NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Wednesday, Feb. 28.

The president has signed the urgent deficiency bill. Richard Mansfield denies a report that he was suffering from cancer and would soon retire from the stage. Japanese officers have assumed control of the imperial war college, trade and commercial schools at Canton, China.

Councilman Jeremiah Amundson of Akron, O., has been sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 for soliciting a bribe from a sewer pipe company.

A resolution favoring the repeal of the duty on hides has been adopted by the executive council of the Massachusetts state board of trade.

Major Joseph M. Kennedy, who was on General Fremont's staff in the Civil war and distinguished himself by extreme daring in the famous charge at Springfield, Mo., is dead near Middletown, O., aged seventy-two years.

Thursday, March 1.

The president has sent to the senate the nomination of David C. Owen to be postmaster at Milwaukee.

Four persons are dead and three are missing as the result of a fire in a vaudeville theater at Santiago, Chile.

Charles E. Leland, the last of seven brothers, all of whom were well known in the hotel business throughout the country, is dead in Broadbain, N. Y. He was sixty-three years old.

Rear Admiral Colby M. Chester, superintendent of the naval observatory, has been placed on the retired list. He will be retained on temporary active duty in the bureau of navigation.

An offer of \$125,000 from John D. Rockefeller for a hospital for children suffering from tuberculosis is announced by R. Fulton Cutting, president of the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor.

Friday, March 2.

The Southern Bank and Trust company of Fort Smith, Ark., has suspended. It has deposits of about \$80,000.

General Benjamin Bibby Murray, who at one time occupied a prominent position in national affairs, is dead at Calais, Me.

Construction work on the new docks at Baltimore, for which the people recently voted a loan of \$6,000,000, was begun Thursday.

Alfred Beit, the well known London merchant, who was born in Hamburg, has given \$500,000 to found a university at Hamburg.

Representative Edgar D. Crumacker has been renominated by the Republicans of the Tenth congressional district of Indiana.

The steamship Dakota brings advices from Nagasaki that the famine situation in the northern provinces of Japan is steadily growing graver.

Saturday, March 3.

Jose Maria de Pereda, the novelist, is dead at Santander, Spain.

Commissioner of Public Works Joseph Medill Patterson of Chicago has tendered his resignation to Mayor Dunne.

Secretary Shaw announced Friday that he would make temporary deposits in public banks amounting to \$10,000,000.

Ex-United States Consul John Goodnow, at Shanghai, has been appointed foreign adviser to China, at Nanking, at a salary of \$500 a month.

Attorney General Ellis of Ohio has announced his intention at once to bring suit to oust the Ohio Wholesale Grocers' association under the anti-trust act.

Joseph O. Siebeneck, former editor and proprietor of the Pittsburg Chronicle and for ten years editor-in-chief of the Chronicle-Telegraph, is dead of pneumonia.

Monday, March 5.

J. Pierpont Morgan is in Rome. Senor Romero Robledo, former Spanish minister of justice, president of the chamber and leader of the Weyler party, is dead.

William F. Ross, aged seventy-two, superintendent of the Fremont, O., public schools since 1864 and a prominent educator, is dead.

Dr. W. T. Campbell, who with his father and three brothers, founded Des Moines, Ia., is dead in St. Louis at the age of eighty years.

In a sermon delivered Sunday at St. Louis, Archbishop J. J. Glennon severely criticised theaters and deplored the tendency of people to patronize them.

Antonio Balestreiri, wanted in Milwaukee on a charge of murdering Tomaso Tarentino in the Italian section of that city on Aug. 6 last, has been arrested in Palermo, Sicily.

Tuesday, March 6.

G. A. Eaton has been appointed postmaster at Duluth. The senate has passed a bill appropriating \$150,000 for a public building at Devils Lake, N. D.

The funeral of Ex-Governor Hogg took place at Austin, Tex., Monday, and was largely attended. J. P. Morgan, who is in Rome, is suffering from a slight cold. He will be received by King Victor Emmanuel shortly.

