G. A. R. STATE MEETING

Minnesota Encampment at Minneapolis Wednesday

Department Commander C. F. Macdonald issued his order for the state encampment March 21 and 22, at Minneapolis, says the Pioneer Press. The encampment will open at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 21st at McKinley hall, Western avenue and Ninth street. R. R. Wright is appointed officer of the day and E. T. W. Green, officer of the guard. Dura Corbin is detailed by the commander as color bearer and G. P. Boytell and Ann Dalley as color guard.

The headquarters of the department in the new capitol will be closed during the encampment and opened at the convention hall, but the department's rooms in the capitol will be open for comrades who visit the building. The council of administration will meet in the capitol on the morning of March 20 for a business session. The following are appointed credential committee: Orton S. Clark, Geo. B. Arnold, N. N. Palmer, T. P. Baldwin, A. Torgerson, D. E. Newton.

A campfire under the auspices of the Minneapolis posts will be held at the Minneapolis auditorium on the evening of March 21 and this will be open to the public as well as the delegates to the encampment and to the conventions of the relief corps and the ladies of the G. A. R. At the campfire the department commander will present the prizes for the best three essays on the subject, "Minnesota's Part in the War for the Preservation of the Union." The competition has been open to students of state high schools and a committee has been at work this week making the awards.

The annual convention of the women's relief corps will be held at the Unitarian church, Eighth street and Mary place, and that of the ladies of the G. A. R. at McElroy hall, Nicollet street and Eighth street.

The retiring officers of the women's relief corps will give a reception in the parlors of the Nicollet hotel on the evening of March 20 to the members of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. The same evening a public reception will be given by the ladies of G. A. R. at the Nicollet hotel. The reception will be for past and present department officers, also national officers. The members of the Grand Army and the allied orders will be invited.

AT HIS OLD TRICKS

Walter King Again Fitting Himself for Prison

Walter King, formerly of Little Falls and Royalton, and the St. Cloud reformatory, has gone back to the ways of crime. King was originally sent to the Red Wing reformatory school, and there picked up a little of the printing trade. He came to Little Falls and was befriended by several, and worked part of the time in local newspaper offices. He was suspected of several petty crimes, but not caught. Later he committed a robbery at Royalton, stealing from a store there. Through the intercession of friends who believed him repentant, he got off with a light sentence. Later he was tried for stealing from a saloon in Stillwater, and sent to the St. Cloud reformatory, where he was for some time. Being paroled, he went to southern Minnesota and did the mechanical work on a paper at Hayfield. After that he was not heard of for a long time, till about two months ago he arrived in Little Falls, and said he was traveling for the McClintan Paper Co. This was afterwards proved to be untrue. King seems incapable of reform. No matter what is done for him, and friends have often tried to help him, he has a moral relapse, and seems destined to end his career behind prison walls. He has considerable assurance, and is not without shrewdness and cunning. Some years ago, without capital, but with several artistic lies, he bought and ran a restaurant at Pillsbury for a week, then departed. His latest exploits are given as follows in the Moorhead News of last week:

Adolph Anderson, alias W. W. Brown, alias Holmer, alias W. W. King, who has been a resident of Fargo for the past two weeks, is wanted by the local police, and also by the authorities at Detroit. Mr. King, which was the last name the young man gave in Fargo, came to the city where he was arrested by Chief Marvey on the night of Feb. 21 on suspicion, but turned loose. He stopped at the Phoenix hotel, Detroit, Minn., for a few days and the night man missed his overcoat. It was found in the possession of Holmes about 2:15 a. m., Feb. 20. The young man went by the name of Holmes at the hotel, but when questioned by the officer at the time the coat was found in his possession, he gave the name of W. W. Brown. He handed the coat over to the officer, who permitted him to go. The coat proved to be the property of George Lynch, night man at the hotel, who purchased the property from J. H. Smith & Co. of Detroit. Between the hours of 1 and 2:15 a. m., Feb. 20, Holmes had marked the coat and also tore off the strap which had on it the name of the manufacturer. Holmes then went to Moorhead, where he was arrested by Chief Malvey, when he gave the name of W. W. King. After being released at Moorhead he came to Fargo and was directed to the office of Attorney A. T. Cole. He wanted a job on the Searchlight as subscription solicitor, and Mr. Cole encouraged him, but wanted him to wait a day or two before closing a contract. He gave the name of Holmes to Mr. Cole and said he was from Hayfield, Minn., where he had studied law in the office of Atty. Louis Conser, who also owns a newspaper. Mr. Cole happened to be acquainted with Attorney Conser, the latter having formerly resided at Ellendale with his father, E. P. Conser, well known in territorial days.

In a confidential mood, Holmes told Detroit for stealing his own coat, had again at Moorhead, but he had been released, but he was without a coat. He seemed very anxious to get work, but there was a strong perfume of cigarettes about him and he was very nervous. He stated that he had a sister at Minneapolis and he wanted to call her up by long distance phone and get some money as he was "broke." He also wanted to study law with Mr. Cole, but was discouraged and finally left the office. Holmes went to the office of Newman, Huk & Frame several days later and asked for a position, stating that he was anxious to study law, having studied for a year in southern Minnesota. He also stated that he was a printer and it was partially arranged that he should be given employment to make a living while awaiting suitable recommendations from Duluth, where he claimed that he was a printer in good standing. While in Mr. Frame's office last Friday the latter was engaged in drawing checks. Mr. Frame had occasion to leave the room for a moment and in his absence Holmes tore a sheet of stubs and vouchers from the check book. Holmes appears to have filled in several of the checks. One for \$22 was cashed at A. Rubel's store by a clerk, Holmes purchasing an overcoat. He appears to have passed a check for \$42 at a clothing store on Front street, where he purchased a suit of clothes and received the difference in cash. There remained one check, which may turn up later. Holmes seems to have made good his escape.

LETTER FROM MR. MOEGLEIN.

The following appeared in the Transcript yesterday:
Editor The Transcript—
The Transcript disputes the statement made by me at the West side meeting that I was a heavy taxpayer, and attacks my candidacy for mayor on the ground that I do not pay as much taxes as Dr. Chance. I do not dispute the figures as to personal tax. I am a man of modest habits and modest way of living. My folks were poor and though I have by very hard work for many years acquired some property, my mode of living is little changed. My house is very modestly furnished, and any citizen of Little Falls is invited to visit me and see whether I am telling the truth or not. But I am, and have been for years, a heavy taxpayer. There are real estate as well as personal property taxes to be paid, and in 1904 paid \$121.28 real estate taxes, not including the amount paid by my firm. For years my real estate taxes have been heavy, whereas the records show that the gentleman the Transcript supports pays no real estate taxes in this city at all. County Treasurer signor will verify the figures I have given. Myself and the firm of which I am a member always pay our taxes. The amount is a matter of assessment, as everyone knows. In 1900, when I was president of the council, and member of the board of equalization, it is claimed that our assessment was too low. It is strange that if that were true, that J. A. Nichols, then mayor and member of the board, did not object. In his judgment it evidently was all right. I did appear before the county board, in the right that every taxpayer has, to object to an assessment I thought unfair. That is no crime. A good many supporters of my opponent have done that very thing, not only for themselves, but in the well remembered Thayer tax on the West side, where the city lost thousands of dollars.

I welcome the utmost investigation of my record in all the years I have lived here. No man can say that a dirty dollar ever touched my hand. I would like to be mayor, and will endeavor to give everybody a square deal.
