

WANT THE "ALPHABET"

Commercial Club Agitating for Another Railroad Here

At a large and representative gathering of Little Falls business men at the Commercial club rooms Friday evening resolutions were adopted pledging the Commercial club to do all in its power to secure the building to Little Falls of the proposed north and south line, hitherto projected to run from Albert Lea north to St. Cloud and thence to Lake Superior. A committee of three was authorized to make a thorough investigation, also if necessary to visit the officials of interested roads.

President W. H. K. Mover presided, and called on Mayor Vasily to open the discussion. The mayor, in discussing the matter, brought up the matter of the electric line proposed some years ago, called attention to the amicable relations existing between the city and the company, to the fact that various favors, in the line of franchises, etc., had been granted the company, and that it was only fair, there being present representatives of the company, to ask whether they could at this time say anything as to their intentions.

J. L. McCague of Omaha, of the board of directors of the Water Power Co., addressed the meeting. He said the company was duly grateful and appreciative for the favors granted. It would grow with the growth of the city. At present, through the illness of the chief promoter of the electric line, not much could be expected from the proposition, although it was not dead. The company was ready in every way possible to help the city grow and prosper, and would ever be found willing to do its share. Mr. McCague pointed out the benefits of a north and south line, said inevitably it would be built, and that Little Falls must be active and awake, and not let the line get away from this city.

Judge E. F. Shaw pointed out the danger of sitting still and allowing other communities to reap advantages Little Falls should have. Efforts were being made to have the proposed line run through the southeastern part of the county, not reaching Little Falls at all. It was necessary that a start be made at once.

Geo. F. Moeglein, Dr. Chance, B. Burton, Geo. Kiewel, John Vertin and others being called on, expressed themselves in favor of the proposition.

Mayor Vasily, after speaking on the proposition, introduced the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, it is for the best interests of Morrison county and Little Falls that we promote, labor for, and do all in our power to secure the building of a line of railroad from the southern part of the state to this city and from this city to Lake Superior, be it

Resolved, by the Commercial club of Little Falls that we pledge all our efforts to secure the construction of such a line, and be it further

Resolved, that the president of this club be authorized to appoint a special committee of three to ascertain what must be done to induce the road known as the "Alphabet line," in case it shall be built to St. Cloud, to run to Lake Superior by way of Little Falls. Pierz and Mille Lacs lake and that the committee be directed to investigate such other propositions looking toward additional railway communication for this city as may be presented to them, the committee to report to this club as soon as practicable; further, that the committee shall have the power, when in their opinion the cause can be furthered by such action, to appoint some person or persons to go to the officials of the Alphabet line and do all in their power to secure the road for Little Falls."

After the meeting there was a social time and snoker, the club members being enabled to meet the Water Power officials and others present. Besides Mr. McCague, Frank H. Parsons of New York, vice president of the Water Power Co., was present. President B. H. Warren of the company, was in the city, but not feeling well, had retired early.

Others present from outside were Judge Searle and Court Stenographer Woodward of St. Cloud, Arnold Nagel of Pierz, P. J. Gan of Granite and Lars Talberg of Mt. Morris.