Patrick O'Shea, the nestor of the Catholic publishers in America, is dead at Surmit, N. J., in his seventy-fourth year. James Speyer of Speyer & Co., New York bankers, has resigned from the board of trustees of the Mutual Life Insurance company. Major Livingston Mims, former mayor of Livingston and one of the best known men in the South, is dead at Atlanta. He was seventy-six years old.

WORK OF CONGRESS.

Wednesday, Feb. 28.

House—Details of the provisions of the army appropriation bill occupied the day. Several pages of the measure yet remain to be considered.

Senate—Three hours of the session occupied by Mr. Foraker in a speech on the railroad rate question. He opposed any general legislation on the subject, declaring that extension of existing laws would meet all requirements.

Thursday, March 1.

House—Army appropriation bill passed after five days' consideration; also the Foraker bill providing for the marking of the graves of Confederate dead buried in the North.

Senate—Mr. Dolliver (Ia.) spoke at length on railway rate regulation, advocating the passage of the house measure as reported by the senate committee.

Friday, March 2.

Senate—Bill providing for the settlement of the affairs of the Five Civilized tribes of Indians passed. Under the guise of considering the bill practically the entire day was spent in the discussion of the railway question.

House—Day devoted to private claims, twenty-five bills being passed.

Monday, March 5.

House—Legislation by unanimous consent and under suspension of the rules occupied the entire day. A bill providing for a delegate to congress from Alaska was passed.

Senate—Mr. Nelson (Minn.) spoke on the statehood bill, advocating the passage of the pending measure.

CLARK GETS DECISION

MONTANA SENATOR WINS FEDERAL SUPREME COURT.

Washington, March 5.—United States Senator Clark of Montana has won the case against him in the supreme court of the United States in which the government sought to have cancelled patents to 11,400 acres of public lands in Montana which were alleged to have been fraudulently secured. The opinion in the case was delivered by Justice Holmes and upheld the decision of the circuit court of appeals for the Ninth circuit.

This was a civil proceeding instituted by the government against Senator Clark to secure the cancellation of eighty-two patents to land issued under the timber and stone act. The charge made by the government in its bill of complaint was that the patents were fraudulently secured and it was further set forth that about eighty of the patentees are now under indictment in the Montana courts. It was asserted that Senator Clark had entered into a contract to purchase the land before the patents were granted, and that he had known, or had good reason to know, that the proceeding was fraudulent. The government charged that Clark was not a bona fide purchaser, but the courts below, including the court of appeals, took the contrary view, holding that the issue of patents had the effect of converting his purchase of an equity into a purchase of title. The printed record in the case covered 7,000 pages.

ESTIMATED AT FIFTY.

Number of Fishermen Lost Off Coast of Norway.

Trondhjem, Norway, March 5.—Rescued eleven fishing boats already reported missing as a result of the recent storm five others are unaccounted for. The total loss of life is estimated at fifty.

POSSIBILITIES OF NAVIGATION ON THE UPPER MISSISSIPPI.

St. Cloud Journal-Press: The driving of logs down the Mississippi is practically at an end, and with the buildings of dams and the construction of locks it would be entirely practical to run good size boats up to Little Falls or Brainerd.

In the near future dams will be built across the Mississippi at Coon Creek rapids, between Elk River and Otsego, at Clear water, Sauk Rapids, and Royallton. These with the dams at St. Cloud, Sartell and Little Falls, would give good depth of water from Minneapolis above Little Falls. The dams are going to be put in just as thick as possible all along the river. Let the government build the locks and we can then set our coal and iron and many other commodities by water, and be independent of the railroads.

It is true that the railroads have killed off very largely river transportation of freight, but they have done it by making a lower rate, and in this way the possibilities of waterways have been of great value to the people along the big rivers. The railroads, however, have not killed off the freight business of the big lakes, and never will. What can be done on the lakes can be accomplished on the river if there is water enough to carry big boats. The building of dams will supply the water along the upper Mississippi.
