WHY HOME TRADE PAYS

Good Arguments Against the Catalogue Houses

It was only lately I saw one of the leading farmers in this community carrying a large, bungleome catalogue from a Chicago catalogue house, home with him. It happened that I was drawn into a discussion of this question with him and I was actually surprised to hear him express himself as he did. In the first place, I feel proud of the fact that I have never patronized one of these concerns in preference to dealing with home merchants. Probably one reason why I have not felt inclined to send my trade away from home is because, it has only been a few years since I found my financial condition such that it became necessary for me to arrange with someone to carry my account over a crop season. In fact, it has not been more than a year since I found it necessary to run an account for a short time and I am not one so forgetful of accommodations as to order from catalogue houses and send them the money with the orders when our home merchants have been good enough to extend credit to me when I needed it. But I cannot say this in since has been the only one to cause me to trade entirely at home. I know if I, or any of my neighbors, want to buy something, if they would only go to one of our home merchants and tell what they wanted, he would furnish it to us just as cheap as a catalogue house. Now I don't mean he will let us have first class goods at a price we would pay them for second class goods, but I mean that for the same class of goods they will sell just as cheap as those other fellows. In figuring the cost of goods from catalogue houses, we don't want to forget to figure in the cost of sending the money and paying the freight or express. If it is anything liable to need repairs, our home merchants can get them for us, but it is almost impossible to get them from a catalogue house. Of course the merchant in our town cannot afford to sell us goods just as cheap as these catalogue houses and wait six months or a year for their pay when these other concerns require us to send the cash with the order, or as soon as the goods are received. They could not afford to do that. I remember when one of our neighbors met with a loss of nearly everything he had on earth and when we started out to take up a collection for him every merchant in town and, in fact in three towns around us, contributed something. No one thought of asking a catalogue house to help out on this fund. Of course we can imagine how much good it would have done to have asked them to.

I am not a philanthropist and am frank to say if anything could be saved in the long run from buying from the catalogue houses, I might then think about it, but I do not believe you save one cent. I know it is a mighty hard matter for a home merchant to come out even on a sale. When he sells us or any of my neighbors a dollar's worth, it must weigh up to a dollar's worth, but when any of us buy a hundred or so pounds from a catalogue house it can be just a little short and we think, of course, it has sifted through the bag or something is the cause of it and we let it go at that. I know of one of my neighbors buying a cook stove from a catalogue house. When the stove came it looked just like the picture in the catalogue. In fact, it was like it only it weighed about one half or two thirds as much as the same size stove would if it had been bought from one of our hardware men. My neighbor told me it was the last thing he would ever buy away from home, because he knew he was stuck on the stove, for it was just like the picture and the fact of it being a light weight stove did not give him any excuse for refusing to take it. Since then I was telling one of our hardware dealers about it he said he could have got the man the same weight stove and delivered it to him at about \$1.50 less than what it cost my neighbor, counting the freight.

I expect the editor can see I am not much of an advocate of buying from the mail order concerns and I don't believe anyone else will be if they will thoroughly investigate before buying. It won't cost any of us anything to see our home merchants before sending our orders away, and then if we don't like the price they offer us we can use our own judgment.—Hayfield Guard.

LITTLE FALLS HAS LARGEST STONE CRUSHER IN THE WORLD—THAT IS, LITTLE FALLS, N. Y.

Little Falls, N. Y., News: The big crusher for the Little Falls Stone Company has arrived, and lies on the flat cars at the West Shore station awaiting the completion of the concrete foundations at the plant on the south side of the river. This machine has the distinction of being the largest stone crusher in the world. It weighs 100 tons, and has a capacity of crushing 100 car loads per day, or 4,000 yards. The machine when assembled will be more than twenty feet in height, and is similar to an inverted cone, inside of which a central rotary motion. Chunks of rock as large as a barrel are fed in the top, and are worked down so that the largest pieces are about two inches in diameter. Trams, loaded by derricks, will convey the rocks to the crusher, after which the product is automatically separated into sizes and loaded on the cars by gravity at the rate of about a car load a minute.

COLONEL THORPE AT HOME.

Brainerd Dispatch: Colonel Thorpe, Crow Wing county's famous painter, was in the city a short time today on his way home from Texas where he spent the winter. Mr. Thorpe speaks in glowing terms of the Lone Star State and says it is the coming section of the country. It is being largely undeveloped but he believes that it has a great future before it. Colonel Thorpe will return there next winter accompanied by his family as he had commissions in the leading Texas cities that will occupy the entire winter. In fact he is bringing some portrait studies up here with him which he will work on during the summer and complete them next winter. He expects to remain at Herbert about six weeks after which he will go to Montana for July and August. He has already more commissions ahead in Montana than he can fill in several years.

