill begun. Mr. Dick (O.) speaking in support of the bill as reported from the committee on territories.

House—Bill passed to increase to \$30,000 a year the federal appropriation to each state and territory for the support of agricultural experiment stations.

Monday, Feb. 19.

House—Bills to prevent gambling in the territories; providing additional work for the census bureau and appropriating \$50,000 for the purchase of coal lands in the Philippines passed under suspension of the rules.

Senate—Discussion of the pure food bill occupied practically the entire day.

## MANY MINERS KILLED

### FATAL EXPLOSION OF GAS IN THE MAITLAND MINE AT WALSENBURG, COLO.

Walsenburg, Colo., Feb. 20.—An explosion in the Victor Fuel company's Maitland mine during the day caused the death of at least thirteen miners and perhaps sixteen. Following is a list of the dead so far as known:

Archie Miller, Billy Morgan, James W. Titters, Battista Eobera, Corona Costa, Joe Costa and Nick Yockibetz. Shortly before 8 o'clock a. m. there was an explosion in that part of the Maitland known as the Sunshine which caused the earth to tremble for miles around. Soon after a man ran out and reported the mine was on fire. The explosion caused the fall of a mass of rock from the roof and until this is cleared away it will not be known definitely just how many men are in the mine.

The explosion was caused by gas and the deaths were caused by the gas and afterward. It is supposed the explosion occurred as the result of open lamps in use, as most of the men in that part of the mine used open lamps.

### REYES SHOT AT EIGHT TIMES

President of Colombia the Target of Paid Assassins.

Franma, Feb. 20.—Columbian news papers just received here contain a dispatch from President Reyes stating that on Feb. 10 he was shot eight times by paid assassins while he was crossing the Arjopiso bridge in Bogota with his daughter. None of the bullets struck the president or his daughter. A large reward is offered for the arrest of the would-be assassins.

## NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Wednesday, Feb. 14.

The senate has agreed to vote on the pure food bill Feb. 21.

The price of wool in Arizona this season is higher than ever before.

The Colorado and Southern railroad shops in Denver were destroyed by fire Tuesday. Loss estimated at \$150,000.

William H. Phillips, past grand master of the Michigan Masonic grand lodge, dropped dead at Menominee of heart disease.

Department Commander Colonel F. A. Copeland has named June 12 and 13, 1906, as the dates for the next annual encampment of the Wisconsin G. A. R. at Marinette.

Chief of Police Collins of Chicago has issued a general order to the department instructing all police officers to see that no boy or girl under eighteen years old is allowed hereafter in a public dance hall unattended by parents.

Thursday, Feb. 15.

Colonel H. G. Toler, in his day one of the best known turfirmen in the West, is dead at Wichita, Kan., aged sixty years.

By a practically unanimous vote the Kentucky house of representatives passed a bill prohibiting the operation of poolrooms and fixing the penalty at a fine of from \$1,000 to \$5,000 daily.

The directors of the Union Pacific Railroad company have declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent on the company's common stock. This is an increase of half of 1 per cent as compared with the last semi-annual declaration.

The house committee on ways and means has decided to make a favorable report on the Humphreys bill requiring collectors of internal revenue to furnish to prosecuting attorneys lists of persons holding federal liquor tax stamps in prohibition districts.

Friday, Feb. 16.

The Standard Oil company of New Jersey has declared a dividend of \$15 a share. The dividend declared at this time last year was at the same rate.

Mrs. Zetta Eckles, convicted at Cedar Rapids, Ia., of manslaughter in killing Constable Peter Martin, has been sentenced to five years in prison.

General Fred Walsen is dead at Denver, aged sixty-five years. General Walsen was a Colorado pioneer. He founded the town of Walsenburg and served one term as state treasurer.

According to reports received at the department of commerce and labor coal and coke exports from the United States in 1905 aggregated \$31,215,528 in value, as compared with a little more than \$11,000,000 in 1895.

William J. H. Waters, member of the wholesale millinery firm of Armstrong, Cator & Co., is dead at Baltimore, aged seventy-two years. He was a director of a national bank and closely identified with financial affairs in that city.

Saturday, Feb. 17.

Dispatches to Dun's Review indicate fairly well sustained retail trade and vigorous preparations for the future.

Fire at Courtland, Va., wiped out a considerable amount of property in that town. Among the buildings destroyed was the Courtland hotel.

The president has offered the governorship of Alaska to D. H. Jarvis, formerly of the revenue cutter service, but now engaged in business in Alaska.

Anton Dubost, first vice president of the French senate, has been elected president of that body, succeeding M. Fallieres, the president-elect of the republic.

Record breaking exports of American agricultural machinery will be made to Russia this season. Three complete shiploads are to be forwarded to Black sea ports within the next few weeks.

Mount Pelce, on the Island of Martinique, is again active.

Senator Tillman, who has been ill with a severe cold, is much better.

Carl Joubert, the well known writer on Russian subjects, is dead at London.

It is reported Congressman W. Bourke Cockran and Mrs. "Jack" Gardner of Boston are engaged to be married.

Joseph Salera, an Italian, was stabbed in the neck with an ice pick by James Brown, colored, in a saloon row in St. Paul. Brown is under arrest.

Lieutenant Colonel George A. Hughes, for thirteen years chief of police of Montreal and commander of the crack French-Canadian regiment, the Sixty-fifth royal rifles, is dead. He was well known in the United States.

Tuesday, Feb. 20.

Mrs. Margaret Curtin, fifty-five years old, a noted slum worker of Chicago, is dead.

Brigadier General James Ketter, retired, is dead at Junction City, Kan., of a grippe and old age.

John B. Stetson, the millionaire hat manufacturer of Philadelphia, is dead at his winter home at Gillen, Fla.

George A. Caster, congressman from the Third district of Pennsylvania, is dead at Philadelphia after a long illness. He was fifty-one years old.

Fire caused a loss estimated at \$750,000 in the business portion of Rutland, Vt. Six brick structures, occupied by nearly a score of firms and many smaller tenants, were destroyed.

Lord Ashburton of England was married at Paris Monday to Frances Donnelly, an American actress, whose stage name is Frances Belmont, formerly of New York, and one of the original "Florodora" sextette of 1901.