May 17th, the anniversary of Norway's declaration of independence, in 1814, was celebrated by a gathering in the evening at the home of Nick Elvig. Mr. Elvig never allows the anniversary to pass unnoticed, and if there is not a public celebration, gathers at his home the children of Norway living here. There was no program, just a good social time. In 1814 Norway broke off dependence on Denmark. On June 7th of last year the hopes of Norwegian patriots were realized when Norway, separating from Sweden, became a free and independent nation. In several cities that anniversary will be celebrated in the future rather than the 17th of May, and preparations are being made for a good celebration here.

The Farmers Exchange has on exhibition a complete steam threshing outfit made by the J. I. Case Co. The Exchange is agent for the machines, and all interested should look over the rig.

Mrs. Ida McDaniel was called Saturday to Albany to see her brother, John Christen, who was seriously injured in a runaway, and not expected to live.

The high school class in physics, under direction of their instructor, W. A. Nonnamaker, visited the power house and electric light station on Friday.

Rev. F. A. Sumner of Minneapolis has been holding fellowship meetings at various points in the northern part of the state. This week he visits Cass Lake, Akley, Parker and Walker.

At St. Cloud Thursday last week the county school superintendents of the state formed an association, the object being to bring the officials together on matters of mutual benefit for the schools, and to co-operate where possible. Supt. Sheldon attended the meeting.

LETTER FROM CALIFORNIA.

Oakdale, Cal., May 14, 1908. Editor Herald: As I know many of my Morrison county friends are interested in hearing something about California, I thought I would write a few lines about this part of the Golden State. Oakdale is the name of the beautiful little town that I am located in.

Oakdale is situated thirty miles southeast of Stockton, on the Stanislaus River, in Stanislaus county. It has a population of 1500 people, and is considered one of the most thriving towns, being surrounded by fertile prairies, and not far from the Sierra Nevada Mountains, which loom in the distance, adding greatly to the beautiful scenery.

The railroad facilities of Oakdale are very good, being the center for three different railroads, namely the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and the Sierra Railway. These afford ample means for the marketing of all products raised, and such as are not sold in the mining cities or vicinity are either shipped to Stockton, San Francisco or Eastern markets.

The San Joaquin Valley is especially fortunate in the matter of water supply, which is drawn from the never ending snows of mountain tops, into a series of rivers which afford certain sub-irrigation to the country, as well as the actual water distribution in the vast system, for surface irrigation.

The land around Oakdale has a very good irrigation system, which is now being extended so as to take in several thousand acres more land. This will bring in a great many more people, who will buy small tracts for the purpose of fruit raising.

The soil is rich, sandy loam, free from alkali. It is very productive and will raise almost anything that can be grown in a semi-tropical climate. Alfalfa yields from three to five crops annually: each crop from one and one-half to two tons per acre, and the hay in the fields bring from five to ten dollars per ton. Alfalfa land rents from seven and one-half to ten dollars an acre, per annum.

Wine grapes run from sixty to one hundred and fifty dollars per acre. Sweet potatoes yield from eighty to two hundred sacks to the acre, bringing an average price of ninety cents per sack.

Peaches, apricots, oranges, cherries, figs, pears, lemons, olives and almonds are prolific in yield and choice in quality. In fact almost everything raised in the Western States is grown successfully here.

Thirty acres of alfalfa will support 25 cows, and the income from the raising of poultry will sufficiently support a family.

Farm land, suitable for wheat raising, can be bought for fifteen dollars per acre, irrigated land, suitable for fruit raising from thirty to fifty dollars per acre, and improved orchards can be had at a price comparatively larger.

The inhabitants of Oakdale and vicinity are mostly Americans, Germans and Scandinavians.

The irrigation country of the San Joaquin Valley undoubtedly offer the best opportunity to the industrious farmers, who are looking for a place to build a new home where there is a fertile country, the best of water and mild climate.

Trusting that I may see many of my Morrison county friends here in the future and if there is anything more anyone wishes to know about this country I will be glad to ascertain the facts from reliable sources and advise by personal letter.

There is room here for thousands of people more and work for all that wish to work, a good living in a good climate.

It is not always that the manufacturers comply with the law, or if they do in a technical way the terms used are not intelligible to the average consumer. For instance "basic aluminum sulphate" is nothing more or less than "alum."

The following list of baking powders containing alum is made up from the official reports of the Food Commissioners or from the report of the U. S. Agricultural Department at Washington, or other equally reliable authority:
